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## EDITORIAL

### CYNICISM AND DECLINING MORALE....

With the approach of the hotter weather and the absence of drought relieving rains it now seems certain that an even more disastrous season than the last, face the harassed farming community of these districts. Even if relatively good rains were to fall immediately for many of the smaller farmers it will be too late. On their own it will be years before the effects of the poor seasons will be overcome; for some they will never be overcome.

For the drought to continue at a time when declining incomes and increasing costs are a symptom of farming generally, it will only take another few weeks of unpropitious weather to hammer the final nail in the coffins of many men and their families' livelihoods.

There is little, if anything, these people can do to overcome their difficulties. Providence has failed them and their only hope now is a benevolent government, both State and Federal.

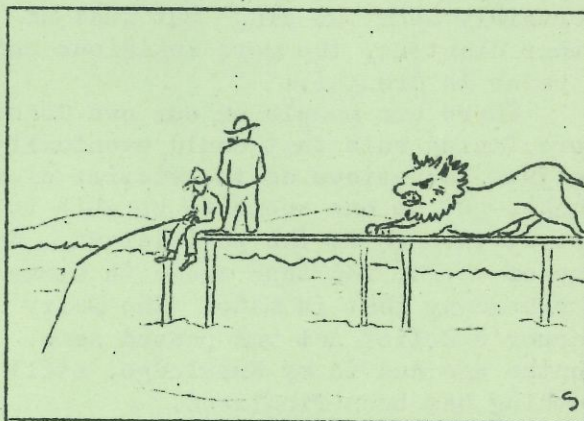
Already the Premier has made representation to the Commonwealth for Federal aid. No doubt this has been done because of the rapidly deteriorating drought situation. But cynically, one wonders about the outcome of such representations. Only last year the Premier obtained Federal go-ahead on a \$200,000 loan to dairy farmers who were first hit by the appalling weather conditions. Because only about a quarter of this money was issued (lack of security and inability to repay made most of this loan money untenable), the Prime Minister will undoubtedly ask first, what of the remainder? We also would like to ask the same question and receive the answer the P.M. will get from Mr. Reece.

It is ardently hoped State and Federal governments won't involve themselves in a political wrangle which often accompany emergencies such as this.

Tasmanian farmers only ask for the same consideration that is given other States. They need help, and they need it quickly.

During past seasons of difficulties in these areas and the past experience of farmers with government action, where the political catch phrase seems to be 'How can we get out of this situation

and not lose too many votes' rather than 'How can we help', it is no wonder that the morale of the drought affected farmers has reached an all time low.

It is in the hands of the politicians to restore their faith.

Dear Sir,

In view of the fact that Parliament passed a special bill on Wednesday for an interim grant to earthquake victims in Western Australia. Passed in what must be almost record time - it **only took one minute twenty eight seconds.**

All parties agreed unanimously on the special Bill and it was a delight to hear the speed it was dealt with. No doubt the people in the earthquake area will appreciate this expediency; they certainly need the aid. But what of other disasters, the more insidious ones? I refer to drought.

There are people on our own Coast here facing ruin that could eventually be just as serious as the victims of a quake, yet no one seems to be able to get it through to the politicians. On top of which, red tape seems to strangle any headway that is made. The Dairy Farmer's Relief Act was passed some months ago and to my knowledge, still nothing has been finalised.

If Federal Parliament does not view this drought situation with equal urgency and made grants, or at least workable long term loans available to these farmers, soon it could be too late for many to recover.

To the farmers themselves, may I suggest, it might help their case if all branches of the T.F.F. made representation to their local Federal Representative. This could help speed matters - I hope so.

DIET AND YOUR CHILDREN'S TEETH

Diet can affect teeth in two ways - Systemic and Local. Teeth start to form in the 7th week of pregnancy and the crowns of all permanent molars, except the "Wisdom teeth", are completed by the age of 8 years. So a well balanced diet, necessary for the formation of the dental hard tissues, must be had by the expectant mother and the child. Thus the systemic dietary influence is confined mainly to the first 8 years of life.

Probably the most significant dietary element which may have a systemic influence is Fluoride. It has been clearly shown that dental decay can be reduced by up to 60% when the fluoride content of the local water supply is adjusted to one part per million. It would appear that fluoride has its greatest influence during the period of tooth formation. If the local water supply is not fluorised, it is strongly advised that all expectant mothers and children should take fluoride in the form of tablets.  $\frac{1}{2}$  tablet daily for infants up to 12 months, and 1 tablet daily for expectant mothers and older children.

Following the eruption of teeth, any influence the diet may have on the teeth is principally a local one. It is now thought that dental decay is a locally destructive process initiated by acid attacks on the surface enamel, the acids being produced by oral bacteria (which normally exist in the mouth) attacking sugar, so that the following factors would appear to have special significance.

Prolonged use of a comforter bottle containing sweetened fluids, especially at night, can have disastrous effects on the "baby" teeth of many children.

Sweets, certainly before school age, can and should be limited, and in particular should not be given between meals. To give a child a daily allowance to spend on sweets is both economically unsound and, for many children the beginning of a long and unnecessarily painful battle to keep their own teeth.

Sticky foods such as toffees, chocolates and cordials should be kept to a minimum. Children should be encouraged to eat a well-balanced diet, ending meals where possible with an apple, piece of celery or carrot.

OUR TIGER IS NOT EXTINCT

During recent weeks Tasmanian tigers have been sighted in the New Norfolk area, on our own East Coast and only a week ago at Mawbanna in Circular Head.

Honey producer Mr. Denny Atkins sighted and photographed a tiger near some hives he had positioned in the bush south of Mawbanna. The photograph has been sent to the Animal and Birds Protection Board.

There is an increasing number of reliable sightings being reported and the time could be approaching when either by accident or design a tiger will be captured.

If this occurs, it is planned to release the animal on the new Maria Island Sanctuary.

There is opposition in some quarters regarding the capture of a tiger. This, however, appears to be the policy of the Animal and Birds Protection Board, which conducts expeditions into "tiger country" and has issued capture permits to approved private bushman.

And when a capture is made, the world will know that while we exterminated our aborigines and our emus, we have not exterminated our tiger.

BEN LOMOND SKIING RESERVE

Ben Lomond this year has seen one of the best skiing and winter sports seasons for many years - in fact there is still skiable snow lying on the slopes and, with any luck, it may last until Christmas.

This area, being the highest developed winter recreation reserve in Tasmania, offers better slopes, longer runs, better facilities and more interesting snow conditions than any other part of the state and it is only 40 miles from Ringal, right to the top of the mountain.

Even if you can't ski, the children will have a marvellous time in the snow.

'IN THE EYE OF THE LAW.' With the present interests in road safety and the current drive to make our roads safe to use, it should be realised that a very important part of this subject is the condition of the vehicles we use on the roads, and one aspect of this is the maintenance and general condition of the tyres, and this is often neglected.

The law requires that there will be a tread pattern on every part of the tyre that normally comes in contact with the road surface. Do not be mistaken in thinking that a tyre has to be bald before an offence is committed.

For safety's sake, it is in the interests of the driver and his passenger that, the vehicle being driven should have good tyres that do an efficient job of holding the road etc. and assist when stopping, especially in an emergency.

A driver can expect to be stopped at any time by police patrols and road checks, but we would emphasise that we prefer to see good, safe tyres being used, than have to prosecute the driver for using defective tyres.

 Did you know that:

1. If you own a dog and fail to prevent it being at large or under the immediate custody and control of some competent person, you are liable to a fine of \$30.

Did you know that:

2. Between sunset and sunrise a dog must be either chained up, securely shut in, or under the close and continuous control of a competent person. Penalty for failing to do this is \$30.

Did you know that:

3. You are liable to a fine of \$30 if you keep a dog over four months old without registering it.

Did you every know that:

4. You are liable to a fine of \$40 (or one month's imprisonment) if you abandon a dog when vacating any premises on which you have kept that dog.

Did you know that:

5. You are liable to a fine of \$40 or one month's imprisonment if you set or leave a dog at large with the intent to abandon it.

Did you know that:

6. You are liable to a fine of \$12 if you allow your bitch to be at large if she is on heat.

NOTE: A careless owner who commits several of these offences on one occasion is liable to a separate additional fine under each section.

GARDENING HINT - As a deterrent to wilt and collar-rot, two diseases which sometimes attack zinnias, stocks and asters, causing them to die suddenly, when they have grown to flowering stage. Apply Condys Crystals (potassium permanganate) frequently at the rate of 3 teaspoonfuls to 2 gallons of water. Keep the surface well cultivated to aerate it and further deter soil fungus which causes wilt and collar-rot.
