EDITORIAL


On Monday last the Premier of Tarm nia proclaimed his acceptance of the Prime Minister's offer of Federal money on a dollar for dollar basis for this State. No doubt, after two long months of waiting, farmers will welcome the first signs of realistic aid to come their way.

However, this paper waits with reservation till all the facts emerge. The first jarring note has already come with talkof set time limits (eight years) and set interest rates (3 per cent). is ernestly hoped these basics are not strictly adhered to. For although it may be well within the capacity of one farmer to accept these conditions and repay without trouble it most certainly will not in all cases. The recent Dairy Farmers' Relief Bill is already proving this; where many of the Dairy Farmers who are now faced with a second short, unproductive season and a decreasing repayment time are already in fear of their TWO STAFF MEMBERS having a look at Bruny ability to repay.

Mr. E. Mills, State President of the Tasmanian Farmers' Federation, has already expressed doubts about a "strings attached loan". We endorse his doubts whole heartedly. The last thing farmers will want are strict conditions attached to any money. Again, the Dairy Farmers' Bill is the epitomy of this. The recipient of the loan is not even allowed to handle his loan money at all. All payments are made by the Agricultural B ank on behalf of the farmer, direct to his debtors.

Why farmers must be treated as potential dishonest idiots is beyond comprehension. What other loans outside farming carry such iniquitous conditions? It is also beyond comprehension why Mr. Reece has not offered some worthwhile freight concessions for fodder and agisted stock as this appears to be the most pressing interim relief that could have been offered to the formers during the long weeks of political debate, and the one to cost the State the least.

It becomes abundantly clear that in any future crisis the slow grinding of the Government Machinery must be speeded up, and the best way to accomplish this seems a louder and stronger Farming Voice.

For Mr. Payne's benefit we will endeavour to answer them. The St. Marys Ambulance is operated by the St. Marys Red Cross Branch, and serves St. Marys, Fingal, Mathinna, Mangana, Scamander, Falmouth, Gray, Seymour and occasionally Bicheno.

It is maintained mainly by house to house collection in the above named districts and is absolutely free to the patient, whether the patient has been a donor or not.

The use of the ambulance is authorized as follows:

- 1. It can be ordered by any medical practitioner who might have a case needing ambulance service in the district.
- 2. By the Matron of the St. Marys District Hospital and in her absence, by the Sister-or one of the Retarded Childrens' Schools in-Charge.
- 3. By the Police in case of an emergency. The only condition being that it must be an ambulance (or stretcher) case.

No member of the local Red Cross Committee can authorize the use of the ambulance.

In the case quoted by Mr. Payne, the St. Marys doctor (Dr. Lawson) could not order the ambulance as the lady in question was not one of his patients, and he would not know whether the ambulance was necess- Sir, ary or not, and generally the average

HERITAGE CORNER THE NAMING OF BICHENO.

About the year 1803 and possibly earlier, sealers and whalers used Waub's Boat Harbour, as Bicheno was then known, as shelter for their boats. The name Waub's Harbour is believed to have come from its connection with Waubedebar, an aboriginal woman, whose fenced grave is found in the camping ground near the Motel. The inscription reads - "Here lies Waubedebar, a female aborigine of Van Dieman's Land, died June 1832 aged 40 years - erected in her memory by a few of her white friends." Later the area was known as the Old Fishery,

In 1854 Bichene was established as a coal mining port taking the name in memory of Mr. James Ebenezer Bicheno who died in Hobart in 1851. James Bicheno was the popular Colonial Secretary of Van Dioman's Land from 1843 until his death. He was born in England and is described as a cultured, fat, short, good-tempered men, a Fellow of the Royal Society, of the Apply C. Royle, St. Marys. Linear Society and of the Geographical Society. He bequeathed his extensive library of 2500 books to the people of Tasmania and thus formed the nucleus of the first Tesmanian Public Library,

HEALTH NOTES

FOOD POISONING IN THE WARM SUMMER MONTHS.

The Australian Medical Journal warned last week of the danger of food poisoning from deep-frozen poultry, Dr. Anderson said that inadequate thawing of frozen poultry resulted in imperfect cocking and the survival of bacteria which multiplied enormously during the cooling period. The organisms produce a toxin which causes severe illness four to six hours after eating. Therefore, never cook poultry unless completely thawed. Leave the poultry in the plastic bag to thaw in the storage section of the refrigerator overnight. If it is impossible to remove the little plastic bag containing giblets, neck, etc., from the inside, then the bird has not thawed out properly. After the bird has thaved, remove the bag containing giblets and pourvery hot water inside the bird to scald thoroughly. The poultry is then ready to cook in the normal way.

Meat: Pork must be thaved out completely before cooking. Other meats may or may not society, become more polite, more socially be thaved out according to personal preference.

Fish: Allow to stand wrapped in its plastic bag for 5-6 hours until soft. Wash in salted cold water.

If poultry, meat fish or any deepfrozen foods do thaw out, then use them immediately, without refreezing.

When defrosting the refrigerator, do not let the deep-frozen foods thaw. Defrost at the coolest time of the day. Wrap all deep-frozen food in several layers of newspaper. This will hold the food in its frozen state for an hour or so.

THE CHIMNEY STAKES

In six weeks time your children will be leaving a glass of milk and a piece of cake for Santa. But what sort of toys will Santa bring?

Toys for young children should be chosen with great care and should be suited to the age of the child. Some toys are designed to be educational (e.g. certain types of building blocks). These are good, but the 'kids' need and like other types of toys.

Perhaps the best gift for a toddler is a soft easily washed cuddly toy, which is small enough to be hugged and carried easily. But it should not have any removable parts such as buttons used for eyes, which could be bitten off and swallowed. Some toys have sharp pointed parts which stick out (e.g. pointed ears on plastic toys). They can injure the child's eyes, so should be avoided.

For a 3 or 4 year old girl, a doll is an ideal gift; not a big doll, but a small cuddly one which can be nursed and dressed. During these pre-school days, children copy their parents and to help them sweep and cook like Mum or hammer or cut grass like Dad, a toy stove, a toy lawnmover, a baby in a cot or a carpenter's set are good gifts. Make sure these toys are not dangerous no sharp edges or points. Toy distributors fortunately closely supervise the type of toy they sell, but occasionally a dangerous type of toy may escape notice. The final responsibility for the type of toy given to a child rests with the giver.

If you are diving books, choose picture books for the child of 2, pictures h stories for the 5 year old and books without pictures for the 10 year old.

The primary schoolchild's play becomes more adventurous and he likes cowboy and Indian suits, guns and outfits used by T.V. heroes and heroines such as "Girl from Uncle".

Children like to be "with it" and toys and play equipment advertised on T.V. are usually the gifts they want.

If you have a large family, perhaps you could give them one big present such as climbing bars, a swing or a pool; but these are expensive gifts and the children should be made to understand their value and be encouraged to look after them.

Of course you could waste a lot of time choosing your gifts; there are some fascinating toys in the shops this year. Blast!!! My rocket's disappeared.

COMMENT by A.B.L. - HOBART

Tasmania's political climate in many ways is similar to our geographical climate: heavily timbered and unique in Australia.

Perhaps one of the most unique features of Tasmanian Government and Politics is our Legislative council. This nineteen century conservative buttress against radical legislation has been brought to attention once again by recent efforts to restrict its power.

Any member of the council has distinction of being one of the nineteen members who make up the strangest Legislative Councils in Australia. This Upper House has even greater powers than the House of Lords for it has the power to amend money bills.

Most people by tradition accept the idea that the Legislative Council is a necessary part of our parliament, yet the reasons for its existence are very few and are usually not in a democratic tradition.

Some members of the Council believe that the Upper House provides the means by which minorities may approach and receive just attention from Parliament. The argument is usually advanced, also that individual members unfettered by party restrictions can exercise more scrutiny of Legislation than do party members who have to "toe" the party line. A few members of the Council also believe that reforms should be brought into increase the franchise. At the moment the Upper House is elected on a restricted franchise, based on property thus accounting for about 75% of the population.

These reasons which are adding meaning to a traditional attitude for the retention of the Council are hardly substantially based on demonratic principles. All the members of the Council are representatives and the interests they represent are usually minority interests. The situation then arises, as it has on many occasions, whereby representatives of minorities control legislation proposed by a party, representing a majority. This is a totally undemocratic position.

Historically the Legislative
Council has acted in one of 3 ways to
proposed Legislation. It lets inoffensive BY MONDAY PRIOR TO PUBLICATION.
Legislation through, or it picks the eye
out of legislation which is disliked,
but

but which the Government may be said to have strong public support for, or finally it blocks any Legislation which is considered to be detrimental to property interests and not overwhelmingly supported by public mainion.

There is no democratically valid reasons for keeping the Legislative Council. Any of the proce dural matters with which it involves itself could be or are procedures already dealt with by the House of Assembly.

Perhaps the great number of candidates for the last 9 borrugh electin can be read as a sign that people want a change in the Legislative Council, or perhaps it was just an indication of the most bureaurcracised city in Australia (apart from Canberra where $\frac{1}{3}$ of the population work for the Government.

IN THE EYE OF THE LAW.

Whenever a motorist is reported for an offence concerning a motor vehicle on a public road or is involved in an accident or road check by police, he is asked to produce his driver's licence to the police officer concerned.

The driver of a motor vehicle is required by law to carry his driving licence with him at all times when driving a vehicle on a road and to produce it on demand. Road checks on motor vehicles have revealed that very often the driver cannot produce his licence because he does not carry it with him.

The privilege of having seven days to produce a driving licence is only extended to a driver who has a reasonable excuse for not having that licence with him at the time of demand. To avoid the possibility of prosecution for this offence, be safe; carry your driver's licence with you at all times when driving a vehicle on a road.
