EDITORIAL

The Casino - Yes or No. It seems a simple decision; yet is it? In contentious issues such as this many voters are often swayed by the emotional rather than cold, hard facts. And in the summing up of the two cases, as published in the Press, emotion is dished up by the bucketful. These two cases, for and against are often conflicting and misleading. For instance in the "Yes" case, it is stated unconditionally by those concerned, that the casino will only be an appendage to the main business of an international standard hotel complex. It is stated unless the hotel is built there will not be a casino.

Equally as adamant the "No" case tells us that the proposed agreement for a casino does not provide with certainty the construction of a hotel at all. With this little problem in mind the voter could be forgiven if he slowly drowns in the mish-mash of words that further pad out this impasse.

Again the "Yes" case tells us with bounding enthusiasm about a booming tourist traffic and a multi-million increase in revenue. And slanting diagonally across this, the "Noes" darkly proclaim a drain-day and the fact that there are children ing of the State's revenue.

These are the "facts" of the case, when the assumptions creep in the going really gets wild. The "Noes" begin by telling us of social problems and people (other people, mind you) who need protection from the temptations of gambling and the ensuing disasters of broken homes. Then as a grand finale (supported by Lord knowsvill be no need to mention it further what facts) they then proceed to flap a

regular army of criminals and undesirables in our faces.

With equal enthusiasm the Yes's literally cascade us with wild promises of international fame that will not only benefit Hobart but the North also and the East and West and every other hidden corner of Tasmania. To prove this point they state, rather smugly, that it is so because senior Treasury officials (who are apparently omniscient) have done a thorough investigation. Just as gloriously they then proceed to solve the morality problem by insisting no poker machines or persons under twenty one will be allowed in the casino.

After careful digestion of both cases, one can be forgiven in thinking he has just waded through a sickly slice of pink meringue with lemon filling. The only

THE NAMING OF GOULD'S COUNTRY. Gould's Country was named after Charles Gould, who toiled through the hills and valleys of this area in the 1860's. He was an accomplished geologist and a fearless explorer. Charles Gould was a son of John Gould "The Bird Man" who, accompanied by his wife and sons Henry and John Gilbert, came out from England to Tasmania in 1838. John Gould's name is associated not only with the islands bird life, but with early days of Hobart Town. His headquarters were at Government House, in Macquarie St., and it was there that his youngest son, named Franklin after the Governor, was born. Charles Gould graduated B.A. while still a young man and was appointed Government Geologist of Tasmania. Soon afterwards he commenced exploring mountain ranges and rivers of the island. In 1862, he was lost during an expedition to the West Coast, where he discovered gold. A born bushman, he found his way out of unknown country and returned to Hobart Town. Late in life he spent some time in China. Then South America lured him, but his travels were nearly over - he died in Argentina.

ECONOMICAL SMALL-SIZE CHRISTMAS PUDDING.

4 ozs butter or substitute, 4 tabs. golden syrup, 2 cups S.R. Flour, 1 teas. mixed spice, 1 teas. bi-carb. soda, 1 cup warm milk, pinch salt, 1 cup mixed fruit.

Cream butter or substitute with syrup and spice until soft and fluffy. Fold in chopped mixed fruit alternately with sifted flour and salt. Dissolve soda in the warm milk , fold into fruit mixture. Fill into small greased pudding basin; cover; steam 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. May be served immediately, or resteam 1 hour on day of serving.

BRANDY CUSTARD

To serve with pudding. 1 cup milk, 1 egg (separated), 2 tabs sugar, 1 dest. cornflour, 1 tab. brandy. Blend cornflour, sugar and egg yolk with a little milk. Place remaining milk in saucepan; bring to boil, stirring in cornflour etc. Return to heat; boil 2 minutes. Cool slightly. Whip egg white until stiff, lightly fold into cool custard with Brandy

MOCK HAM

1 pumped leg of lamb, Boil 20 minutes for each pound, then leave to cool. May be served with Aspic Sauce or a fruit glaze. Fruit Glaze. $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar, 1 teas. mixed spice, $\frac{1}{2}$ teas. powdered cloves, 3 tabs. any fruit juico.

Boil rapidly for 10 minutes and pour over lamb while glaze is still hot. with cloves. ASPIC SAUCE

Make a thick white butter sauce, flavour with chicken stock, mustard, lemon juice. Allow to cool. Blend a 4 ozs pkt. creamed cheese. Add 1 dessertspoon of dissolved gelatine. Pour over leg of lamb just before setting. Decorate with carnations, petals, mint leaves and spring onions.

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
