#### EDITORIAL

THE SOCIAL ROUND-A-BOUT.


The lack of industry in the Fingal Valley must often be a source of amazement to the tourist who passes through. He would probably reason that this valley (except for some timber activities) was a rural community, or at least had a rural core. This is not strictly true. If he were told, that in the forty mile stretch from Conara to St. Marys he could almost count the number of separately owned holdings on his fingers, he would undoubtedly be more amazed.

The amount of people employed by coal is insignificant. The timber also has only a minimal employment force and this variable. Alright then what  $d_0$  we do? What is our major industry? The answer is public service; education, transport, P.M.G., Hydro, health, public works, forestry and after them all you can add dept. or commission. Our industries are a social round-a-bout; each serving the other. The best that can be said of it is its security. The worst that can be said is its future. What of the children at school now? This system transports them over public works roads to the schools. It makes phones available, it keeps them warm and looks after them when they are sick. The only thing it does not do is employ them. So our children leave; and often at a stage not suited to face the complexities of city life.

The population decreases, the public services diminish accordingly ad infititum...

Unfortunately this ever decreasing circle also applies to the modern trends in agriculture. A trend to larger holdings, increased mechanisation and less employment.

What this valley needs is new industry, primary and secondary. For instance an expansion of our fishing potential, fish canning works, vegetable processing works, chip industries. Ultimately it will be our responsibility to progress; but at the moment we need imaginative backing at a Govt. level. With this end in view, it is the obligation of each citizen in these districts to clamour as loudly and as long as necessary.

#### THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH STUDY TOUR.

The Duke of Edinburgh Tour has come and gone. On Wednesday 22nd, a group from this paper managed to track the representatives down at Tatlow's Hotel. Some of them appeared tired, but rallied admirably when faced with a barrage of questions on how they found this Valley and Tasmania in general etc.

Experts in their fields, and we suspect their main field in this case, was the art of asking questions we, the interviewers, soon became the interviewed. We filled them into the best of our ability, regarding local conditions etc.

Later, there was a dinner for about eighty people, all men, invited by the Council. We were assured this was so, as wives usually reiterate their husbands opinions and it would avoid a double-up in conversation. We were also assured a fair cross section of the community (not counting women of course) had been invited, but as we were unable to enter the dining room, we shall take the Fingal Council's word for it.

The following day, 23rd, the Tour went to Mr. Bill Newman's saw-mill at Fingal, the Forestry Headquarters' and lunched at the St. Mary's High School. The Home-Arts, under the able guidance of Mrs. Ramshaw, gave them an admirable lunch.

Here they met teachers and a few other local dignatories, among them Matron Simpson, the first invited woman guest.

The Tour of this district was ended after a trip to Cornwall, where the delegates met several ex-miners.

From the recent Duke of Edinburgh Study Tour, several strange facts emerged, but surely the strangest and most singular, was the lack of women present at functions to meet the representatives of the Study Group.

In the Fingal Municipality there must be several thousand people and it is logical to suppose half these people are women. Yet, when a group from various Commonwealth countries arrive here to talk, assess and measure the effects of industrialisation (or lack of) on the life and existence of the people of our Valley, apparently only the male half, are capable of the ability to express themselves coherently.

This, of course, is nonsense.

Women have been vitally effected
by the changing conditions in the Valley.
And because they have been so effected,
consequently their children have been.

There are not many women in positions of authority in this district even in the business world, but there are a number of active and vocal house wives, who, given the opportunity, would have been glad to fill in the Study Group.

The Tour Delegates themselves, expressed this opinion and asked the reason why. It seems a pity the authorities who arranged the itinerary, did

Recent interest in the Opening of the BATMAN BRIDGE brings to mind John Batman's Association with the early settlement of this valley. He had a property at the foot of Ben Lomond and led a roving party engaged in conciliating, capturing and at times destroying the aborigines who harassed the early settlers. He also won fame in 1826 for his capture of Matthew Brady, the bushranger.

John Batman was described as "tall and powerful and a fine bushman."

One account tells of how he and his family and friends climbed to the summit of Ben Lomond on New Years Eve, 1833 to watch the sun rise on 1834, the year which was to see the birth of a city - Melbourne.



AN ANSWER TO OUR EMPLOYMENT SITUATION
PROPOSED CHIP INDUSTRY Representitive
of Tasmanian Chip Industries met with
many local residents in bt. Marys on
Wednesday night. Mr. Fitzallen is doing
an assessment in the Fingal Valley, East
Coast and North East areas. Mr. Fitzallen said the most amazing thing to come
out of his survey was the potential of
the timber in these districts. He said
he felt certain that when the figures were
known to his company a chip industry would
be established somewhere in these districts.
At this point timber for chips would be
sent to northern outlet ports.

Locals present asked what chance there was of chipping plants being established on the east coast. Mr.Fenton, the chairman of Tasmanian Chip Industrics, told those present that even though it was still too early to make any definite statement he considered that there was every possibility of this happening in the not so distant future.

Mr. E. Tucker, from St. Helens
stated that if this was so the case for
a port of the east coast had now increased
three fold. A local committee was
elected to further these aims. Mr. N.
Lohrey will be chairman and Mr. B.

a chip industry here could revitalize

#### MR. D. WARDLAW.

Mr. D. Wardlaw, who died on 2C l. May last, at the St.Marys District Hospital, had lived all his life at Chain of Lagoons. He was the third generation of Wardlaws to run Polworth sheep on the property, which was pioneered by his grandfather in 1861.

Mr. Wardlaw (or Doug, as he was affectionally known to the whole district) 2. was a keen sportsman from his earliest youth. He first showed promise in the athletic field while at the Hutchins School, where he was a keen rower. 3.

From the time he left school in 1923 until the early 30's, he represented the State in a number of matches against the English cricket Test Team. He was a hard hitting batsman and a distinguished bowler.

He also played with the St.Marys Rovers, and was a keen golfer for many years.

Mr. Wardlaw, who will also be remembered as a member of the Masonic Lodge, Carrington, is survived by his wife and four sons, Michael, Anthony, Christopher and Timothy.

## MR. ARTHUR LEGGE.

Mr. Arthur Legge, who died on 20th. May last, was aged 61 years. For many years, Mr. Legge managed one of the oldest grazing properties in the State, Cullenswood.

His great-grandfather, Robert Vincent Legge, arrived from England in 1827. After several years, during which time he lived in a hollow tree and was in constant fear of attack from natives and bushrangers, he laid the foundations of the present Cullenswood House.

Robert Vincent Legge, like his great-grandson Arthur Legge, was a man of great charity and was sincerely interested in the Church.

Arthur Legge was educated at the Launceston Church of England Grammar School. He was very interested in radio and photography and with Captain Bailey Of Scamander worked in building radio controlled model boats.

Mr. Legge lived in Hobart until 1945, when on the death of his father, he moved back to Cullenswood where he took over the property. He leaves a widow and one son, Robert.

### HEALTH NOTES.

THE YOUNG TRAVELLER.

The problem of travelling with children is of interest to all parents. Some fortunate people have had no personal experiences of car sickness in children and the following hints may prove useful.

1. The mention of the word 'sickness' by adults and children should be absolutely forbidden.

2. The car should be stopped whenever one of the passengers starts to yawn, perspire, cough or become pale, and everyone gets out to stretch their legs.

3. All 'protective' equipment, such as bowls, towels, newspapers, etc. are kept handy but out of sight.

4. A light meal (e.g. boiled egg) should be taken about one hour before setting off and an anti-sickness pill, while apples and glucose sweets may be eaten en route,

5. Jumping around in the car or trying to focus on objects flashing by the car windows should be discouraged.

6. The driver should try to avoid sudden acceleration or braking. It is changes in speed or rhythm which predispose to mal-de-motor.

7. The car should be kept at an even temperature - pleasantly cool but not too draughty.




