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EDITORIAL.

No doubt during the tour the Premier will notice differences in this valley. He and Mr. Fagan could not help to observe the sleepiness that has engulfed this area. They will also note the many empty houses, a mute testimony of those who have left for want of employment.


This paper does not intend to debate the complex reasons for this lack of prosperity, nor does it intend to drag up the past glories of coal; but it does insist that something MUST be done if this valley is to keep pace with the rest of Tasmania's expanding prosperity. The people in this area are sick of depressed conditions and most of them believe they live in the most neglected part of the State. Labels like 'Forgotten Valley' are commonplace.

Up till now there has been little else (other than a thermal power plant perhaps) that could have been done. There is little profit in creating an industry in an area when a dozen other areas are more suitable for transport, port facilities, etc. Heither is there real justification for the erection of a port in the hope that industries will gather around it. But when the prospect of an industry evolves of its own accord because the area is inately suitable, then it is time for an imaginative government to encourage it to the full.

Thus is the newly emerging Chip Industry and with it a real and valid reason for a port complex to cope. Chip interests have already contracted to supply timber from these areas, and the cheapest and most desirable way is to ship out of an East Coast port. To this district, such an enterprise would mean an increased work force of several hundreds earning better than average wages, and consequently a prospering community. To Mr. Reece a contented people would mean more votes.

These will be the vital points Mr. Reece will have to ponder on the 13th. and his conclusions could well be decided by the amount of interest we are willing to show.

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At the recent Child Health Annual Meeting and Dinner, Mrs. V. Berriman, the State President of Child Health in Tasmania, said the St, Marys and Fingal Child Committee was the most active in Tasmania. No other Committee she said, had spent a total of \$2134.22 in one year. The Committee was to be congratulated, not only on having raised the money, but using it in such a manner. The year's expenditure, which included furnishing and equipping Council rooms at Fingal to be used as a Clinic, as well as general maintenance (which included gardening, cleaning, electricity, phone, etc.) for the St. Marys clinic, new furniture and fittings, etc.

Probably the most useful and necessary single item purchased this financial year was a 16 M.H. Projector and screen, which had been used on an average of three times a week. The Clinic Sister has given lectures to the Mursing Aides at the District Hospital, and ante-natal classes several times a week. The projector in this field has proved invaluable.

HERITAGE CORNER

ROSSARDEN

Situated in a valley at the foot of Ben Lomond is the township of Rossarden named after Rossarden in Scotland, the home town of the late Major Spiers, one of the first Directors of Aberfoyle Mines.

Aberfoyle also derives its name from Scotland.+

Rossarden is rich in tin, the ore being discovered by mere chance after the late Mr. Charles Cheshire of Mangana had prospected for many years. The lease was taken over by Messrs. P. Shepherd, L. Haas, and B. Lawson. They luckily discovered the lode at the foot of a tree which had blown over in a storm. This was in 1926; but it was not until 1932 that the mine started production. The first manager was Mr. W. Hitchcock, remembered by the men as having the ability to work in any section of the

The township of Posgarden was then founded - Aberfoyle Mines building homes for the men and their families. Most amenities can be found here - Stores, School, Churches, Medical Centre, Recreation Oval and a nine hole Golf Course.

Rossarden at the moment is one of the bright spots in the Fingal Valley, employing a large number of men from the surrounding townships, and with the expansion programme planned by Aberfoyle Holdings, the future looks bright.



CARE OF THE FLET

One pair of feet! And how much work they do! Do you really care for these precious objects or are you one of many people showing tired facial lines due to aching feet?

Shoes are important. It is much better to pay more for a well made shoe than to hastily buy a "bargain". A cheap shoe doesn't last long, and without correct support, the foot soon becomes tired. Your toes must have ample room to "wiggle", and your arches and heels should have firm support. Loose flapping slippers will also endanger your foot muscles, so choose your slippers carefully.

Walking through sand with bare feet is an excellent exercise for foot muscles.

Keep your feet and legs warm in winter to prevent ugly blemishes, thickened legs and chilblains. Bathe your feet daily, taking care to dry thoroughly between the toes. If you have hard painful corns and callouses, visit a Chiropodist to have them treated, then take adequate care to prevent them recurring by wearing correctly fitted

Socks and stockings are also important. They should not be too small or they will cramp the toes. They should be changed daily, and thrown away when they become hard or shrunken through washing. Thick darns will cause corns and callouses. CARE OF THE TOE NAILS - Prior to cutting your nails, soak your feet in hot water, then cut the nails STRAIGHT across and short. 7th. August, a son - Richard Andrew. Do not cut down the sides of the nail as this will lead to an ingrowing toenail which can be very painful.


