AS IT WAS

Arising from the report in the last issue of V.V. it was thought some of the younger readers might be interested in a few details of the workings of the Hospital in its early stages.

Electricity was not brought to St.Marys until about 1930-31, so the Hospital had to depend on its own lighting plant. For cooking there was a fuel stove in the kitchen, and for laundry use there was

a fuel copper. Wards relied on open fireplaces for heat,

The staff consisted of Matron and Sister with two probationers, a domestic staff of two plus a "yard boy" to see to fires, wood, etc. When the cook was off duty either the matron or sister took over that work. Salaries ranged from £2-10-0 (\$5.00) downwards, and fees were 7/6d (75 cents) per day, and even this sum was beyond the range of many patients. Bad debts plagued the treasurer at all times. Fund raising by the Ladies Committee was absolutely essential to keep the Hospital open, and all monies raised went straight into Hospital funds.

The three main events were a Garden Fete in the lovely grounds of Cullenswood House, a Ball, and a Fair. For the Fete the Ladies' Committee worked hard to stock stalls and provide afternoon tea, and the Board of Management members (12) arranged

a sports programme.

The Ball was looked on as "The Ball of the Year" and for 7/6 (75 cents) a man and partner enjoyed dancing to the music of either the St. Marys Orchestra, or the Cornwall Orchestra. Tickets were also issued for 5/- (50 cents) for men, and 3/- (30 cents)for ledles . These prices included a delicious home made supper. which was served upstairs. The venue : for the Ball was Todd's Hall. In the early days the tea and coffee was made from water boiled in kerosene tins over an open fire at one end of the supper room, It also served to warm the supper room. It also entailed making quite sure there was always a man available to stoke the fire and keep an eye or the boiling water.

The Hospital Fair usually provided a big boost to funds and over the two days up to £300/-/- (\$600-00) could be raised. When one considers that at the time the basic wage was less than \$6.00 per week it will



be realised that a lot of solid work went into the effort. "Morning Coffees" and street stalls were not in vogue then, so funds came from dances, social evenings, card evenings and raffles. For these functions the usual charge was 1/- (10 cents) and supper provided by organisers. However the years of Depression passed and the Government became more generous towards the Hospital, thus relieving the Ladies Committee of its burden.

The Committee was changed to an Auxiliary

The Committee was changed to an Auxiliary as it is now and the funds were no longer needed to keep the Hospital open. Now the money is used to buy extra equipment to give the Hospital staff, patients and visitors many of the extras the Government does not supply.

CALL FOR CLEAR STATEMENT ON FINGAL RAIL LINK

On the 21 July, 1977 Mr. George Shaw M.L.C. challenged the Federal Minister for Transport Mr. Nixon to make a clear statement on the upgrading of the Fingal rail line.

The reply came from the Acting Minister for Transport and is as follows:-

'Dear Mr. Shaw,

I refer to your recent letter to Mr. Nixon concerning the Fingal railway line.

The Commonwealth Government has now accepted the report on the Tasmanian Rail System submitted by the Committee of Inquiry chaired by Dr. Stewart Joy. This report envisages the continued operation of the Fingal line, and in fact recommends that substantial rehabilitation work be carried out on the line.

It is proposed that the programe for rehabilitation of the Tasmanian railways be resumed this financial year. This is however conditional upon the Tas. Government entering into a formal agreement with the Commonwealth, concerning the preference for rail in State road transport regulations. In the meantime, the Australian National Railways is preparing, for Mr. Nixon's approval, detailed plans for the rehabilitation of the Tasmanian railways, based on the Joy report.



FROM THE VALLEY TO THE MOUNTAIN

Want something to do, well pack a picnic basket and head for the snow. You may ask where? Well Ben Lomond of course. We leave St. Marys at 8.00am and travel to Evandale where we take a gravel road to the Blessington Road. After a short time we turn off to the right and are at Last on the Ben Lomond Road which at this stage is only rising gradually. Within a few kilomatres we are fighting to keep the car in the muddy grooves, it is not always as bad as this all the time and the road is rarely the same The road is getting worse so we stop at Carr Villa and put on our snow chains. The handling of the car is better now but caution is still needed. As we reach the rangers hut, about one kilometre from Carr Villa, we read the Notice Board and the ranger advises chains from ' a on and the Rule is to obey what the ranger says as he knows the road better than most. Two miles later we arrive at Jackobs Ladder and have second thoughts about tackling it but the idea of a challenge wins through and up we go winding back and forth across the face of the ladder. We sigh of relief on the plateau and wonder how in 1971 a bus which was laden with 30 sets of shis negotiated the sharp hairpin bends. This bus was parked in the village and hired sijs out to participants in this sport. On reaching the village we make our way to the ski rental lodge which was only built in 1976 and has come a long way from the bus of 30 skis because to our surprise they cater for over 500 people. The first season saw approximately 100 people on the slopes now approximately 1000 people venture out to the slopes, per day.

In the ski rental lodge we find 6 permanent staff and 8 casual staff. This does not include the tow operators as they are a separate organisation. On hiring the sids we decide to take a lesson from the professionals. 1976 was the first year to have international instructors, one from U.S.A. and one from New Zealand. This year, 1977,

they have increased with a Tasmanian instructor as well.

This ritual over we are let lose to tackle the poma tows. It looks easy e enough but looks are not everything as we find out. After many attempts and falling off within three feet of getting on, one tends to feel depressed but determination proves out and finallly we make it to the top of the Beginners tow. There are now two rope tows and four pomaŝa The poma tows were started in 1974.

On enquiring we find that this is the highest developed ski field in Tasmania. Apart from normal Alpine skiing there is a great potential for cross country (Nordic) skiing.

May I add that 1971 was not the begining of skiing in the area as prior to this there were two rope tows working beloning to the N.T.A.C. who have been active in the area for some years.

While skiing on the slopes I noticed that the ages of the participants varied greatly. Skishave been rented to $3\frac{1}{2}$ year olds t and as old as 70 year old.

Come 1.00pm we are getting hungry so we ski down to the lodge for something to eat. It is essential to eat to keep up our energy which in turn produces heat. After lunch it's back to the slopes. The tows close approximately 4.00pm and we are all sad to leave but with the thought that next week we may be able to return snow providing.

TASTY RECTA

SHERRIED CHICKEN CASSEROLE

You require: 31b chicken, loz cornflour, salt and pepper, 2 tbls. corn oil, 1 onion sliced, 3 carrots sliced One 24 oz can tomato puree, 1 chicken stock cube, 1 pint water, 4 tbls. sherry.

Skin and joint the chicken. Coat with the corn flour to which have been added the salt and pepper. Heat the corn oil. Add the joints and fry on both sides. Remove to a casserole. Add the onion and carrots to the pan and fry lightly. Stir in the tomato puriee stock cube and any remaining cornflour. Add the water and sherry and bring to the boil, stirring. Pour over the chicken in the casserole. Cover and cook in the oven, Mark 3, 335° for 1½ hours, serve in a rice ring. Serves 4 - 6.
