### EDITORIAL

Two meetings were held last week one at Fingal and the other at St.Helens, as part of the North-East Recreation Study. The Study is being undertaken by the Tamar Regional Master Planning bAuthority for the State Government's Division of Recreation, and the Northern Organisation of Councils. The Study region corresponds approximately with the 003 telephone district.

The aim of last weeks meetings was to work out when possible solutions to the district's recreation problems identified at meetings held at Fingal and St. Helens in August. All meetings were attended by a range of people from different parts of either the Fingal Valley, or the St. Helens - Pyengana - Scamander area.

The main result of the Fingal meeting was that it was decided to set up a Valley committee to apply for funds from the Community Youth Support Scheme to em ploy someone to carry out a survey of the needs of young people in the valley, and also to initiate youth activities for a trial period. Rev. Allan Colyer was chosen as chairman. The committee will be publizing their activities through the Valley Voice.

Another result from the meeting was related to the lack of outside stimulation from sports coaches, arts/crafts tutors etc. It was pointed out that the Div. of Recreations! Northern Regional Office would be able to help in finding suitable visitors, and arranging for them to come to the Valley to help local groups It was decided that the existance and role of the Division should be publicized so that people would know how it could help, and how it could be contacted. Therefore a sheet will be produced to provide this information and will be available to the local community from Branch Libraries, the Council Chambers, and Post Office.

The main result of the meeting at St. Helen's was that it was decided to set up a local committee whose task would be to seek, receive research and process suggestions or ideas from the districts sporting and recreation clubs, or from indiviuals, about liesure problems or opportunities in the listrict.

David Reid was chosen to be in charge of the committee. The committee will be publicizing its function and asking for submissions soon.

The problem of lack of activities for young people was discussed, but it was decided to wait and see what ideas or suggestions relating to this problem were received by the new committee.

Three representatives from each meeting will join representatives from other parts of the N.E. Region in Launceston in December where they will meet with the Minister responsible for Recreation, as well as Government Department officials, and discuss regional recreation problems arising from the study.

The Study will be completed at the end of the year.





Mr. Peter Spilsbury has again donated trophies for a casting contest and in the New Year, Scamander Club will have a special day to decide this event. There have been no contests lately & reports of catches are as rare as the proverbial hens! teeth but this extract from "Australian Fisheries" may be of interest. A recent survey of amateur fishermen in N.b.w. shows that at least 30 per cent of the population goos fishing for recreation. The survey indicated that recreational fisihing is a big industry probably as important to the economy as the professional fishing industry. In N.S.W. in the past I2 months, more than 20 million days were spent fishing for fun. If each amateur fisherman spent as little as a dollar a day on his sport for goods & services, this makes recreational fishing worth tens of willions of dollars to the economy. The survey confirmed that amateur fishermen were an extraordinary significant social group & the basis of a big industry. This was why the N.S.W. Government had given State Fisheries full departmental stature to cater better for the needs of amateur fishing. (Unquote) Perhaps, our Tasmanian masters will do something similar for us & we will no longer be regarded as the poor relations.




