Conserving the Wilderness.

There have been two major conservation disputes in south-western Tasmania-Lake Pedder and Precipitous Bluff. Although very few Tasmanians have visited the south-west, they feel its aura and are protective about this beautiful wilderness area.

Before 1955, the south-west was visited only by a few fishermen, trappers and a small number of walkers who were prepared to tackle the week's walk to Port Davey, carrying enough food for an emergency return. Most of the southern quarter of inland Tasmania appeared on maps as a large, blank space with the printed invitation 'Unexplored country'. Three dotted lines marked the approximately routes surviving from days when Port Davey was populated. But these tracks, once well maintained, had degenerated to faint muddy pads or had disappeared under advancing Bauera, cutting grass and tea-tree scrub.

In the late 1940's, two large timber concessions were opened in the tall forests of the south. Stands of the tallest hardwoods in the world, some 100 m high, were felled and converted to newsprint. Roads were built, and powerful light aircraft with longer range than before now ferried passengers and supplies to the beaches of Cox Bight and Lake Pedder. The south-west was becoming accessible to experienced bushmen. The blank areas on the maps disappeared in the 1950's when the Lands and Surveys Department produced accurately contoured maps from aerial photographs, thus eliminating much of the hazard of proving viable routes on foot.

Growing interest by bushwalkers and mountain climbers in the wilderness value of the south-west resulted in 1953 in the declaration of a national Park containing Lake Pedder and the encompassing ranges of the Frankland and Coronet. In the 1960's, the Hydro-electric Commission became interested in

developing the power potential of the Gordon River. At the cost of \$5 million it pushed a road from Maydena to the junction of the Gordon River with the Serpentine River, which drained Lake Pedder. In 1967, a 140 m high dam was proposed on the Gordon River to flood it back to the Stepped Hills and the Sawback Range. In addition, a second storage was proposed which appalled bushwalkers. This would have resulted in the flooding of the Lake Pedder National Park between two dams, one on the lower Serpentine River and the other on the upper Huon River near Scotts Park. A marginally increased national park was offered by the Tasmanian government.

Six years of bitter controversy followed. Condemnation of the scheme was advanced by international scientific bodies and a Federal Government inquiry was held. During this time, however, the Hydro-electric Commission carried on with its work and completed the Serpentine part of the scheme.

THE ABORIGINAL PROBLEM

Until coming to live up here, I knew very little of the current Aboriginal problems which is causing Aborigines, their sympathisers and Government leaders much concern.

Groote Eylandt is an Aboriginal Reserve and comes under supervision of the Arnhem Land Lands Council. There are two Aboriginal settlements on the island containing eleven different tribes who make up the islands Aboriginal Council who administer tribal law on the island. The section of the island controlled by GEMCO (Groote Eylandt Mining Co) is only one sixth of the total area of the island and is leased to GEMCO on a 99 year basis. The Aboriginal Council control the spending of the finance by direct grants to each tribe and also investing a great deal of the money in big business.

GEMCO pay the Aborigines a percentage of their manganese sales, with last years percentage being approx \$1million and addition GEMCO pays another \$1 million to the Commonwealth Dept of Aboriginal Affairs to be distributed between the various tribes in the Northern Territory. But in spite of the fact that this money makes the Aborigines quite well off, mal-nutrition is still quite prevalent and the general condition of health is low. The biggest single problem is alcohol, which it seems the average Australian Aboriginal cannot handle adequately.

(Neither can the average white Australian).

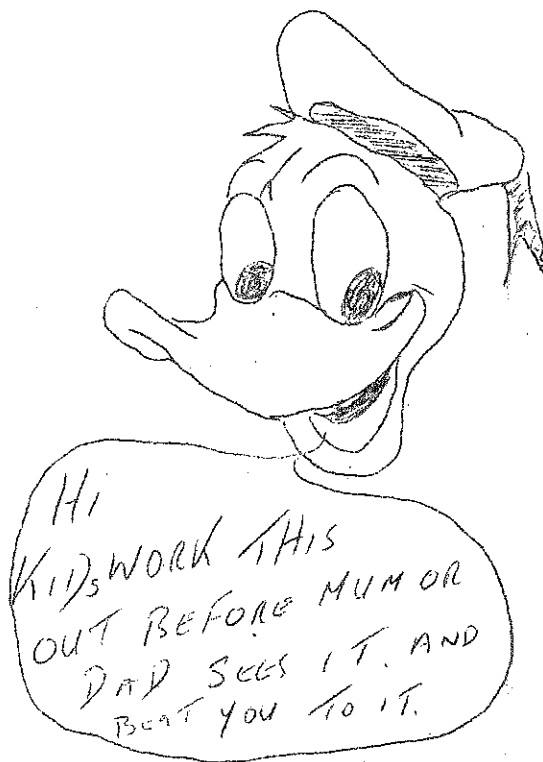
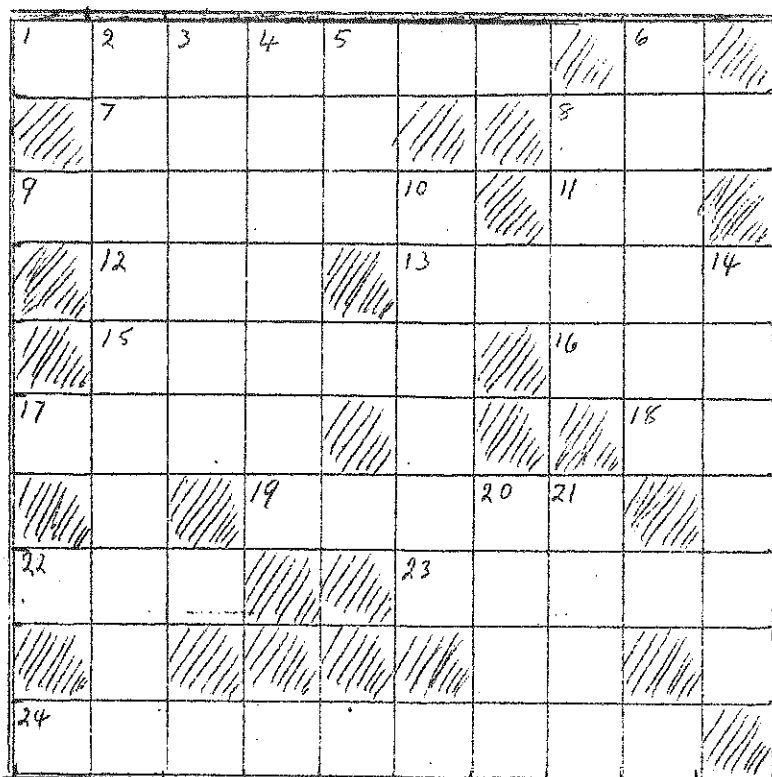
