No doubt living on the coastal strip can be enjoyable to the locals and when the tourists move in profitable as well. But for those who dont have sea and sand to exploit they must look elsewhere to attract tourists. The St Helens Chamber of Commerce increases its scope every year. But the same cannot be said of the towns that lie inland along the Fingal Valley. They get cut of the way of strangers, what a pity. This Valley has innumorable attraction for people not wanting to go to the seaside. We have a bush-walkers paradis , mountains to climb, rivers to fish, local arts and crafts to admire and buy , for the motorist we have friencliness, unclutt--ered highlands and pure air to breathe. For the yachtsman some of the finest waters to sail on. For the airplane enthusiast there are breath-taking to take.

These attractions need to be taken advantage of by local groups. In the main the Tourist Industry has been run by mainland Big Business interests. These interests send their own buses carryingfare-paying passengers (fares paid in their own States) to their own Hotels and Motels. This brings a small percentage of employment to each place, but brings no lasting benifit like a locally run enterprise, Individual Enterprise in Tasmania? There is certainly a lot of scope for that here. It is hard for the smaller groups to make their voices heard by those in control of Toursim in this

They have been trying to sell Tasmania as a tourist resort since the 1860s and slowly the tourist has been growing and jogging along almost unnoticed.

Now its different- we want more industry we are fortunate enough to have some beautiful unspoilt scenery and wealth of early history, and with Government help we are trying to make a go of the Tourist Industry. Or are we? Luxury hotels and casinos will no doubt attract one class of tourist, but the real answer is the bread and butter of tourism the family, who will no more stay in one than a Tasmanian on a Meltourne holiday would stay at the Southern Cross. Even the most beautiful drives and veiws will pale when a tourist is then subjected to a Tasmanian Sunday. If we have the gumption to amend some of our left-over out-of-date eating, drinking and entertainment laws we would be half way there. If we also have the gumption to work at our other inherent attraction, our history, we would most likely be the rest of the way Real money will have to be spent to preserve every worthwhile peice of our unique past and if this is coupled with a broad out--look towards what people really want on a holiday, Tasmanian Tourist Industry should really look up and go forward.

Self- respect cannot be hunted. It cannot be purchased. It is never for sale. It cannot be frabricated out of public relations. It comes to us when we are alone, in quiet moments, in quiet places when we suddenly realize that, knowing the good, we have done it; knowing the beautiful, we have served it; knowing the truth; we have spoken it.





MATHINNA ROAD

Quote from letter written by Mr. G. Shaw M.L.C. to Mr. D.J. Baldock, M.H.A. Minister for Main Roads.

I have on record your letter dated 22nd March 1977 and quote the final paragraph.

"Effective improvements of a permanent nature must be by reconstruction and sealing. However, funds available for Rural Arterial Roads are limited and at this stage no firm indication may be given as to when this may be commenced. It must be realised that there are many projects throughout the State in this road category which require similar consideration. However the road has been listed for consideration in planning for the next five years and if funds permit after provision has been made for continuing commitments, it may be possible to commence reconstruction and sealing in the first half of the give year programme.

To include this road for consideration in planning for the next five years is unsatisfactory.

In my submission funds must be found to enable a programme of reconstruction and sealing to commence and continue until completed. The whole job to take no more than five years.

I am sending a copy of this letter to your ST. MARYS TENNIS CLUB will hold a courtcolleagues in Cabinet, The Hon. Michael Polley, M.H.A., The Hon Andrew Lohrey, M.H.A. and also Mr. Burr, M.H.R. Federal

Minister for Wilmot. They have a close knowledge of the area and will, I believe, join me in this submission.

In conclusion may I suggest that you convene and chair a meeting with Mr. Polley, Mr. Lohrey, Mr. Burr and myself togeyher with representatives of the Forestry Commission, Department of Main Roads and the Mathinna Progress Association to discuss this important matter at an early date.

Somewhere, somehow, funds must be found to enable this job to be done and promptly.

PRESS STATEMENT:

The Minister for Resources and Energy, Mr. Lohrey said today that the Forestry Commission planned construction work costing \$100,000 at five entries this financial year.

Mr. Lohrey said tenders had been called for the construction of stores buildings at Mathinna, St. Marys, Mole Creek, Tarraleah and Bruny Island.

"T refer to your letter of the 2nd December, 1977 concerning the condition of the Esk Main Road from St. Marys to Fingal.


I m pleased to advise that an amount of \$160,000 has been allocated this financial year for the resealing of the road from Fingal to Killymoon.

While it is intended that the work be undertaken in the summer months, investigations into the composition of the bitumen in order to avoic cracking of the new surface, may delay the resealing until March."

IN THE EYE OF THE LAW

The indiscriminate dumping of rubbish on roads and roadsides, is causing concern to the police, public works and council officers, who are charged with the responsibility of law enforcement.

It is also a cause of concern and even disgust, for many law abiding citizens who take pride in their town, district and state.



The disposal of the ordinary items, such as wrappers, ice cream containers and cordial bottles etc. does not prove difficult, if some thought is given to the many street containers provided. Household garbage and rubbish should of course be deposited at the local rubbish tip.

From the point of view of law enforcement, you are reminded that there are several offences created by the Tasmanian Statutes, in all cases providing for severe monetary penalties for convicted offenders.

It is an offence under the Roads and Jetties Act to deposit rubbish on a road. The offence of "committing a nuisance" under the Police Offences Act, includes the depositing of rubbish in a public place.

The Traffic Regulations prohibit the throwing of tottles from motor shicles when travelling on public streets. From this it can be seen that the law takes a serious view of this matter and contravention of the above mentioned laws could result in your appearance in the Court of Petty Sessions. This action is not desired, because all would far sooner have the co-operation of citizens giving some thought to the elimination of this undesirable practice, and thereby enhancing the beauty of the countryside.
