Mutton Bird Season.

Tasmania's mutton-bird industry is faced with a shortage of professional birders. Each year the number of birders - and birds being caught - is declining.

Just under 500,000 birds were caught on islands off Tasmania's coast this year during the five-week season from late March.

The birds are sold both fresh & salted to local and interstate markets with New Zealand the biggest overseas customer. The birds retailed at about \$1.60 in Tasmania. Key islands for catching the birds are Big Dog, Chappell and Babel in the Furneaux group; Treefoil, Hunter and Bird in the North West; and Bruny in the South.

The birds are freighted to the mainland Tasmania by light aircraft where they are distributed by frozen food companies. The mutton-birders average about \$600 for the season, and work seven days a week. For about 12 hours a day they poke their arms down burrows under tufts of grass to catch the chick mutton-bird and deliver it back to the processing sheds. The experienced mutton-birder ensures that a chick has a swift death.

The birder places his first and second finger around the chick's neck with the head in his hand, and gives a quick flick.

There is no chance of an adult bird being mistaken for a chick.

The adult flies off before dawn and returns after dusk with food for the chick. At the processing sheds stomach oil is squeezed from the carcass before the chick is plucked gutted and packed. The oil is sold for pharmaceutical purposes and body fat sometimes rendered down for sale to dairy farmers as a calf-rearing substitute. It takes about 18,000 birds to get 450 litres of oil.

The mutton-bird, or short-tailed shear-water, is a variety of petrel. It nests on the Bass Strait islands in summer and returns to North Pacific regions for winter. Its identification as a "Mutton Bird" dates to 1790 when an officer of the Royal Marines on Norfolk Island wrote of a Petrel tasting like mutton.

The birds were sometimes called the flying sheep.

Petrels which burrowed on Norfolk Island were sometimes called "birds of providence" by shipwrecked mariners, convicts and others who lived on their fatty flesh.

In August 1790, ships from Sydney failed to reach Norfolk Island with fresh supplies, 170,000 of the birds were slaughtered for food.

In the 19th century the mutton-bird food industry was developed in the Bass Strait.

Feathers were used in upholstery, the chick food, and the fat to grease skips in coalmines and skids in sawmills in Tasmania.



FISHING NEWS

Forthcoming events:- 16th April Seamander Angling Club Surf contest at Four Mile Creek from 12 noon to 4p.m. with the accuracy section of the casting contest during the afternoon. 22nd & 23rd April - St. Helens Game fishing Club Rally Day with two charter boats at Bicheno booked for non boat owners. On Good Friday, Seamander Angling Club Surf contest at Wrinklers was well patronised with 35 entries. Fish were scarce as usual & only about 20 were caught. Winner was Freddie Richards with a good 4½ lb blackback - this is the heaviest scale fish for the 1977/78 season so far. Second was Wes Stone with 21b 2 oz & third was John Barrett with 21b 1 oz. Craig Hoodless won the junior trophy with 21b 3½ oz while visitor Bill Harris landed two sharks with the heavier weighing 81b 9½ oz. On easter Saturday & Sunday, the 8th Tasmanian Game Fishing contest was conducted by our friends, the Game Fishing Club of Northern Tasmania. Around 30 boats took part, enduring some bumpy weather on Saturday & a few uncomfortable trips over the bar on the return home. Top boats were Karen L.R. (Peter Johnstone) with 83.36 points, Striker (B Charlton) 82.38 & Marlin (G Smythe) 62.33. Heaviest fish was caught by Ian Lerner who is a non-member with a 48lb bluefin on 30lb line. The open winner was Ken Williams with a 44lb fish & the ladies trophy went to Mrs R. Bak with a 16lb bluepointer shark. Junior trophy was won by Ross Charlton with a 42lb bluefin on 12lb line. Robert Breen Jnr had a long battle with another bluefin almost as big. Peter Johnstone did well to land a 27lb bluefin later at 6lb line. Easter also saw the arrival at St. Helens of the first party of Japanese tourists to come especially for the game fishing. Two of the party managed to get out on one day & finished with eight striped tuna. It is reported that they were pleased & indicated that more of their country-men could be coming. We must remember that there is no game fishing as we know it in Japanese waters. Perhaps they were fished out years ago. It is ironical to consider one party fishing with rod & reel a few miles offshore while Japanese are hauling in tens of thousands on long lines, not much further away. Perhaps the sporting party might assist local anglers in our efforts to preserve some fish for recreational fishing.
