CONSERVATION.

When it comes to conservation many people simply use words. Some others take action-positive, constructive, meaningful action.

The Associated Tree Farmers Scheme launched by Associated Pulp and Paper Mills in 1975 is an outstanding example. It is a practical programme that even improves on nature. There are three major objectives-to contribute to the conservation of Tasmanian forests; to demonstrate to farmers that with proper management, tree farming is a valuable alternative to traditional land uses, and to increase the future supply of wood fibre, Tasmania's most important raw material.

Associated Tree Farmers is a partnership in conservation for the benefit of individual landowners. Associated Pulp and Paper Mills, Tasmania itself and in the end all Australians. Associated Pulp and Paper Mills contributing finance and management know how to ensure the reafforestation of private forest lands which, after harvest, could otherwise be lost forever as forest.

The Forestry Commission programmed forest management to mitigate the effect of logging on the environment.

Coupes (cutting areas) have been scattered widely, logging has been controlled to retain green belts along permanent streams, roads have been designed carefully.

Erosion and water courses have also been considered in all planning

Pinus Radiata plantations belonging to the Forestry in the Scottsdale/Branxholm area have had a particular influence in the past three years on the development of forest industries on the North coast.

Sophisticated industries like A.P.P.M. and the new mill at Tongana are manufacturing superb products based on pinus radiata.

A.P.P.M. indicating its faith in the forests of Tasmania, will embark on a \$25 million expansion programme at Burnie.

The Commonwealth Government on the request of the State Government has extended A.P.P.M. wood chip licences for Wesley Vale and

the far north-west of Tasmania to 1985.

Because of overcutting of eucalypt forest, the Forestry Commission has had to reduce sawlog quotas to sawmills by 20 per cent across the board, but this will not overcome completely years of overcutting.

However, with planned development sawlog from pinus radiata forests is expected to be available to fill the gap, once, within certain areas, eucalypt sawlog is exhausted.

In the late 80s or the early 90s more traditional hardwood mills will change to cutting of softwood for the period it takes for young natural forest to develop to mature sawlog size.

For recreation the Commission has set aside along the north coast forest areas where the public can picnic or view trees and understory species in natural habitat.

Best known among these reserve are Oldina Forest Reserve, near Wynyard, and Milkshakes Hills Forest Reserve, south of the Arthur River. Other beautiful forest areas will soon be set aside for the people to enjoy.

The Forestry Commission, particularly in the North and North-west of the island is protecting the forest estate.







PRESS STATEMENT

The widening of Millers Hill on the St. Marys Pass has been listed for consideration in the 1978/79 road programme, the Minister for Resources and Energy Mr. Lohrey, said today.

Mr. Lohrey said the Minister for Main Roads, Mr. Baldock, had informed him that the works on the Pass would cost about \$31,000.

A final decision would be made after the current Rural Arterial Roads investigation was completed by the Department of Main Roads.

Mr. Lohrey said improvements to the 700 metre section on Millers Hill would cost \$25,000. The road would be widened by one metre to enable safe two-way passage of heavy traffic.

The widening of Sunny Corner would cost an additional \$6,000 while the removal of about 20 protruding rocks would mean an extra \$2,000.

Mr. Lohrey said the culverts along the Pass were checked regularly by maintenance personnel and the one replaced after the slip some years ago was better angled to improve inlet conditions. This had greatly increased its capacity and reduced the chances of it blocking debris, he said.

RATE REMISSIONS TO BE MADE EASIER

The state Government will make it easier for pensioners to claim rate remissions this financial year.

The Treasurer, Mr. Batt, said yesterday he was concerned that the existing legislation was unduly restrictive in the time period it allowed this year for pensioners to lodge their applications. Pensioners are entitled to a minimum 25 per cent rebate on their rates. The legislation requires applications for the rebate to be submitted by Dec. 31. Mr. Batt said this was unrealistic this financial year because the legislation had passed through Parliament only weeks before the closing date. For this financial year the date for claims to be submitted would be extended to May 31, although eligibility would still be taken as at December 1977. The date for claims next financial year would be December 31.

A HELPING HAND FOR THE DISTRICT:

Like many areas of the Tasmanian, Fingal Valley is suffering from the effects of the rural depression. This has left many young people wondering where their future lies.

To offset this, the Federal Government has set up the "Fingal Valley Community Youth Support Scheme".

The Scheme's main aim is to give vocational guidance to the unemployed. Help is offered in both job searching and work preparation.

All employers of the district are asked to contact the scheme at the Council Chambers at Fingal. With their help the Scheme will recede itself in job placement.

As work prospects remain dim, some young people are spending considerable time unemployed. The Scheme hopes to start getting these people active again.

By organizing activities such as sporting (football, badminton, pool, table tennis) crafts (sewing, leatherwork, weaving), outdoor (camping, fishing, canoeing, horsefiding) arts, (dying, sculpture, painting, photographing) and entertainment (picnics, cabarets, movies) it is hoped to get the kids away from home and T.V. To do this the scheme needs help. Help can be given in many ways, Support for the projects organizing, advice on what facilities and skills the district and its people have to offer, and ideas for more projects. The Scheme is in the process of setting up Drop-in centres at Rossarden, Fingal, St. Marys. When these are established more will be set up at Avoca and Mathinna. These centres will provide a meeting place for the unemployed and they will be a lease for other activities.




