## EDITORIAL

THE PHANTOM BOY: Barney Roberts  
(Robin Books, Burnie, Box 4739.

This delightful book of poems by Tasmanian poet Barney Roberts is a gem. In these times, when obscurity is often supposedly to be kind of hallmark of a writer's depth, these short poems remain on the surface of our comprehension by virtue of their clarity and exactness.

It is not, however, because they lack thought or a philosophy; or even acadeamy; it is simply because the poet, in the midst of much of today's poetic humbug, remains true to himself and his readers.

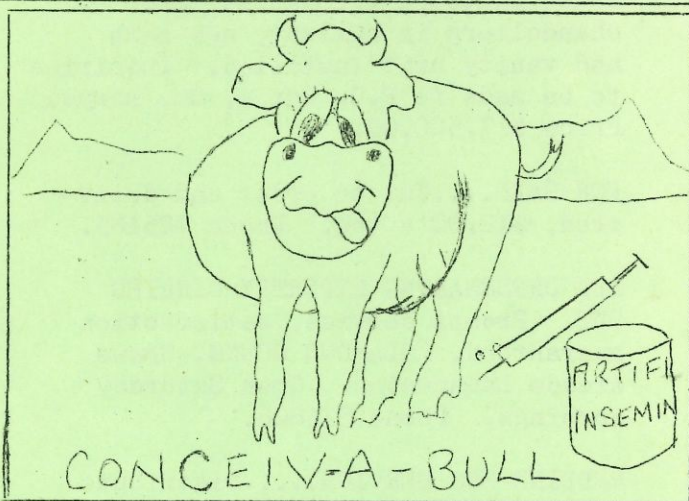
Roberts' poetic observations, to my mind, are the same as many of our observations but where we only 'feel' certain things about places, scenes and people Barney Roberts takes the trouble to put their feelings into words.

He does this so cleverly, so unobtrusively, that when we read his words our feelings are then recreated by the mind-pictures he draws-and we remember.

Which means, I suppose, Barney Roberts has that very rare quality of artistic communication. I suggest anyone who has a sensitive appreciation of our Tasmanian landscape (or any other mentioned in this book) will recognise not only that landscape in Roberts' poems, but will also find his love for it is rekindled.

Anyone who has experienced country living in Tasmania will recognise "....a cow, cud-chewing, funnels of white breathing, stretched out its neck to the sun....." or heard, and marvelled".....at the avalanche of notes....of the sky lark in a sky that.... held no horizon for the song that fell like sun-ripened cherries tumbling one upon the other....."

But Barney Roberts also has a philosophy which questions his true feelings of love for his land. Even though he fought for it earlier, as he gets older he seeks out also the "....enemy from within." Are we too complacent? Our land is being raped under our noses- industries are poisoning our air - forests are being destroyed -



lakes drowned, and we suffer it because in fact our strongest love may not be for beauty, but a desire".....of Have of Hold of Greed of Profit not of need".

Barney dedicated a poem to fellow poet Les Murray whom he obviously admires. The two poets are similar in many ways but I see Roberts more of a later-day Shaw Neilson, the first of Australia's yeomen poets. They are both part of our inheritance and our tradition.

If you hanker for poetry that is descriptive landscape and full of feeling without pretention and self-centred egoism, you surely should buy this book. It is a limited edition and conceived with care. It will almost certainly become a collector's item.

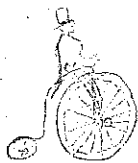

# THE AUSTRALIAN SOCIETY FOR MULTIPLE HANDICAPPED CHILDREN -MULTICAP AUST.

I have been requested by Multicap Australia to represent the area from Avoca to St. Marys and from St. Helens through to Orford in this year's Tasmanian Multicap Quest. I am being sponsored by the Lion's Club of St. Marys. The period for which I am allowed to raise money is from April to November.

Multicap Australia is the first charity to propose a Multi-Diagnostic Centre to cater for Tasmanian children and adults with all types of handicaps, with special care for the more severely handicapped who are not acceptable at existing centres.

Although only in operation since late 1971, Multicap Australia has already acquired a magnificent 13ha (32 acre) site on West Mooreville Road, Burnie, close to the new multi-million dollar Government Education development on Mooreville Road, Burnie and hopes to commence phase one of the centre by the end of 1978.

The society intends to include the following services at the complex: EDUCATION, PHYSIOTHERAPY, SPEECH THERAPY, OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY, JUNIOR HOSTELS, SENIOR HOSTELS, SHELTERED WORKSHOPS, JUNIOR AND SENIOR HOSPITAL-TYPE WINGS, ENTERTAINMENT AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES.

When complete, the complex will be one of the most comprehensive centres for handicapped persons in Australia, providing unique "whole of life" care where necessary.

The Project was undertaken after discussions with two of Tasmania's highest authorities on child-care, Professor I.C. Lewis (Professor of Child Health at the University of Tasmania) and Dr. Cunningham-Dax (State Co-ordinator of Community Health Services).

The incredibly short time in which

Multicap has acquired the land and reached the planning stage is proof positive of the public's endorsement of Multicap's Policy and dynamic endeavours.

The society's chief means of fund-raising is through three annually conducted quests:-

1. Princess of Tasmania Charity Quest
2. Multicap Married Couples Quest
3. Tasmanian Multicap Quest

It is the third in which I am participating. It is of value to note, that all money raised by quest entrants remains in Tasmania. A committee has been formed centrally in St. Marys and are willing to accept donations and/or answer any questions you may have regarding your assistance in helping handicapped children throughout Tasmania. The committee is as follows:-

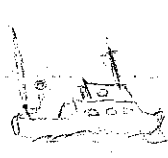

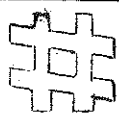
## FINGAL VALLEY BADMINTON ASSOCIATION

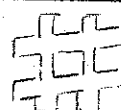

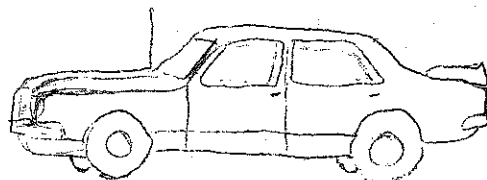
