EDITORIAL

A GARDEN CITY IN SOUTH EAST ASIA

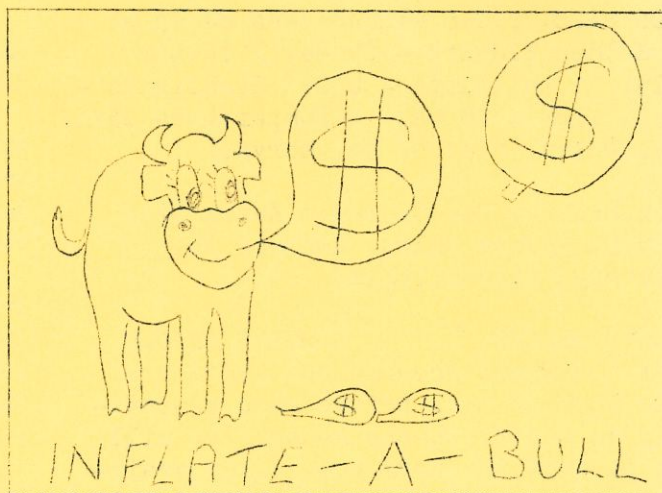
Though limited for space Singapore exudes a stimulating impression of immense activity, wealth and good management. The fine streets are all at least dual-laned, and suburban boulevards are thickly bordered with beautiful tropical trees and shrubs with well-manicured grass beneath.

Singapore now has large international airport, (four years ago it was chaotic) where planes from all parts of the world touch down constantly, as it is a junction on many routes. The port is the forth busiest in the world, and the city is well known as a shoppers mecca, so there is much to bring the tourists in.

The very heavy concentration of extremely mixed traffic would lead one to expect many accidents, especially considering the fast pace at which the collection of rickshaws, bicycles, private cars, and the innumerable taxis fly along. It seems competition makes for quick reactions and I thought most Tasmanians would get in terrible jams among that fast moving mob. There are fines for all kinds of small misdemeanours like dropping litter and so on, so no doubt fines for causing an accident are high. Obviously the citizens of Singapore do not object to the rigid policing for they continue to vote Li Kwan Yew into power with a large majority.

Singapore is a garden city and very proud to be known as the cleanist one in South East Asia. Probably it also has the greatest number of skyscrapers but as they are mainly concentrated in central areas they manage to present an unexpectedly sur-real kind of charm, especially when seen from Mount Faber, or the cable car from Sentosa Island. From these heights one also gets a better view of the tremendous number of trees, flowers and shrubs planted in gardens, parks and beside streets, which no doubt assist in moderating the temperature in that hot and humid climate.

It is said that nearly half the population of Singapore live in multi-story flats which have been built by the Government mostly in suburbs some way out of the centre of town. They



have also developed large industrial estates, the latest of which is Jurong built on land made suitable by draining a marsh. It now contains some 500 factories, and many multi-story flats for the workers, as well about 26 hectares of undulating land has been utilised for three parks nearby. There is a huge bird-park of 20 hectares, a Chinese Garden and a beautiful large Japanese Garden, designed by a famous Japanese artist.

Commerce is the dynamic throb which keeps this busy metropolis on its toes in so profitable a way and the eager citizens never stop working, especially the Chinese portion who are now in the majority. We could learn a lot from the Singaporeans in taking a pride in our own island, keeping it cleaner, tidier, and more beautiful, or do we need to be forced by law to feel patriotic.

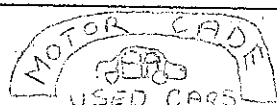

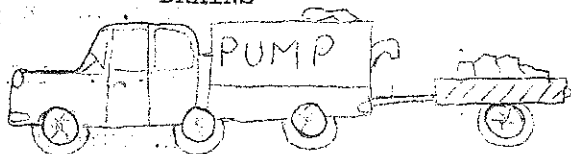

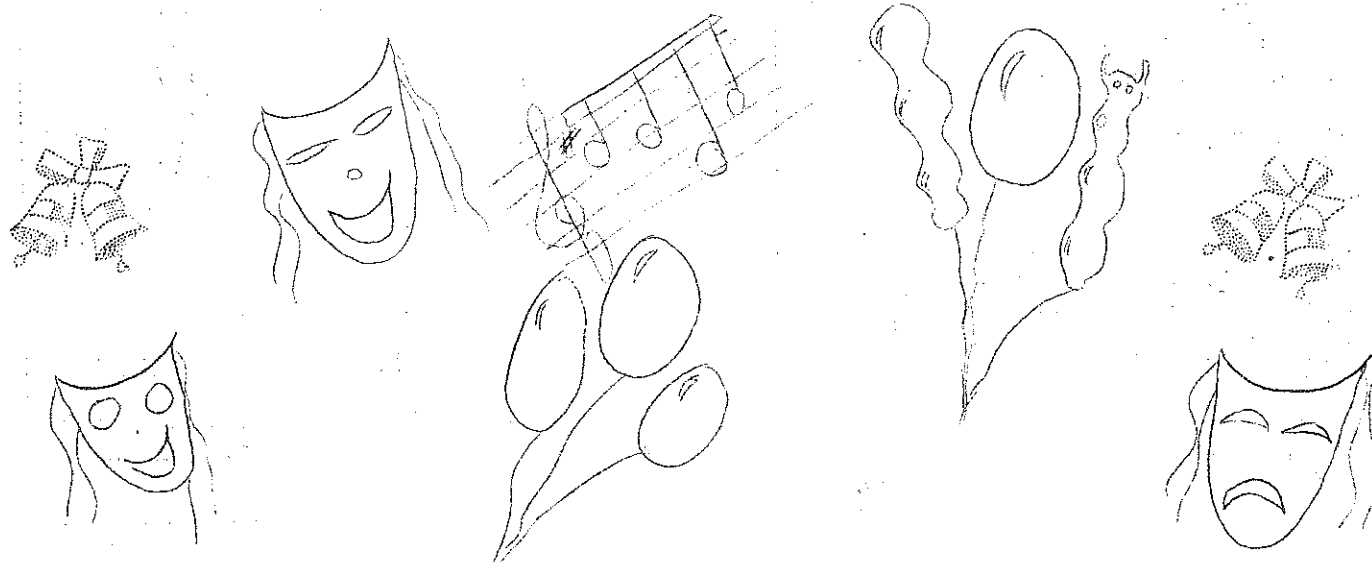

Dear Sir,

I feel that we should all be more concerned about the fate of the largest animal species the earth has known, larger even than the biggest diansaur, the brontosaurus. I'm talking about the whale.

Whaling has played a major part in Tasmanian history, in fact, there are few things in Tasmanian history of which we can be proud: we've wiped out the Tasmanian Tiger, the Tasmanian Emu and the Tasmanian Aboriginal. Whaling is now carried out with the help of helicopters, sonar, factory, ships, high-power explosive harpoons and light aircraft for spotting whales. These modern methods have helped make the blue fin right and humpback whales "commercially" extinct, but 'it isn't clear yet if the whale populations will be able to recover.

One whale is killed somewhere in the world, every twenty minutes. The Australian Whaling station at Cheyer Beach, Western Australia takes 3 whales every day.

The saddest part is that whale products are not essential to industrialised countries at all. Certain vegetable oils, and other materials could be used for the manufacture of stockfood, fertilizers, soap, candles, margarine, cosmetics, crayons and industrial oils. It's up to us as consumers to avoid using whale by-products and up to us as citizens to express our concern for these wonderful and (now) rare animals.

PRESS RELEASE

Tasmania faced an exodus of population, a state Liberal Party spokesman said today.

This week's announced jump in electricity charges, bus fares and Housing Department rentals had made Tasmania the "milking cows" of State Government bungling, said Mr Ian Braid, M.H.A.

Speaking on radio, Mr Braid said he was sure Tasmanians had been stunned by Government announcements this week, especially when they remember the slogan promise to "keep Tasmania in good hands."

"These so called good hands are now smitten with arthritis and are crippling the economic growth and the life style of this State," he said.

"The staggering announcement that domestic power charges will increase by 25 per cent means a compounded increase of 75 per cent in the past three years.

"The timing of the announcement as to include the period when people are forced to use additional power to use additional power for heating and light seems inexcusable.

"The Premier, Mr Neilson, has given only token assistance to pensioners. On an account of \$50.00 a quarter, the rebate would be only about four per cent, so the average pensioner will be faced with a 21 per cent increase when they can least afford it".

Mr Braid said it seems strange that the tourist accomodation industry had to face an increase of only 12½ per cent while everyone else paid 25 per cent.

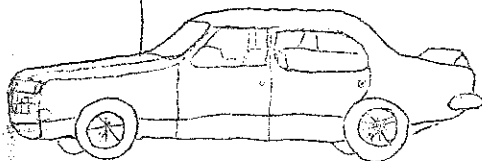

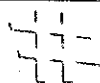

TASMANIAN HYDATIDS ERADICATION COUNCIL
PRESS RELEASE

The Tasmanian Hydatid Eradication Council has urged Local Govt. Authorities to adopt the strongest possible measures to ensure that all dogs in their respective Municipalities are registered and properly controlled.

This follows appeals from the farmer organisations who say there is a decline in the level of the control of urban dogs in some rural areas.

The Hydatid Eradication Council has written to Tasmania's 49 Councils, urging them to deal with the owners of unregistered and uncontrolled dogs according to the law.

Farmers say there are two main reasons for the urgent need for stricter dog control by Municipal Councils:-

One is that the dog population in the State is continuously increasing; and with an estimated 54,000 dogs in the State last year and only 42,000 of these registered, an increasing number of dogs roam at large on farm land where sheep graze.

Apart from the every present risk of sheep and lambs being attacked by such uncontrolled dogs, there is the risk that such dogs could be carriers of hydatid tapeworms, and the dogs would be passing the eggs of these tapeworms on to clean pastures, which would in turn infect sheep with hydatids.

The second reason is that farmers can now have their property quarantined if 15% or more hydatid infection is found in their sheep. They will also be quarantined in one positive dog is found.

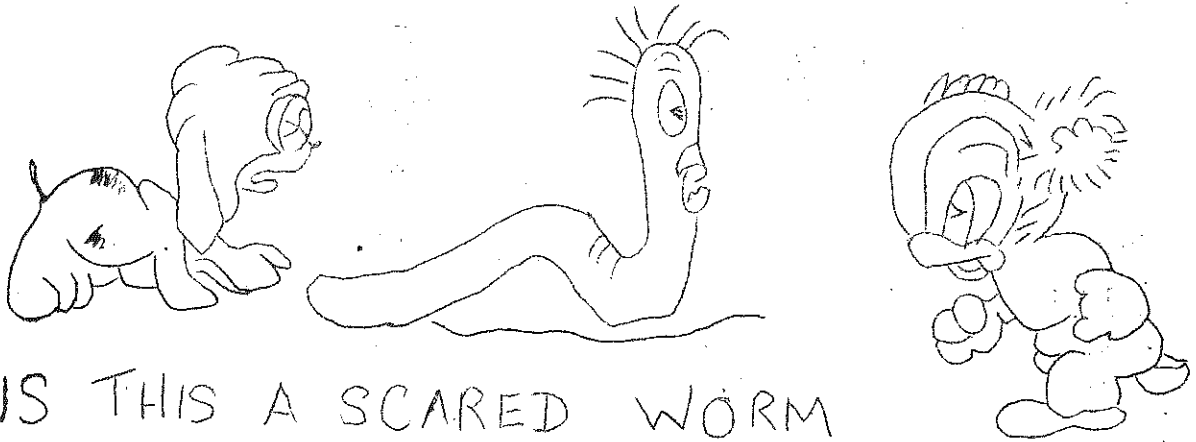

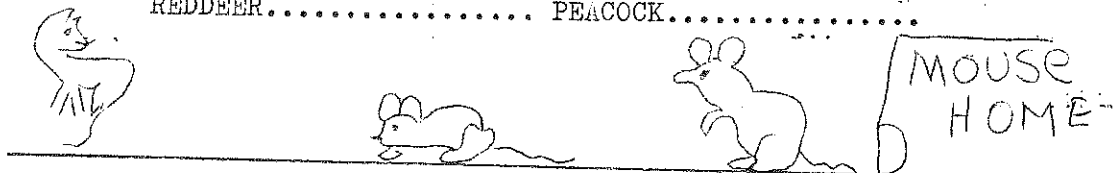
