As a gardener I was dogged but ineffectual. A well-wisher, eyeing my mediocre vegetables, said "Go and see George. For expert advice there's no-one better." He added with deepest respect, "He's a compost man."

So I went to George who spoke about trenching, mulching and humus, but most of all about compost.

He concluded by saying, "Remember, compost's the answer! Waste nothing that has had life. Put it all back into the soil by way of the compost heap!"

I fixed on a suitable corner in

the garden and started. Odours came and went, and underneath, the pile went black and crumbly in true compost style. My enthusiasm knew no limits. hammered up some sea-shells and sprinkled them over. All material remotely connected with life became food for the compost. In borderline cases I used my imagination freely. Hesitating with worn-out wool socks I posed the question: Did they have life? and had no trouble at all seeing them gambolling and cropping the

green grass.

So on they went and lay mouldering beneath the bones of many meat and fish meals, seaweed, banana skins, burnt toast and buckets of soil dug from around

the yard.

Feeding the mound became a rite rather than disposal of rubbish. I well remember the day we got new rubber mats for car: those old jute ones made wonderful bulk on top of the heap. The children caught the spirit of the enterprise and brought offerings of leaves, apple cores, pine needles and other oddments that passed the life test. 



ETTER TOTHE EDITOR


Dear Sir,

Remissions) act of 1977 was amended by Bill No. 22 which included its passage through the Parliament when passed by the Legislative Council on Thursday 27th. I had the honour of piloting the Bill through the Council.

The amending Bill had a particular and a general application. Firstly it extended the application for a Remission of Rates and Charges for the year anding 30th June. 1978, to 31st May, 1978. Therefore those people who missed out on applying before 31st December, 1977 have an opportunity to make application to the Council Clerk before 31st May.


Secondly, eligibility was extended to pensioners who live in a house on land held under a Temporary Licence granted under section 42 of the Crown Lands Act, 1976.

The amendment is of particular importance to areas such as Mathinna and Cornwall where many residences are situated on Crown Land held under Temporary Licence, a peculiarity of old mining towns. Pensioners in these circumstances will be eligible providing they comply with other eligibility conditions under the Act. Applicate ne must be made before the 31st May for this financial year Local Government (Rates & Charges Remissions) and every year thereafter before 31st December to the Council Clerk on the prescribed application form,


