

As you improve your property, you also improve which showed a pleasing bank balance to the area in which we all live and increase overall the wealth and value of the ward. And yet you are penalised for doing so, because when revaluation occurs your local taxes are increased. Revaluations are soon to be made and will become effective next July. Over 90% of mainland municipalities have realised the injustice of rating on improvements and are instead rating on the unimproved value of properties. This means the improvements and betterments of your property is free of rates. Perhaps it is time we thought of doing the same. Iwill continue this matter in future articles
