## ON CALLING A SPADE A SPADE

"I don't believe in beating about the bush; I believe in calling a spade a spade. I'm upright and down straight, I am", says Mrs. Jones Robinson, with a beautiful mixture of metaphors. And really what she means is that she first enjoys telling people right out what she thinks and seeing them squirm afterwards.

Calling a spade a spade is by no means always a good thing; and people who boast of doing it, in a good many cases, hide their real motive under a hypocritical expression of straight forwardness.

If a young lady does not happen to be blessed with good looks, it makes no one any wiser or happier to say right out that she is ugly. But the "upright and downright" person considers that she or he is quite justified in thinking their thoughts out loud.

If a fourteenstone man were to walk about deliberately jumping on people's toes, he would soon find himself in the police-station, or the mental hospital. But these "call a spade a spade" folk go about wounding people far more seriously by their uncontrolled tongue. They say just the thing they know will hurt most. They seem to be able to drop upon the tender spot in the hearts of the most sensitive and harmless people.

Two ladies were conversing in the railway carriage on the way home from a religious convention. The new young pastor of a village church was the subject of their talk. "He ask me", said the elder woman, "to pray for the village and the church". "I told him" she continued, "that I would pray God to make him humble" and didn't she enjoy saying it too.

Calling a spade a spade is often made the excuse for giving expression to an ugly fact when it's quite unnecessary to speak about the matter at all. Some people seem to think that because a thought comes into their minds, and it happens to be true, that that is sufficient justification for wounding a friend or acquaintance by giving expression to it. They do not dream of being hindered from telling the bald, blunt truth by such consideration as, is it necessary? or is it kind? Like poor old Cruden of Concordance fame, they convince themselves

that they have a Divine commission to go about putting everybody right and they do it with the zeal of a Savonarola and ruthlessness of a Judge Jeffreys.

A certain noble man of old developed a horrid liking for seeing people suffer torture. His position enabled him to gratify this depraved taste, and this mental malady is now termed "sadism" after his name. The laws of the country prevent people from satisfying their sadistic instincts by watching the physical torture of their fellows; but would that mankind could be protected from the people who delight to cut someone to the heart and wound them quite as sorely, by an unnecessary and unkind remark, although the statement itself may be true. The truth, because it's the truth, should at times be left unsaid: Beware of calling a spade a spade.

On 24th September, St Helens Club held a surf contest at Wrinklers Beach & once again the fish did not let their critics down. Of a dozen fish caught by 14 anglers only two excelled!

Winner was Ferdie Richards with a 2 lb 2 oz Blackback & runner up was Norm Hollingsworth. Bob Jackson won the very special Boag's trophy for hooking an empty beer can - his usual luck.

There was an unusual catch in the Scamander River recently. Tony Cooper was broom fishing about a mile upstream from the barway & hooked a baby mako shark. Although the fish was only two feet long his needle sharp teeth were developed. Not such good news was the evidence of recent netting in the river. All anglers are urged to report any sign of this selfish & illegal practice to the Fisheries Inspectors as soon as possible as continuation will rapidly ruin the fishing for others. It is heartening to read further letters in the daily press on the subject of beach netting. This paper has received a letter from the Division of Recreation of the Department on the subject with the object of including the views of amateurs fishing in a current study being made. The matter is being pursued & any progress will be reported.

I have been looking lately at the methods of raising rates talking about it with many ratepayers. I am beginning to believe that the present method of rating a assessed Annual Value is unjust.

The Local Government Act which governs most of Councils operations permits any of three methods to be used to raise local government taxes ( called rates)

It seems unfair that if you improve your property by a new building , new works etc, you are taxed more in rates. In effect you are fined for improving your property.

As you improve your property, you also improve the area in which we all live and increase overall the wealth and value of the ward.

And yet you are penalised for doing so, because when revaluation occurs your local taxes are increased. Revaluations are soon to be made and will become effective next July.

Over 90% of mainland municipalities have realised the injustice of rating on improvements and are instead rating on

the unimproved value of properties . This means the improvements and betterments of your property is free of rates. Perhaps it is time we thought of doing the same.

I will continue this matter in future articles from time to time, and will welcome comments from ratepayers
