The stisfaction of catching crayfish, the size of a football, by hanging a sheep's held over the rocks at Four Mile Beach. excitements and joys do not exist in 1979. the fishing. We one then had thought of The subject of past glories arose at the mention of Mrs. Lohrey "temporarily lowing" the district to live with her daughter Robyn at Devenport. From a "Valley Voice" point of view, even a temporary departure is a pending disstor. Mrs Lohroy has been the paper's backbone for quite a number of years. by the emergence of offers of help by the valley community. Kath Lohrey herself looms as a person who will invariably energe from advertisty with new strength. At the halpily acknowledged ed age of 72 she is planning a burst of fresh activities in such fields as Adult Education "to stop my brain from going to sleep. "She says "Since we sold the caravan park I've felt isolated on my own, My brain sooms to go on strike." I'n looking forward to meeting lots of people because, even if I don't like their ideas I'll have to use my brain to think of good reasons why my ideas re better." New Norfolk, and Dad built the holiday House at Falmouth to ran as a business." Kath and her five brothers and sisters would walk wiles up and down the coast, sometimes hiring a dinghy from Johnny Walker and catching beautiful bream up the Scanander River. The fish would be rolled in wet newspaper and cooked in the ashes of the fire after the billy had been boiled. There was good fishing just about anywhere. Even the little or ek in the St.Marys Pass produced marvelous six-inch trout which could be hooked by enyon with bent pin and a string. The trut were very sweet and could be enten and all. A LETTER RECEIV D FROM MR. GEORGE SHAW MLC

The Hon. H.N. HOLGETE, M.H.A, Minister for Education, Recreation and the Arts, HOBART

Dear Mr. Minister,

I meadvised that during the vacation period a most successful 3 day recreational programme run by Mr. Kenneth Gillespie of the Tasmania Ballet Company and school was held at St. Marys.

The Parents and Friends and Mothers Club were involved in organising and some 22 children participated in a most enthusiastic manner.

I am also advised that a similarly successful class was held in the Sept. holidays at St. Helens.

Mr. Minister, the response reveals again the need in a remote country area to provide on a more permanent basis for such activities.

May I quote the TEND Report Chapter 7, Education in Rural Tasmania, Page 99, "If the opportunities of country students are equal to those of urban ones, rural facilities must be better and richer than those in the cities. They have to compens te for the less intellectually stimulating environment of country life. Equalisation offacilities is the first step, positive discrimination to improve them second, and substantial enrichment of school programmes and community activities the taird."

Page 101 "iii. Inrichment of the School Curriculum and School Facilities.

More opportunity should be made available to bring to local country schools more regularly and frequently groups such as drama, art and craft groups, the mobile media van, and individuals who may have something of interest to teach."

In the light of the above, I have no hestitation in requesting that you provide sufficient funds to enable the Fingal Valley and the St.Helens area to have visits from the Tasmanian Ballet School on a regular basis.

I know that the St. Marys District School Parents and Friends and Mothers Clubs would support this request enthusiastically.

As I make this request I am also aware of the lack of education 1 opportunity in music that exists in the Fingal Valley and St. Marys District. This is a matter of very serious concern and I would ask that you also provide a remedy to this problem.

If there is any way that I can help with further information I would most will-ingly oblige.

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STATE OF THE ST

It shouldn't take much thought to see that taxing individual effort by income taxes, and taxing production of goods with sales taxes, subsidies and quotas, is in effect FET ALISI G the effort and industry of the people and the nation. The raising of taxes is a subject with a history as long as organised society, but a tax on the income of citizens is a comparatively recent innovation.

Britain before 1799 when it was imposed by William Fitt the Younger to pay for debts the country incurred in the long war with France. The tax was discontinued after the Peace of Amiens but as the peace again quickly, the tax was re-intro- and one questions that arise from was finally overtiness. was finally overthrown and the thankful nation was as pleased to see the tax go as it was to see the end of the Little Corporal.

Forty years later, income tax was again introduced and from then on it became a permanent tax. This last introduction was imposed by the Government of Robert Teel in That's the date to mark from; the date when income tax came Emperor or Government. That is, to stay. Income tax has only been an unpleasant feature of government for the last 136 years.

Sales Tax was not known in Australia until 1930, when it was introduced as a 'temporary measure' to help balance the first budget of the Great Depression. It began as a demure $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ and yielded \$6 mill heirs, but at the same time the The following year, as the economic land was recognised as common

to 5%, still a 'temporary Measure'. Ten years later, the temporary tax was still with us and increased to 8%. In 1940 it was graduated on various classes of goods from 8% to 15%. Two years later the top of the scale was raised to 25%. In 1950 it rose on some goods to 33%. In 1951 it was lifted all round again, starting at 12 1% and going as high as 66%. It rose again in '56 and from then it has been extended, amended, raised and Income tax was not known in Great shifted BUT never removed. The temporary tax had come to stay.

One Taxpayers Association has estimated that more than 50,000 peopl in Australia are employed to do the work involved in collecting the tax, filling out retsales tax. It is the real 'nightmare tax' gone wild. A 48 year temporary tax.

The question this bit of history raises is .. "How did government raise it's money before income and

sales taxes were devised?"

It was simple. In the beginning a major part of the taxes was raised by the land of the country being rented from the King, the even though you had exclusive right to use the land you were on, you had to pay an annual rent to the King or Government. The land was 'common property', the commons of old England being an example. You could in fact 'own' the land by a guaranteed right of perpetual use which you could pass on to your blizzard blew harder, it was raised property, belonging ultimately to the Crown from whom it was rented for an annual sum. The annual sums from all over the kingdom made up the nations revenue.

> Everything you produced was your own, you were not penalised for making an income as we are now. We are fined for trying to assist in the production of goods and services to keep ourselves and the country going.
