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## ANZAC DAY

Next Wednesday will be the 64th. anniversary of the landing on the Gallipoli Peninsula. On the 25th. April, 1915 men of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps went ashore at Anzac Cove. The campaign was a military disaster.

The combined British forces lost 115,000 men killed or wounded, the French 47,000 while the Turkish enemy estimated their casualties at 350,000. The only redeeming feature of the campaign was the skill exercised during the evacuation, which has only been rivalled at Dunkirk, Narvik and Greece in the second World War.

The official history of World War 1 reads:- "Though the expeditionary forces of the two Dominions were only in their infancy, and afterwards fought with success in greater battles, no campaign was so identified with them as this. In no unreal sense, it was on the 25th. of April 1915 that the consciousness of Australian nationhood was born."

From this concept came the vision of an Anzac Commemoration Day. The present generations may find it difficult to understand just what this day means to ex-servicemen and women. It is a day of remembrance and re-union. Throughout Australia and New Zealand, the presence of men and women at cenotaphs and war memorials is a symbolic visit to the graves of the fallen, scattered across the lands and oceans of the world. Because of this, it is a day which is observed by their relatives, their widows and their children.

Therefore, it is a day which could be and should be observed by people of all ages, and not just the ex-service people. Today, we have in our community, citizens who are not Australian by birth, who are invited to share the day with us. Many have their own memories of war and their own National days in which they can no longer take part.

"None can speak more eloquently of peace than those who have known the tragedy of war". Those who have known war pass on this message to those who have not.

Anzac Day provides this opportunity.

This day we remember the wounded, the sick and the maimed and all those who suffer from war. Many carry secret wounds, wounds of the mind which are not outwardly visible. No man, woman or child can experience war and not be affected in some way. Ex-servicemen and women will be remembering the bad times and the good times - memories of battle, of bombing, of fear and danger and the monotony of living miles away from home and loved ones.

These memories are so deeply impressed on sub-conscious minds that it takes little to bring them back.

To them, Anzac Day is a day of remembrance and will be as long as they live. They shall continue to observe this day on every succeeding April 25 no matter what alterations may be suggested or made to this day by other people. They would plead with those in authority not to lower the significance of Anzac Day by converting it to just another 'long weekend'. They gather on this day to remember that over 100,000 Australians have died for their country.

Over 2000 years ago, Pericles wrote:-

"They gave their lives. For that public gift, they received a praise that never ages and a tomb most glorious - not so much the tomb in which they lie, but that in which their fame survives."

Do not let us forget on this day of remembrance, the tomb in which our Anzacs lie.

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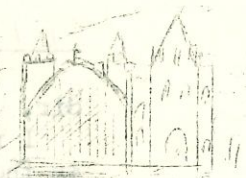

## FISHING

### Anglers Diary :

Sunday, 13 May. Seamander Angling Club surf contest at Wrinklers Beach, from 12 noon to 4 p.m.

Easter was a busy time for sea anglers with some good catches. On Good Friday, Seamander Angling Club conducted a surf contest at Four Mile beach. Although the water looked as though it should be teeming with fish, there were few bites until the last hour. First prize went to a new member, B. White from Ross with a 21lb 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz blackback. Second was Tom Oldham with a 11lb 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz salmon and third was Vern Jones with a 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz cocky. The Ladies trophy was won by a visitor, Mrs. C. Showell from Launceston with a 11lb 6oz blackback. Junior winner was I. Oldham with a 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz flathead.

All members are reminded there are only two more events in the '78/'79 season in which to win one of the annual trophies. So far, top weight in the open section is 21lb 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz by B. White last Friday, while the best the ladies can produce is 12oz by Mrs B Jamieson way back in September last year.

The Open Game Fishing Contest run by the Game Fishing Club of Northern Tasmania attracted a large entry of 41 boats. The entrance to George's Bay looked like a regatta course. Weather was as near to ideal on both days and on the second day, some good bluefin were caught. Results have already been published in the dailies. Best boat from St. Helens was 'Beryl J' captained by Wes Stone. Wes showed his crew how it was done by landing a 15kg bluefin on 6kg line. He has been awarded the honorary title of Top Rod. Bob Green was reported by radio as fishing in a horizontal position - he states it was unsuccessful.

The A.B.C. reported that one boat was towed from Seamander to Bicheno in about 5 hours. This is a distance of 45 kilometers in a straight line, so that fish must have been travelling. It would be a great help if this happened more often, as the other crew members could be trolling while the lucky angler fought his fish. One suspects that the outboard motor was used to attain such a speed. It was a great pity that the fish finally broke loose...or was it?

## FOUND ON LOCAL BEACHES

Recent events have shown that there could be a number of dangerous objects off our local coastline or littering the local beaches. Although they are of varying colours and sizes, they have one thing in common and that is that they all have an explosive potential.

Basically, they are cylinders of about 10cm in diameter and an overall length of about 46cm. Knowledge of their origin is unsure and of little benefit to anyone who is left without an eye or an arm or without some other part of their anatomy.

Persons finding such objects should not touch them or approach them in any way but rather contact police who will arrange for them to be dealt with properly by army authorities.

Remember, they don't look like bombs but rather like a section of four inch (10cm) pipe.

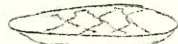
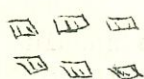

## CASEY'S COLUMN

I finished last time with an illustration of how the present AAV rating system is unfair to some and gives privilege to others. It is a 'backwards tax' and has long been recognised as needing elimination. I mentioned also that the proper basis for local taxes, or rates, is the unimproved value of the land, excluding completely every improvement made by the owner.

The use of the unimproved land value and not the assessed annual value as a rating basis as seen as a better method all around Australia where over 94% of the areas governed by Councils are now rated on the fairer basis of the land value only. The fairness of Site Value Rating is so apparent that two States, Qld. and NSW. have legislated to prevent any other system being used by Councils. Other States still allow Councils a choice of methods, but most have chosen to discard the discredited AAV basis in favour of SVR (Site Value Rating).

A fundamental base of SVR is that the value of unimproved land is created by the activity of the people and the services provided to the people by all governments, Federal, State and Local. The fact that land value is community created can be realised quite simply. Suppose all the people in St. Marys or Avoca were shifted fifty miles to another location. What would land values be in the ghost towns? What would they be in the new towns? It is obvious the people would take the land values with them and land prices would suddenly appear in the new towns as rapidly as they would vanish in the old.

A major part of the land value is created by the community's government, the Council. As Council adds it's services of roads, drains, water and other amenities, the land serviced by those facilities increases it's value. Take away all Council services from an area; take away all roads to leave not even tracks; take away water supplies; take away every other facility and see if land would hold it's value. Of course it wouldn't and it is as easily seen that unimproved land value is community created.

It is just as easy to see that instead of taxing an owners improvements by AAV rating, it is far more just to tax the owner on his share of the community created value. His share is measured by the unimproved value of his holding, for it increases as the services are provided, or falls as the services are withdrawn. It is an accurate barometer of community value.

Patient reader, the next paragraph sums up the conflict between the two rating systems I have been writing about in the past issues. If you can see the meaning clearly at the end of the paragraph, you will know it all.

It must be remembered that Council's rates are levied to recover it's costs in making it's services available, and this independently of whether the services are used by a particular owner or not.

The value given by Council's services is to the site and not the building, so it is the site value which should be rated, not the building. The costs have to be covered by rates from the property owners quite independently of whether their lots are built or vacant, used or unused. In raising rates to cover costs, the guiding principle, in fairness, should be to apportion the charges according to the general benefits received by the lot owners from the Council's services. These benefits obviously vary with location, being concentrated in the towns and fewer in the outermost sections. The differing degrees of benefit are most faithfully recorded in the variations of land value per foot or acre in the various parts of the district. To base the rate demand on the Site Value, appears therefore the fairest and most logical means of assessing a ratepayers obligation.

The present AAV system is absurd and unjust. Under it, ratepayers who improve their holdings are treated as offenders and they are fined by an increase of assessment and rates in proportion to the value of improvements they bring into existence. On the other hand, the owner of unimproved property receives special consideration and is financially rewarded. He pays a token amount in rates whereas the citizen who makes improvements is called upon to pay hundreds of dollars a year.

AAV has no defence. It must be replaced.
