Put yourself a question: - Who builds up death to such enormous importance? Slaves do it, those who cannot free themselves. Only those of indifferent spirit fear death. They always hope for something better in this world that they have not the spirit or discipline To him God was life; not human life, to bring to pass. They hold onto but all life - the life of trees, to bring to pass. They hold onto life wishing for a future they cannot create for themselves, and follow leaders who promise fruition without their efforts, by technology, new glands, new drugs, atomic energy, everything except liberation from men's fear of their own inferiority. But if you build, as every one is doing today, a thick powerful state, it has to have clay in its hands to mold as it wishes and it can do nothing with clay that molds itselfexcept exterminate it; Yet all the power in the world bends before one single strong soul. When I was in prison and concentration camp, "without hope", as they say; where people were jittery, frantic, and depressed, they were annoyed by me, who was a little older than most, because I was cheerful. Prison offers an uncomfortable opportunity for secure contemplation. I found in prison what a wonderful life I had had, it had been so wonderful really that I had no quarrel with whatever might come. I was 47 years old and had seen the mose beautiful art of Europe and the most beautiful places in the world, and perhaps created some beauty myself. If I died I had still had a wonderful life. But the others were more jittery than I. They were gamblers who had never had a straight flush. They wanted to live in order to cash in on all the investment of their lives and futures. They might have had Life and Happiness, but they mortgaged it to the vanity of recognition and power. As lone as one struggles for praise and acclaim, one is a slave. Competition among cowards is enormous. Competition among heroes is non-existant

unknown; it is a chance that greatress takes. But the recognised die too, and they cannot take it with them. I used the security of slavery to digest the experience of a lifetime of freedom.



#### A MEETING WITH THE C.E.S.

As requested by the Community Youth Support Scheme, the Commonwealth Employment Service will bring a team to St. Marys Hall at 11 pm on Thursday, 6th July, to discuss all aspects of the C.E.S. and unemployment problems with those interested.

The team will comprise of Miss Naomi King Manager of Launceston C.E.S., Terry Searson, Senior Employment Officer, and Ann Boer, Special Groups Employment Officer. They are conversant with all aspects of C.E.S. procedure. Terry has recently been working with the receiving and filling of jobs, and with the C.Y.S.S. Ann has been looking after special groups of unemployed including the handicapped, long-term unemployed, exprisoners and other disadvantaged

They will come with information on the N.E.A.T. Scheme including the special youth employment training programme (S.Y.E.T.P.). The current weekly rate for N.E.A.T. on-the-job subsidy is \$56.00 per week for adult trainees and \$41.00 for junior trainees. The subsidy is payable to an employer who is seeking a worker through the C.E.S. and unable to get some-one suitably skilled. In these circumstances, the employer can he subsidised for training a C.E.S. applicant who appears capable of fitting into the job after a training period. The S.Y.E.T.P. has been set up to assist young unemployed between the ages of 15 and 24 years if they have been unemployed

for four months out of the past 12 menths. This scheme gives an employer a subsidy of \$67.00 per week for a period of 6 months in return for giving employment with training. #### "JUST YARNIN""

Major Humphrey Grey and family finally arrived in Van Diemans Land from Ireland c.1828 after having spent 2 years on the way owing to being shipwrecked, and then going on to Rio de Janeiro to await another ship to Australia.

They were welcomed in Launceston by a brother, Captain James Humphrey of 'Rockford' (now incorporated in the 'Benham' Estate). They stayed at the Cornwall Hotel until they were all ready to begin the long journey by bullack wagon to Ayoca. For 2 years the family stayed at 'Rockford' while their own comfortable stone house at 'East Bourne' was being built, some land cleared and a few fences erected. The house was lined with cedar for a ship with a load of this wood had been wrecked in the Tampr and the cargo sold off at a farthing per foot, and consequently many of the early settlers' homes were panelled in cedar and graced with beautiful staircases, and inside shutters of the same material. Quite a number of the convicts were skilled carpenters takinga pride in their work under kind employers.

The Humphrey Greys had 5 children, 3 of whom were girls and what with the 68th Regiment stationed at Aveca and the general shortage of young women in the colony they were beseiged with hopeful callers, especially for Margaret who though only 16 was very lively and pretty. The younger, and quieter sister Catherine was a little later on much admired by young William Talbot out in Van Diemans Land on a visit to his Aunt and Uncle at 'Malahide'. However his Grandfather insisted he make the grand tour of Europe with a tutor as was the custom then, before settling down. So William sought permission to ask Catherine to marry him on his return. It seemed from his letter to Catherine written in Italy, that he was most impatient to get back, but instead both he and the tutor caught a fever from which William did not recover.

#### HOW TO PLANT NATIVES

During a recent visit to Hobart, -I was invited to attend a demonstration 'Planting out Natives'. Over some years I have planted several hundred with many successful and growing to maturity. On the other hand losses have been numerous and sometimes unaccountable. Perhaps I had not been planting them correctly? Sure enough I hadn't. The demonstration by Mr. Alan Gray of Hobart proved to be of the greatest benefit to a compulsive planter like me. As in cooking an exotic meal it is better to watch it actually being prepared and cooked rather than simply to read the recipe --- so with planting. However I shall dr my best with a "recipe".

First, dig a fair sized hole about 2' diameter and 1' deep. Remove grass and break up the soil to a friable consistency. Return enough soil to the hele so that the plant will sit level with the ground. A handful of Blood and Bone is beneficial at this point. Knock plant from the pct. Loosen the soil at the bottom and tease the roots a little making sure they lie straight and are not bent or curved. If they cannot be straightened they need to be trimmed off as also any roots which have grown through the bottom of the pot. Do NOT just fill up the hele and tramp it down with the feet or hands. This impacts the plant so firmly into the surrounding soil that it is almost like asking it to send its roots forth into cement. Instead work the scil gently with the hands and poke holes into it with the forefingers. Cover lightly to the base of the stem. Finally water gently but thoroughly twice allowing the first watering to sook in well before the second.

This method would surely be equally appreciated by exetic plants. Whatever the plants, give them a chance to expand and grow, so that they will not have to fight so hard to exist. It seems to make sense that a good start is all-important to future growth. And thanks to Mr. Alan Gray for showing us how to do it,
