



Letter to The Hon. D.J.Baldock, M.H.A., Minister for Main Roads and Transport from Mr. G.A. Shaw Member for Macquarie. (Copy)

### Re: Mathinna Road.

I write to again appeal to you and the Government to formulate and announce a programme for re-constructing and sealing the Mathinna

I visited the Upper Esk area on The heavily traffick-Tuesday 20th. ed Mathinna Road was rough, wet and slippery and in some places quite dangerous.

Enclosed is a press report following the opening of the bridge across the South Esk, North of Fingal on the Mathinna Road on Friday, March Please note that the 31st, 1967. Minister at that time, Mr. Cashion said, - "The road to Mathinna would be sealed during the 5-year sealing plan beginning in 1969". Since 1937 we have seen the advent of the wood-chip industry and a considerable extension of pine plantation work in the Mathinna -Upper Esk areas.
