BIASED REPORTS

It would appear, following some recent well- publicised activities at our High School, that most of what constitutes 'news' is really a reporting of abnormal, unusual or deviant behavious with sufficient re-inforcing of the worries and insecurities of the community to keep the 'news' bubbling for some days.

The fascination/revulsion approach is fine for newspaper sales and TV ratings. But the continued reporting of deviant behaviour, the constant references to abnormal activities, always threatens to re-define the public concept of what is normal and what is not normal. The over and over references to unusual activities dulls the readers or listeners reaction to the behaviour. The lack of response to the 'news' is taken to be acceptance, and the community finds it's attitudes artificially established.

The reporting of the recent events at the St. Marys School, by Channel Nine and the Examiner, was an example of the way in which the media can perform in this finely balanced act of social opinion control. The attitudes of one side only were given proper coverage. The angry silent najority was not consulted or reported. It would appear, to a reador or viewer elsewhere, that there was only one opinion in the township.

We know this is not the case, So does Channel Nine; so does the Examiner. Both news sources have lost local credibility because of their wisrepresentations in this affair.

CASEYS COLUMN

At the neuting of the Fingal Council last Monday, I put forward a notion that this municipality change it's rating basis to the land value, and stop taxing the improvements. The notion could not be accepted because of a technicality so it has been listed for the next meeting in November.

I have been unitally about the unfair, discriminatory rating system this last seven months. I have spoken to many rate-payers in that time and so far all have agreed that the targing of improvements is wrong; it needs changing. Over the next month I hope to speak to many more to gather opinions on changing to the Site Value base, so that at the next Council meeting I can put your combined opinions with mine to show how much the change is supported.

There is one point worthy of repetition; let me state again that 94%, repeat 94%, of the land in this nation is rated by Site Value. More numicipalities are turning to it year by year because it is the proven, incontestible fairest way to raise the local taxes we call Rates. It is not something new; it is not something I have dreamed up; it is not a system to give privilege to some and not others; it is not something to benefit me. It is the proven, accepted, inevitable method to raise rates.

If you have been reading this column regularly, you will know the arguments against the present Assessed Annual Value system used at the moment, the one you were taxed under this year; which taxes your every effort improve your own comfort, even though the services of the Council are not increased. It is a foolish, unfair, out-of-date system and has to be discarded.

At his Movember meeting of the Council my motion to bring our municipality into line with the majority of this country will voted upon. If you support the point of view that I have put forward in this column over the past few months, then you should write to; talk to; ring or otherwise let your local Councillor know you support the change. Despite the smaple of 94% of the country, some Mouncillors of Fingal Municipality have reservations.

If the Councillors reject the change, if they vote to retain the old, unjust and mostly dicarded AAV system then any change to your rates cannot occur until TWO YEARS time, because of some provisions in the Local Government Act. If this municipality is to come up to date with it's rating methods; if it is to play fair with all it's ratepayers and not just a few; then the elected representatives must carefully consider their vote on this important

overdue reform and give it their support at the next neeting.

Let me repeat another significant statistic, or piece of information. We municipality in Australia, having changed to Site Value Rating, has ever changed back to Assessed Annual Value. Home what-sever. Site Value is proven method we have to adopt. I am trusting in the good sense of my fellow Councillors to help me bring in this reform next month.

EVERCLEECH RESERVE

The Forestry Commission recently gazetted fourteen reserves as areas for special public enjoyment.

The Evercreech Ferest Reserve has as it's it's centre piece a giant white gum which was dicevered in 1975. The tree is scientifically known as Eucalyptus Vininalis.

It is estimated to be more than three hundred years old and stands at ninety metres high; making one of the tallest of it's species in the world, and rivalling the world's tallest known hardwood tree, a Mountain Ash in the Styx Valley in Southern Tasmania.

The other reserves are at Oldina, Milkshake Hills near Smithton, Dalgarth near Port Sorell, Holly-bank near Launceston, Tahunc where the Arve Road crosses the Muon River and Upper Natone.

The Commission is developing the reserves for public use and enjoyment. It is also seen as a means whereby the rublic can have access to forest areas for not just recreation, but also as a place of education in the techniques of forestry, including tree felling, log handling and regeneration techniques.
