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QUIET TNVASION

The last ten years or so have seen the birth in each state of organisations aimed at advising people on civil liberties and protecting them from invasions of their privacy or deprivation of their legal rights.

It has seen too, the entry into this field by Government organisations such as consumer affairs councils and ombudsmen.

Many private and government supported bod ies exist to assist the private individual find his way through the complex society maze of legal aid, pension payments, women's rights, family law, tenancy, local government and the like. And each time we use a facility like these we create a record.

All through our lives we provide a great deal of personal information to Government bodies and private companies for legitimate reasons...from the time when our birth is registered to our death certificate being lodged. In each case there is a reason for doing so at the time.

when our civil liberties are at risk is when this information is put to a use other than that for which it is given in the first place; cr the information is made available to someone other than the person to whom we made it available.

Take for example that it is widely known that most people have a "credit rating". Whether or not you can get credit from a hire purchase company or a bank may depend on the information on your 'file'. You may be refused credit and never know why. You may have been recorded as a bad debtor because of a dispute you had with the company. The record could permanently harm your rating as it becomes part of the 'common fund' of financiers information.

You also provide the information of the name of a near relative so you can be tracked down easier if you default, but surely that does not give the company the right to approach that relative to try and 'sell' them credit.

That sort of activity is cause for genuine concern, it is an infringement of our own liberty, in that freely given information is a -used without our consent.

As our society will become more and more complicated we will be subject, regrettably, to more laws, regulations, bureaucracies and controls and these will come more and more into our everyday lives.

Private companies will become bigger and demand our attention for their product and services,

As the silicon chip will allow greater sophistication in communications and recording, there will be a quantum loap in the information exchange business with computer filing and recall systems. These developments are an advancement of our society but each is capable of encroaching on our individual rights and our rights to protect our privacy.

It is worth asking ourselves how much privacy we are entitled to in our present social arrangement. Each time we have a form to fill in it is wise to ask why the information is required and if it is really necessary, by whom it may be used and in what circumstances and if we would expect that the publication of this information would not benefit us, we should think seriously about providing it. And the more you work it out, the more you will see that if you want to maintain your personal privacy almost totally, you will be unable to exist comfortably in the society.

George Orwell would be chuckling.

A successful Drama Evening was held at St. Marys School on Tuesday, 23 October with good attendance from parents. The show was produced by Bob Blackman.

Grade 6, directed by Jill Saville, produced a very enjoyable and upboat Little Red Riding Hood. Tanya Haas, as Miss Hood, gave an almost flawless performance for a first effort and her support cast were pleasant to hear and handled their parts well. The rhyming couplets which told the well known story made this play the feature of the evening.

Grade 7 with the "Stolen Prince" produces by Bob Blackman, showed flashes of what may be expected in the future from this group. Katherine Denney as the Chorus was the mainstay of this play. The scene changes were handled promptly and use of imaginative props was a highlight although I felt the fish could have been a bit bigger.

Villa on Venus - an out of this world conic absurdity from Grade 8 had Karen Ridges as Shan, a Venusian and Jane Wardlaw as Frank Fearless the Earthling. Both showed much promise for future productions. Much of the story was lost on the audience because of the cast speaking too softly and not positioning well on stage. Some noise from the body of the hall contributed to the lack of clarity of this play. However, the jarring impactof the rocket ship crash certainly brought some of the audience out of their seats and Acft no-one in doubt the rocket had crashed.

The sets throughout the evening were a delight to see and the Art Department and the artists responsible are to be congratulated for their work. The lighting could have had more variation - perhaps more thought will improve this in future shows. All the players could have improved their performance by greater voice projection by use of the old "Stand up, look up, speak up" advice.

Considering it was a first attempt for all players, the night was a success and we can obviously look forward to bigger and better shows. At 20c, 50c and \$1 family it really was worthwhile country entertainment.

Footnote: Could we have the seating in the hall improved? Rusty steel seats add to dicomfort and noise.

Perhaps also a creche for parents who have to to bring young children. They could be left safely out of earshot of players and audience.

Congratulations to Bob Blackman for putting on the show.
