

FISHING

Scamander Angling Club held their last contest for the year at Wrinklers Beachlast Sunday. About thenty fish were landed which is not enough to get you excited. Vinner was visitor II. Jackson with a 21b. flathcad. Don't be mistaken about this as Club Secreatry was a non-starter that day. Runner-up was the consistent Cyril Turner with Bill White from Ross taking third prize.

All Club members will receive a newsletter soon, giving details of forthcoming events in the first six months of 1980.

Game fishermen will soon learn of some alterations to the rules, recently made by the International Game Fishing Association and approved by the Game Fishing Association of Australia. Two new line classes have been introduced - 2 kg and 4kg while the old 3kg will be dropped. The reason behind this is that the I.G.F.A. is the recording body for all world records and in the U.S.A. these records include fresh vater fishing as well. The maximum length for double line and trace has been increased to 13 metres for all line classes. The maximum allowable length of the trace is 9 metres which leave 4 metres for the double. These two lengths may be varied by the angler provided that they fall within the above limits. Tasmania will not adopt the new line classes until the 1980/81 season:


