ADVICE TO WALKERS

SAFETY ESSENTIALS:

- 1. CLOTHING: Strong waterproof boots and long woollen trousers are essential for survival under adverse weather conditions. Gloves, balaclava or hat, woollen singlet, shirt, socks and jumpers must be carried even in summer. A waterproof parka with a hood is also essential.

- 3. CHECK IN AND OUT: Before setting out, check with the Park Ranger and be guided by his advice. Remember to fill in your proposed schedule in the log book before commencing walking. Record your progess in the huts on route and check out with the Ranger when leaving the park.
- 4. PARK BEHAVIOUR: Keep the park clean and completely extinguish all fires before moving on. Leave firewood in woodboxes provided, for the next party. There are no toilet facilities provided. You are requested to get well away from huts and water supplies.
