CHURCH CORNER

Letter to the Hon. M.W. Field, M.H.A.,
Minister of the Main Roads from Mr. George
Shaw, M.L.

Re: Esk Highway - St. Marys.

Travelling East and immediately East of the St. Marys Catholic Church the Esk Highway turns to the right around a bank which restricts its vision to such an extent that a traffic hazard is created which is unacceptably dangerous.

The limited visibility is such that when using the access to the church grounds motor vehicles travelling West on the highway are unable to see a vehicle until an accident is almost unavoidable.

My understanding is that while access to the Church has always been at this point, the danger has increased dramatically over recent years of improvements to the road and to the engineering of motor vehicles. A situation has now evolved where to leave the church property and particularly to turn East without knowing what may suddenly appear from the East is extremely dangerous.

Would you please undertake an engineering survey of the corner and take the necessary steps to remove the hazard.

I am sending a copy of this letter to your colleague the Hon. Michael Polley, M.H.A., who represents the area and would be familiar with the problem.

SAFETY ESSENTIALS:

4. **PARK BEHAVIOUR:** Keep the park clean and completely extinguish all fires before moving on. Leave firewood in woodboxes provided, for the next party. There are no toilet facilities provided. You are requested to get well away from huts and water supplies.
