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#### AUSTRALIA'S ENERGY SITUATION.

The cost of energy & fuel are matters affecting almost everyone

in the community.

For years domestic & industrial users have installed appliances & machines on the basis of availability & lower comparative cost of petroleum based fuels. Hovever, events over the past five years have drastically altered this situation. Australia must prepare itself now for the changes which will be necessary when the world, which is so heavily dependent on petroleum products, finds that potroleum is no longer readily available at an acceptable cost. The presise time when oil supplies will be exhausted is not known but as the world parity price rises, the incentive to expand & open up marginal oil wells increases.

Many consumers have been hard hit by the rising cost of fuel. An ex-ample of increasing cost to industry is provided by one Tasmanian firm that recently submitted that the cost of using furnace fuel oil as a power source in 1978 was \$158 000 Commission quotation approximated \$1 500 000 per annum after conversion costs. Whilst we are concerned about cost, the question of supply poses a far more pressing problem. In Australia we must still consider rationing.

The adoption of import parity pricing is a responsible policy to encourage more oil exploration, promotion of conservation of fuel, & fostering the development of alternative energy sources.

Australia generally has no energy supply crisis, the degree of self sufficiency is evident in the vast reserves we have of coal, natural gas, uranium & oil shale. However, reserves must be utilized to promote the conservation of petroleum fuels on which much of our industry & agriculture is dependent. Momentarily, Tasmania's energy problems appear greater than those of some other greater than those of some other states.

On the mainland Australia possesses an abundance of fuels for generating electricity

which in the long term may be used to supplement our hydro resources through

a Bass Strait submarine cable.
Both the Government & Opposition acknowledges that all petroleum products (whether oil, natural gas, of LPG) are, in world & national terms, finite & diminishing resources, interrelated in their usage & therefore inter-related in their pricing. Labor favours a resource tax as a means of collecting the revenue while the Government sees such a move as making fuel dearer than under its import

parity pricing policy.
Synthetic fuels are also being extensively researched, & there appears to be sore possibility of a proportion of our petroleum fuels being replaced by alcohol produced from various crops. Other measures suggested include increased allocation for oil exploration, an upgrading of public transport systems in principal cities, electrif-ication of railways, providing an incentive for motorists to usealternative fuels & in improving vehicle efficiency. In the present climate because of distances between principal cost of using furnace fuel oil as a power source in 1978 was \$158 000 but was estimated to be \$590 000 in 1980. Conversion to electricity offers no relief in that operating costs provided by the Hydro Electric costs are rising at unacceptably high rates. Therefore there may be some justification for interim measures to reduce the excise duty on diesel fuel for heavy haulage costs provided by the Hydro Electric costs are rising at unacceptably high rates. ation.

Although there is no single panacea that will solve our energy problems, Australia is better situated with more alternative resources than most other countries in the world. ourselves fortunate in that our fuel costs are still substantially lower than those in most other countries & further, to date, we have no countries and the world. These envied resources should help us maintain sectority, providing we pursue our alternatives & give proper consideration to the multiple forms of energy that are These envied natives & give proper consideration to the multiple forms of energy that are available & conserve, where feasible, our petroleum fuels.

The Government is examining measures to ease difficulties arising from certain inequitable effects of parity pricing on some sections of the commun-ity & to minimise the impact of the levy on the standard of living. There is also a case for a portion of oil levy excise revenue to be used in

general taxation relief.
