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THIRD WORLD COUNTRYS Like many other political terms, the expression 'the Third World' can be rather vague. It is a term used to explain those countries in Latin America, Africa, Asia & the Pacific which are not developed in either the Western sense or the Communist sense & accordingly do not align themselves with any of the world powers, but favour a neutral stance in foreign relations. Many of the Third World countries share a colonial past & are rich in natural resources such as the developing countries of the Middle East.

From Australia's point of view, the most important Third World count-Pacific region. This includes North & South Korea, Laos, Vietnam, Thailand & Kampuchea far north, Malaysia, Indonesia, the Phillipines & Papua New Guinea & the tiny nations with Papua New Guinea, our former colony & nearest neighbour. Since independence, the former Prime Minist. ries are our neighbours in the Asian

Australia is also making positive efforts to strengthen relationships with key Third World countries outside our immediate vicinity - for example, India, Mexico & Brazil.
This step in important because all countries are important in their own right, & as stated in the Report to the Federal Government of the Committee on Australia & Bolations with ittee on Australia's Relations with the Third World "...good relations

in 1951 which aided countries of
South & South-East Asia.
Although the bulk of our total

trade is conducted with the main centres of economic power, Australias trade in the six years between 1973/4 & 1978/79 with developing countries has increased above the total average. Our total imports in this period have increased by 126% whilst our imports from Third World countries have increased by 150%. ies have increased bb 150%. Similartotal imports have increased by 106% whilst exports to developing nations have risen by 155%.

Our most important neighbours in an

overall national sense are the island states of the South Pacific. This is due to their limited stature

as independent nations & their consequent considerable though varying degree of dependence on Australia as the largest power in the immediate region. Australia provides technical & economic assistance & seeks to develop educational & cultural potential. This potential must be pursued & main -tained vigorously as a further means of encouraging & emphasising our shar-ed interests in the security, independence, political stability, prosperity, growth & development of our region.

The conduct of our relations with these countries is important to our reputation as a country which has a sensitive & responsive attitude to the asporations our our neighbours. The

independence, the former Prime Minister, Mr. Somare, has not sought to maintain an exclusive & favoured relationship with Australia. Mr. Somare guided his fledgling nation well throughout the difficult beginnings of independence. 


