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ROAD TRANSPORT

The recent truck blockades on the mainland had a sequel here in Tasmania. The reasons for the disputes were different in both places, and despite the publicity given to both blockades, the real 'ripoff' in the trucking industry was not revealed. It is not the levying of a road tax or the underpayment for loads, but it is the enormous hidden subsidy paid annually to a totally uneconomic industry by the general public through government expenditure on roads.

In New South Wales, the Department of Main Roads stated in a 1975 report that the damage to roads caused by one truck with a single rear axle carrying double tyres causes 10,000 times as much damage as one family sedan to the roads over which they both pass. The report stated that the degree of damage caused by vehicles is directly related to weight.

An increase of 20% in vehicle weight doubles road wear and damage and that if gross loadings of all vehicles were increased by 20%, road life would be halved.

But the truck mentioned above is a small one. The present legal upper limit for Gross Vehicle Weight is about 36 tonnes and a truck of that weight therefore causes about 600,000 times as much damage as an average sedan every time it passes over a particular section of road.

It is even worse than that! The average private sedan travels about 20,000 km. a year, whilst to be 'economic', transport trucks have to be used for 150,000 to 200,000 km. each year. Assuming, most conservatively, that one of those heavy vehicles travels $7\frac{1}{2}$ times the annual 'mileage' of the family car, then each year one large transport or log truck causes as much damage to our roads as $4\frac{1}{2}$ million private cars.

It is perfectly clear that if truck operators were required to pay for the construction and repair of roads in the same proportion that they wear them out, there would not be one single long-haul heavy highway vehicle on the country's roads and that nearly all freight carried

interstate and long distances within States would be carried by the railways at the real cost of doing so.

An extensive inquiry into the actual costs of different forms of transport is an urgent necessity so that the most economic method for each type of transit required to be performed can be ascertained, resources sensibly allocated and the real user cost be charged to those who incur it.

If that were done, the 'free lunch' enjoyed by the road transport industry, at the expense of the taxpayers to the tune of thousands of millions of dollars each year in road maintenance and construction costs, might be brought to an overdue end.

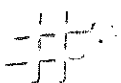

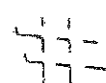

CASEYS COLUMN

I intended this time to move onto a new subject and leave aside the Rating system for a time, but there are a couple of things left to say which are of interest, judging by the questions I have been asked recently. It is encouraging to have had a number of people talk to me about the issue I have been writing upon. In all cases they have agreed with the points raised in these articles.

Whilst unanimous agreement is encouraging, it is not entirely unexpected, because the argument in favor of Land Value Rating CANNOT BE CONTRADICTED. It is the fairest method of all ways to raise rates, which is why most of the country uses it. It is the method that Councilors and ratepayers must turn to sometime. The purpose of this series of articles is to arouse some thought on the subject and hopefully lead to a change.

No municipality in Australia, having changed to Land Value Rating, has ever changed back to Assessed Annual Value rating. Some confused Councils have tried to change back, but in every case, ratepayers have voted to retain Land Value Rating above any other method. In all such polls, LVR has been the winner by significant margins. This is a great and proving recommendation for LVR. As ratepayers learn of the unfairness of AAV rating and see the natural fairness of LVR, they invariably vote to stay with Land Value Rating.

The same would happen here. Given a trial in Pingal or Portland, LVR would immediately be accepted as the ratepayers choice of methods.

I have on my desk a pile of meticulously researched surveys comparing LVR rated areas to AAV rated areas. In every case, the LVR areas show significant growth and improvements whilst the AAV areas in comparison lag behind and often recede. It is obvious that if the tax on improvements is abolished people will make more improvements, the same as lifting the tax on motor vehicles would result in a greater trading in them.

A change in the rating method to Land Value Rating would not increase or decrease Council's income; it would stay the same. The total amount of rates raised doesn't change, only the method of raising them changes; and does so for the better because the ridiculous tax on improvements and buildings is abolished.

A change in the rating method to Land Value Rating would redistribute the rate burden to all property owners, not just those who have improved their properties.

It is the fairest rating method possible and it eliminates all the anomalies of

AAV that have been pointed out in previous columns.

I repeat my invitation of last issue for any person to write and justify why we should not change to Land Value Rating and throw out the archaic AAV method.

I do not expect the invitation to be accepted because, as said at the beginning, the case for Land Value Rating cannot, repeat cannot, be contradicted.

In future columns I'll occasionally come back to report on how the campaign to change the Rating system is progressing in other places and other ways, but for now enough has been said.
