PINUS RADIATA - THE MONEY TREE

Growing trees is particularly suitable for the farmer seeking deductible expenditure which will enhance long term prospects. Forestry builds up large future cash reserves while the major costs can be met at present day values.

The delay between planting and harvesting means that money and land used in the project will not yield returns for many years and this may be more than many small farmers can afford. However, tree-planting is tax deductible, so the cost is much lower for big taxpayers. Interest-free Government loans further reduce the outlay while those who use their own labour and machines can save about 50 percent of a contractor's charges.

The real costs of investment in farm forestry can be further reduced by using land that is unsuitable for farming.

Pinus radiata is the most widely used species in southern Australia. Sites must be in a high rainfall area (over 700mm a year) and have suitable soil and slopes.

Well managed plantations of *Pinus radiata* of 20 hectares or more in size, with access to enable timber extraction and situated within 50 kilometres of timber-using industries will have the best market prospects.

A major benefit of the investment is that the crop's physical yield can be measured accurately well before selecting a harvest year that best suits the farmer's financial and tax needs.

Like other farm produce, timber sales are affected by market forces and marketing at a preferred time and price may not be possible. Most State Governments provide free expert advice on forestry ventures.

The Victorian Forest Commission quotes royalties of \$4,000 to \$5,000 a hectare in 20 years for well managed forests suitably located. It estimates *Pinus radiata* establishment costs at \$230 a hectare, plus clearing, fencing and major road costs.
