## ASSISTANCE TO THE UNEMPLOYED

In 1979-80 employment rose by 2.4% - the largest rise since 1973/74. Employment in 1980/81 is expected to grow by 1.75%. However, with a growing labour force this will not be sufficient to bring about a significant fall in unemployment.

The participation rate in the labour force recorded a small increase in 1979/80. This indicates that employment growth was accomplished by attracting more people into the workforce rather than by reducing the number unemployed - reflecting the adaptability & flexibility of the workforce as a whole, but highlighting the rigidities among some of those remaining unemployed.

In order to assist the unemployed, a number of manpower & training programs have been developed by the Government. These are designed to:-

- \* better match job seekers with job opportunities.
- \* upgrade skills to meet the needs of the changing economic environment of the 1980's
- \* provide incentives to employers to increase intakes of apprentices & the quality of their training.
- \* assist young people in the transition from school to work
- \* provide work experience for those finding it difficult to obtain work
- \* meet the needs of special groups
- \* maintain the motivation & work orientation of young people

In 1980/81, 236,000 Australians will be assisted under the Government's manpower, training & youth support schemes.

\$138.57m has been allocated to these schemes - an increase of 22% on 1979/80. The Commonwealth Government has also committed \$50m to the School to Work Transition Program in 1980 & 1981. Tasmania will receive over \$900,000 of this.

The National Employment & Training Scheme (NEAT) is expected to assist 101,050 people in 1980/81. It assists individuals to undertake training in occupations where there are employment opportunities, in the form of on-the-job training, or through formal courses.

Specialised training programs contribute to the supply of skills currently in demand.

The Education Program for Unemployed Youth helps young job-seekers receive additional education - remedying basic skill deficiencies such as literacy & numeracy.

The Government provides relocation assistance to the unemployed who are willing to move to an area where their skills are in demand. 1450 people were assisted under this scheme in 1979/80.

There are a number of trade training support schemes being conducted. Commonwealth Rebate for Apprentices Full-time training (CRAFT) compensates employers for the costs of releasing apprentices to attend courses at technical education colleges.

The Commonwealth also provides for payment of an allowance to young people doing approved pre-apprenticeship courses. Over 2000 young people are expected to benefit from this in the new financial year.

The Group One Year Scheme is run for 1st year apprentices. Privately employed trainees are trained in Government establishments for a period before returning to their employers. The Commonwealth pays the wage costs of apprentices in their 1st yr.

In areas where employers, unions & State Training authorities agree that there is a shortage of certain tradesmen, & that existing training arrangements are inadequate, special trade training arrangements are being introduced.

The Commonwealth pays a rebate to employers to release adult employees to be trained under this scheme.

The income test applied to the payment of Unemployment Benefits has been liberalised in the new Budget - a single person over 18 can reach an income of \$81.45 per week including their benefits, before benefits are reduced on a \$ for \$ basis. For a married person with dependant spouse the income will be \$134.80 (\$102.50 previously). For a married person with a dependant spouse & 4 children it will be \$164.80 (\$132.50 previously).

# NATIONAL STAMP WEEK

National Stamp Week (a week set aside for the promotion of stamps and stamp collecting) will this year be conducted from September 29th to October 5th. All over Australia philatelic societies as well as Australia Post will be displaying all facets of stamp collecting in an effort to assist collectors and prospective collectors in a greater knowledge of the hobby. As in previous years Australia Post will be making a significant contribution to the National Stamp Week activities on the local scene. A competition for most school children in the area has been organised inviting children to design a poster, the competition will be split into two major sections and prizes will include a wall plaque for each section as well as award certificates. As well as an audio/visual presentation has been prepared for schools and the theme for this year is the history of posts. The story is told in rather light-hearted fashion thru the eyes of Pennyquick Q Post a character specially devised for stamp week activities. As well as displaying all winning posters St. Marys Post Office will have on display most aspects of stamp collectingie. used, mint, first day covers, presentation packs, pre-stamped envelopes, pictorial postmarks, cinderella issues and thematic collecting. To commemorate National Stamp Week Australia Post will issue a strip of five different stamps joined together and a miniature sheet of three stamps depicting aspects of postal history. In addition a pre-stamped envelope will be issued to mark the occasion of Sydrex 80 a major philatelic exhibition being held in Sydney. September 29th will have special significance for both St. Marys and Fingal post offices, on this day a pictorial first day of issue postmarker will be introduced. Tasmania leads the way in the provision of these much sought after items with most major offices having a distinctive postmarker. The St. Marys postmarker will depict Christ Church Cullenswood, this beautiful stone building was erected in 1847 on land given and at his expense by Robert V. Legge and was the first church to be built in this area. Fingal, being the only major coal producing area in Tasmania will use a coal mining theme for its postmarker. These postmarkers will be used for every new issue so here is a chance to build a unique collection of postmarkers
