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HOME SAVINGS GRANT SCHEME

The Federal Government aims to encourage and help all Australians to buy their own home. One way of doing this is through the Home Savings Grant Scheme which was first introduced in 1964. This scheme enables many people to receive financial assistance from the Federal Government in buy their first home.

The grant is a tax free gift not a loan. Its aim is to increase the proportion of total savings available for housing by encouraging people to save with those institutions that provide the bulk of housing finance.

The Scheme is open to a wide variety of people to qualify for the grant, regardless of marital status. Those who are under 18 years of age are not eligible unless they are married or engaged to be married. There is no age limit.

A grant may be made towards buyint an established home, or buildine one, whether is be a house,
home unit, or flat, or other type
of dwelling in the city or county. However, it must be the first
home of the person applying for
the grant who must intend to occupy it as a principal place of
residence within a reasonable
time. There is a qualifying value
limit of \$60,000 - \$70,000 which
applies to the home (including
the land) acquired from 1 October
1980.

Those people who are eligible may receive a grant of up to \$2000 (or \$3000 including the Family Bonus). The grants are paid on a proportional basis to acceptable savings held at the contract date by the applicant/s. Savings held with savings banks, building societies, credit unions or fixed deposit with trading banks, and payments made in connection with the acquisition of the land or home, or construction of the home on or before the date of contract

to build or buy the home, are acceptable savings.

Applications should be lodged as soon as possible after the prescribed date, that is, the date; you contract to buy or build your home or commence construction as an owner-builder.

Even if you have no plans now to build or buy a first home you should save in the acceptable forms so that you will be sure to qualify for the grant later on.

There is currently a 9 month waithing period between receipt of the application and payment of the Grant. Senator John Watson last week asked the Minister for Housin and Construction to reduce the time because it can cause financial concern and stress to people who find it difficult to find bridging finance between the time that the money has to be paid to complete the contract and the receipt of the Home Savings Grant.

Senator Watson will be pleased to give further information on this subject or assist with any queries people may have.

ANZAG DAY

Next Saturday willbe the 66th anniversary of the landing on the Gallipoli Peninsular by men of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. By the 19th December those who survived were evacuated, leaving behind the graves of 9000 comrades of the combined British forces. Total killed or wounded from British forces was 115,000 and the French lost 47,000 while the Turkish enemy estimated their casualties at 350,000. The campaign was a military disaster with the only redeeming feature being the skill exercised during the evacuation.

The official history of World War I reads: - "Though the expeditionary forces of the two Domin-ions were only in their infancy, and afterwards fought with success in greater battles, no campaign was so identified with them as this. In no unreal sense, it was on 25th April 1915 that the consciousness of Australian manhood was born."

From this concept came the vision of an Anzac Commenoration Day. The present generation may find it difficult to understand just what this day means to ex-servicemen and women. It is a day of of rememorance, remembrance and re-union. Through our Anzacs lie. out Australia and New Zealand, the presence of men and women at cenotaphs and war memorials represents a symbolic visit to the graves of the fallen, scattered across the lands and the oceans of the

It is a day which could and should be observed by people of all ages and not only those who, in some way, were involved. Today, we have in our community, citizens who are not Australian by birth

who are invited to share the day with us. Many have their own memories of war and their own National days in which they can no longer take part.

As fewer old soldiers march, Anaac Day comes closer in the best sense, to being Australia's One Day of the Year, a day on which Australians can ponder on the awesome reality of a person sacrificing his or her life that many others may live. As time passes, the issue of the morality of the wars in which the sacrifices were made will dissipate even further, giving way, finally, to this, the essence of Anzac Day.

"None can speak more eloquently of peace than those who have known the tragedy of war.". Those who have known war pass on this message to those who have not. Over 2000 years ago, the Greek writer, Pericles, wrote: -
