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THE SENATE

As a Senator representing all Tasmanians in Federal Parliament I believe the electorate should be more aware of the nature of a politician's work.

The Senate is the Upper House of the Federal Parliament of Australia. In the Senate the States are equally represented - thus the less populous states such as Tasmania cannot be dominated by the greater numbers in the larger states.

The Senate acts as a house of review, slowing down hasty legislation; suggesting amendments if necessary, to proposed laws. For eg. in the Autumn session of Parliament the Senate moved 25 amendments to 6 bills. Clearly the Senate is not the rubber stamp it has been labelled by some critics.

From time to time Government Senators will cross the floor on certain issues to vote with the Opposition. However, this action is not taken lightly.

Senators are elected for a term of six years, half retiring every third year.

To assist the Senate in its reviewing functions a committee system was established in 1970 comprising Estimates Committees, Legislative & General Purpose Standing Committees. The Committee system gives Parliament recourse to its own independent and expert advice, in a time when specialization is a necessary approach to modern technology.

The Committee System takes Parliament to the people, seeking opinions from interested organisations & individuals - creating formal channels of communication between the people & their Government; setting up a means of improving the accountability between the electors, parliamentarians & public servants.

The Standing Committees of the Senate can be divided into three groups. These committees 'stand' for the duration of a Parliament.

1. Domestic Committees are concerned with the affairs of Parliament itself - the Library, Publications for examples.

2. Legislative & General Purpose Committees are related to the whole range of Government activities, from constitutional & legal affairs to Trade, the Arts,

National resources etc. Since 1970 these Committees have presented over 90 reports to the Senate, on such diverse issues as drug abuse, overseas trade, handicapped persons. Petitions from citizens may also be referred to the standing committees - a trend towards greater public participation in national affairs.

3. The Regulations & Ordinances Committee reviews regulations (a rule made by the Governor-General on advice from the Government, which is under the authority of a statute) & ordinances (a territorial decree), to ensure that they do not impose on personal rights & liberties, should not be a matter for parliamentary enactment, & are in accordance with the statute.

The Estimates Committees examine the annual estimates of expenditure by Government departments. Ministers & departmental officers answer questions about proposed expenditure.

'Select Committees' may be appointed to investigate and report on a specific matter (such as air pollution, road safety) within a time limit. They are then dissolved.

There are a number of important committees which comprise both Senators & Members of the House of Representatives - Joint Committees. One such Committee is the Public Accounts Committee which examines the past year's spending to see that Australians received value for the taxes they paid to the Government.

better.

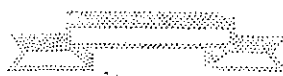

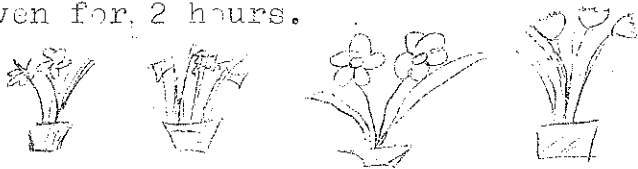

Home Product: Pumpkin Fruit Cake

Recipe:

4ozs butter, 2tsps. grated orange rind, 8ozs. sugar, 2 eggs, 1 tsp. vanilla essence, 1 cup mashed, cooked pumpkin, 1 tbsp. honey or golden syrup, 6 ozs s.r. flour, 2 ozs plain flour, 1 tsp mixed spice 1lb mixed dried fruit, split blanched almonds (optional)

Cream butter, orange rind & sugar. Add eggs, one at a time. Mix in vanilla essence, pumpkin, & honey or syrup. Fold in sifted flours & spice alternatively with mixed fruit. Pour into greased & lined 8" tin. Top with split blanched almonds, if liked, & bake in moderately slow oven for 2 hours.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

At first sight, Scott Marshall's call to arms sounds impressive, but on closer analysis one wonders just what these fine-sounding phrases really mean. For example, take "divided political leadership". Is he referring to divisions within the coalition, where every brand of moral infamy has been practised from gerrymander to forgery? Or is he perhaps referring to the fact that some opposition politicians appear to disgrace with what Malcolm Fraser is doing to Australia.

This point leads us on to "militant unionism", cited by Marshall as another cause of division. One does not have to be an Einstein to understand why unions have become more militant, when we remember that the real wages of workers have dropped by about 10% since Fraser came to power.

Because the divisions within Australia seem to be the basic concern of Marshall I suggest that he takes a good look at the policies of the Prime Minister. If there is one word that sums up Fraser more than any other it is "division". He has taken that old maxim of the conqueror, "divide and rule" at its ultimate. Wherever one looks in Australia today, and here Mr Marshall and myself are in agreement there is division. Division between poor and wealthy, employer and employee, farmer and meatworker, young and old, working wives and young girls, athlete and athlete and so on. The list is endless.

And the reason why Malcolm Fraser needs to divide Australia is because he has no coherent policy with which to unite us, no call to encourage idealistic youth, no imagination for long-term planning, no inspiration for the future, and worst of all, no provision in his power play for the lives and welfare of countless thousands of the old, the pensioners and handicapped, the unemployed, the deserted wives and all those who are on the bottom of the heap and who, with this man as Prime Minister, are likely to stay there.

No, Mr Marshall it is going to take more than the waving of flags and the cleaning of rubbish to cure this one.

MANAGING AND USING FARM RESOURCES.

The Tasmanian Rural Promotions Committee (Incorporating the Tasmanian Stock Feeding Committee) is inviting nominations from any farmer interested in taking part in a four day Farmers Tour of Northern Tasmania in March 1981.

The Secretary, Mr. B. Christie-Johnston, said the theme of the Farmers Tour would be 'Managing and Using Farm Resources' and the Tour Manager would be Mr. C.T. Fleming, Senior Extension Officer of the Department of Agriculture, Northern Region.

Through the generosity of some 20 sponsors, the Tasmanian Rural Promotions Committee would be providing free accommodation, travel and meals for 25 Tasmanian Farmers, plus a representative from the Royal Agricultural Society, the Devonport Agricultural & Pastoral Society and the Tasmanian Farmers & Graziers Association.

The objective of the Tour would be to make people aware of what farming resources are available to assist them in the management of rural enterprises, and to highlight the importance these resources can play in the decision making process.

Mr. Christie-Johnston said that the comments from farmers on previous tours had persuaded his Committee to restructure the tour programme to accommodate special farmer interests.

Application forms could be obtained from District Extension Officers of the Department of Agriculture throughout Tasmania, and must be completed and returned to the Secretary by the 31st July, 1980.

Regional representation would be on the basis of 9 from the North; 9 from the North West and 7 from the South, and final selection would be made by a panel nominated by the Committee, by the 31st August, 1980.

As a part of the tour, women would be encouraged to take part in the tour.
