WHEN IS SICK TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?

There is a difference between feeling sick & being too sick to go to school. Sometimes, however, it's difficult to determine.

The following points may help parents decide whether a 'sick' child should in fact go to school, or whether a day or two in bed is called for.

Temperature: This tells a great deal. A child with a temperature of 38 degrees C (more than 100° F) should stay at home - so, indeed should an adult.

Headache: Not a stay-away reason in itself... unless there is a splitting pain. However, a headache could be a symptom of a fever, so the child's temperature should be taken.

Cold: a heavy cold is a germ-spreader, & the child should be kept at home. But if there is just a runny nose & no fever.. it's off to school with an adequate supply of tissues.

Stomache Ache: a stomach ache can be serious at any age. Cramping pains that limit activity or cause diarrhoea or vomiting are very definitely reasons for keeping the child at home. However, problems at school could cause imaginary stomache aches. If you have doubts, speak to a teacher: it's important that such problems be sorted out.

Coughing or sore throat: a hacking cough usually means a stay in bed. Normal coughing is a healthy sign - the child getting rid of mucus. A number of minor virus infections can cause a sore throat, but white spots in a sore throat, call for medical attention. A child with a sore throat needs watching - his temperature could go up.

Toothache, earache, rashes: Many earaches are caused by infection, & the child should have a dental check as soon as possible. Earache can be just a part of a cold, but any child who has sharp, stabbing pains or ear discharge should see a doctor. A rash could be measles, chicken pox & the like; or could just mean the child is allergic to something. If a child has an unexplained rash & a temperature, he or she should see a doctor. It's best to keep the child at home until you know what caused the rash.

CHILD HEALTH

MEASLES - MORBILLI

Common communicable disease of childhood characterized by fever & cold symptoms & rash, occurs predominantly in winter and early spring. Majority of children develop morbilli prior to pre-school & nearly all children have had morbilli by the tenth year of life. Morbilli can recur.

Morbilli itself does not present a threat except in an already ill child but the resultant complications can. These usually present respiratory complications or as encephalitis in approx. 5% of cases. To reduce the incidence of complications measles(morbilli) vaccinations is available to all children as part of the Health Department Schedule & given at approx. twelve months of age.

GERMAN MEASLES - RUBELLA

Common communicable disease of childhood also & is very mild in comparison with morbilli, presents with mild cold symptoms & a few spots normally and can occur without recognition, being so mild. Rubella's only danger is to the unborn child and can have serious effects should the mother contract rubella in the first three months of pregnancy. It is difficult to assess how seriously the unborn child may be affected.

Once a young girl has had rubella there is lifelong insurance of immunity for self and future babies.

Rubella vaccination is available to all young girls between 11 - 13 years as a part of the Health Department Schedule, & usually arranged by the local school.

Should a woman over thirteen years of age find she has not been vaccinated and is not sure she has had rubella then she should contact her local doctor. Once he is sure she has no insurance of immunity he can arrange for her to have the rubella vaccination as long as she is not pregnant & there is no risk of pregnancy for up to three months following the vaccination, otherwise like the disease itself it could affect the unborn child.

The treatment and care of a child with measles, either type, depends on the presenting symptoms.

Should an unimmunized person contract measles in adulthood the resulting symptoms are frequently more severe.

hundreds of different species of creatures from the ocean off Bicheno.

The contents of each tank are noted on the illuminated panel above each window. Please do not knock or scratch the glass. The specimens have been provided by the fishermen of Bicheno and other parts of the State, and without their co-operation and support, this display would not be possible.

Bicheno has been a fishing port for about 180 years, commencing with sealing and whaling. In 1854 a coal mine was opened a few miles north of the township, and coal was shipped from the port for many years.

Commercial fishing has flourished since early this century and Bicheno was a pioneer port for the abalone industry 25 years ago now one of Australia's important exports. Plans are currently developing to build oyster hatcheries at the Gulch, and oysters are flourishing at Moulding Lagoon, a few miles south.

The idea of building a Sea Life Centre was sparked from a joint State-Commonwealth tourism study carried out by Peet Morwick Mitchell about seven years ago. They recommended that a Fisheries Interpretation Centre be built at the Gulch by the State Government.

Due to lack of funds, the recommendation was not carried out. In 1978, Bill Bailey and Brian Winspear became convinced that there was a need for such tourist attraction, and that it could be a commercially viable proposition. With their wives, they formed a partnership, procured a lease on Crown foreshore, obtained loan funds from the Federal Government Decentralisation Scheme, and the centre opened for business on 1st October 1979. Its rapid completion would not have been possible without the enthusiastic support of many State Government departments the Federal Government, the Glamorgan Council and Bicheno residents.
