THE OMBUDSMAN

The Ombudsman is an official appointed to investigate individuals complaints against public authorities.

At some time in your life you may feel that the activities of Commonwealth or State governments in some way adversely affect you. Usually it is best to try to remedy the problem yourself, but if you can not, & consider you have cause for complaint you have a right to seek the services of the Ombudsman to investigate the complaint. It is the business of the Ombudsman to help people resolve difficulties they are having with Government departments, State or prescribed Commonwealth Authorities set up by Act of Parliament or any Local Government Council or by their officer.

In Tasmania, because of the relatively low proportion of complaints received, the State Ombudsman also performs the functions on behalf of the Commonwealth Ombudsman. The present Ombudsman in Tasmania is Mr Charles R. Woodhouse, whose office is at 23 Kirksway Place, Hobart, telephone number (002) 34 9200. The address for written communications is The Ombudsman, GPO Box 960K, Hobart, 7001.

The Ombudsman is independent of all government departments & authorities & is answerable only to the Parliament. However, there are certain restrictions on the jurisdiction of the Ombudsman, both State & Commonwealth, which limit his extent of investigations in certain actions e.g. it does not extend to complaints against private individuals or companies. But if you are uncertain as to whether the Ombudsman can assist you it is best to contact his office & be advised of the extent of his power in the area which is of concern to you.

Investigations by the Ombudsman are carried out in private & are essentially informal. There are no forms to fill in by the complainant

but it is preferable that a detailed account of the complaint be given to the Ombudsman in writing.

Through the Ombudsmen's office improvements in public administration can be sought which will help make departments & authorities more sensitive to the needs of the community as well as removing sources of complaint. If you have a grievance against a government authority or department it is best to contact the Ombudsman as soon as possible, or if you would prefer, contact my office & I will be happy to contact the Ombudsman on your behalf.

LOCAL BOY MAKES GOOD.

In the month of February David Schier was admitted as a practising Barrister and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Tasmania.

David is the second eldest of six children of Jean and Gilbert Schier of Falmouth. Together with all his brothers and sister he attended the St Marys District High School where he obtained the Schools Board Certificate in 1964.

He readily agrees that whilst at school sport played an equal role to study a factor which did not help him to obtain a good final years result.

After school he worked for some time at St. Marys Bakery which was owned by Mr. Jim Owens. He left there in 1966 to join the Royal Australian Air Force. During his 6 years in the services he rose quickly through the ranks. He served in the Vietnam War in 1968, 69.

He matriculated in part time capacity through the Canberra College in 1972 and elected to be discharged from the Air Force in the same year.

In 1973 he commenced studies at the University of Tasmania specialising in Law.

He graduated as a Bachelor of Laws in March 1978.

During his University career he took up and excelled in the sport of rowing winning many state championships and representing the state in Kings Cup eight and single sculls.

In January 1979 he commenced the final 2 years of study and work experience before obtaining the ultimate goal as a fully qualified Barrister and Solicitor.

He remains heavily involved in the administration of the rowing and is a member of the state wide Tasmanian Rowing Council. He is widely regarded and respected as one of the sports leading administrators. He is also one of the most experienced umpires in the T.A.N.F.L.

At the present time he is pursuing his career in Law with a leading firm of Solicitors in Hobart.

BREAK DOWN THE BARRIERS - HOW TO HELP DISABLED IN THEIR YEAR

1. Public Education With the assistance of disabled people, we could promote or conduct seminars or discussion groups aimed to draw our present attitudes, reservations, myths about disability and could then attempt to convey some truths about people who are physically disabled, sensorily disabled, mentally retarded or mentally ill.

2. Transport A major problem for people with physical disabilities. Trans, trains and buses are usually inaccessible, and taxis are very expensive on a pension. We could investigate the transport needs in their communities and perhaps organise a volunteer driving network, or a minibus, or some other assistance as defined by disabled people. Some services look O.K. on paper, but may not meet the needs of the people they are designed to assist.

3. Access This covers a huge range of possible projects, beginning with consultation with disabled people about the buildings they cannot use in the community. These will cover shops, libraries, schools, municipal buildings, medical or dental surgeries, supermarkets, hairdressers. Access also covers suitable toilets, ramped kerbs, parking provisions, lifts, lower counters, adequate labelling for deaf and blind people, simple instructions for the mentally retarded or ill people.

KENTISH CAKE .

125 g butter	2 x 20ml spoon cocoa
3/5 cup castor sugar	40ml boiling water
vanilla	1 1/2 cups S R flour
2 x 60g eggs	2 x 20ml spoon coco-
60ml milki	nut
5 x 20ml spoon sultanas, cherries, & nuts	
pinch salt	

Method

1. Cream butter & sugar.
2. Add eggs one at a time & beat well after each addition. Add vanilla
3. Blend cocoa with hot water, & add when cold.
4. Sift flour & salt together. Add coconut

& fruit & nuts.

5. Add to mixture alternately with milk & mix to a soft dough.

6. Pour into greased & floured loaf pan

7. Bake in moderate oven 30-40 minutes or until cooked when tested.

8. When cold ice with chocolate icing decorate with chopped nuts & cherries or coconut.
