Austcare stands for "Australians care for Refugees". Austcare was formed in 1967 by the major voluntary aid bodies working in Australia to aid the world's refugees. In this way the member organisations have created a united effort for a common cause, providing a single point of focus for the Australian community's concern for refugees.

WHAT is Austcare doing to aid the world's refugees?

Austcare has distributed over \$5 million to its member organisations for programmes of relief, resettlement & rehabilitation of refugees in all parts of the world. In 1975, a special allocation of \$50,000 was given to provide for emergency food & medical relief for thousands of refugees in Timor. Since the cessation of hostilities in Vietnam Austcare has been involved in a vast programme to assist displaced persons as a result of this conflict. Austcare is involved in Bangladesh, throughout Africa, & anywhere else where there is a need. Last year alone (1975) Austcare was working in over 25 countries all over the world.

WHAT is Freedom from Hunger Campaign.

This is a programme for the assistance of the Hungry. It is a programme designed to educate the people in underdeveloped countries to help themselves. It teaches people how to grow enough food to feed themselves, helps provide irrigation, machinery, man power & other things needed for the education programme.

AUSTRALIAN'S ATTITUDES TOWARDS THE ARTS.

The Arts are for everyone. Elitist notions & attitudes which divorce the arts from the people were soundly rejected in a recent survey organised by the Australian Council.

Levels of interest & participation in the arts were found to be very high particularly for traditional Australian paintings, crafts, photography & prints & drawings. Two out of three persons expressed interest in plays.

Some people surveyed did not feel that the arts were in the mainstream of their lives. This led to some surprising conclusions about the school system. Curricula, schools & teachers were all reported to have some discouraging efforts except on the reading of good books. The arts area should be an important & integral part of children's education but there is clearly something wrong in the system that does not recognise the value of the arts.

The report found strong support for the arts to be subsidised through Governments, Business & lotteries. Preferences for the use of public money in order of priority were:-

- (1) the education of children and
- (2) to get the arts to people both in the cities and the country areas.

The report goes into some detail on the leisure activity preferences of Australians & explodes the myth that we all like to watch a large amount of television. The most important activities in fact were listening to radio or music followed by reading books & magazines, going motoring & picnicking & gardening. Watching TV came in as No. 8 on the list rated as important by less than $\frac{1}{2}$ the people surveyed.

A further surprising result was revealed in the attitude to classical music which rated in the top three in terms of the music people liked to listen to. Classical music was beaten by light vocal e.g. Kamahl & Nana Mouskouri as No. 1 & country & western music in second position.

All players to bring afternoon tea this Saturday.

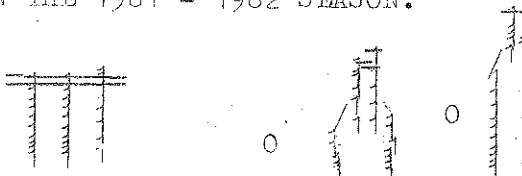

HEALTH CARE CARDS

New Health Insurance arrangements will start on 1 September 1981. From that date you will automatically get a Health Care card if you are on unemployment benefit and if your income (apart from benefit) is below the following levels.

No children	Single	\$40
"	"	Married 68
One child 6 yrs & over	single	\$55
"	"	married 84
One child under 6 or invalid	single	\$57

(These income levels do not include family allowance)

You may still be eligible for a Health Care card if your income is above the levels referred to above. However, you will have to apply for the card at a Social Security office, and your income including unemployment benefit must be below the levels shown in the next table. If you go off unemployment benefit you may still be eligible for a card as long as your income remains below these levels.

Income for the four weeks ending on date of application:

(These income levels do not include family allowance).

Health Care Card will entitle you and your dependants to:

- Free medical treatment if your doctor bulk bills, i.e. if he sends the bill to the Government. If the doctor gives you the bill he can claim Commonwealth Medical Benefits (85% of schedule fee) from any registered health insurance fund. The most you will have to pay is \$5 for each service, if the doctor charges the Schedule fee.
- free accommodation and treatment, by a hospital doctor, in shared wards of public hospitals, and free outpatient services at public hospitals.

IMPORTATION OF GOLDFISH.

The Federal Government decision to allow goldfish to be imported into Australia has been strongly attacked by the Minister for Primary Industry, Dr. Amos.

Goldfish have been a banned import in Tasmania since 1972 because of the risk of introducing exotic disease into the State.

At the time the Federal Minister for Primary Industry, Mr. Sinclair, promised a national ban, because of the disease risk and the need to build up a local breeding industry.

"The Federal Government's aboutface on the ban will now put Tasmania's recreational trout fishing and fish farm industries at risk," Dr. Amos said.

"Tasmanian trout will be under threat from the host of foreign diseases known to be carried by imported goldfish," he said.

The State had already suffered in 1978 when disease was brought in by Japanese goldfish, the Minister said.

"A successful goldfish breeding industry can be built up to satisfy the local market in the same way New Zealand has done," Dr. Amos said.

New Zealand bans importation, except under quarantine conditions for breeding purposes.

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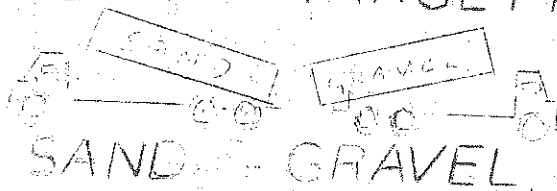
