LOGGING EXTENSIONS, HERRICK.

Detailed environmental studies in the St.Helens area have resulted in an operational plan for selected logging extensions at Herrick.

The Chief Commissioner of Forests, Mr. John Quick, said today permission for the T.P.F.H. Company to expand their present logging operations in the area had been granted only after a careful survey of the area had been completed and an environmental impact study circulated.

Mr. Quick said, "Harvesting will be regimented to well dispersed units, ensuring about 15 to 18 years of forest regeneration before adjacent areas are logged."

"All the clearfelling carried out will be regenerated, with the possibility of developing a pine plantation on a small percentage of the felled area," Mr. Quick said.

At the same time a unique wildlife survey is being conducted in the area to study the impact of logging on wildlife habitats. The study, believed to be the first like this in Australia, is jointly operated by the Forestry Commission, by A.P.P.M. and by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

It will look at minimising the impact of logging on natural habitats in current and future developments, as well as highlighting the preferred habitats of local fauna, particularly less common species.

Under the plan, areas of low value scrub will also be regenerated and streams will be protected from the effects of logging. The commission is also looking at minimising the visual impact of harvesting by screening scenic areas, under the guidance of its landscape architect.

The plan also provides for several areas to be set aside for flora or scenic reserves.

Operations will be on part of the original pulpwood area granted to Tas. Pulp and Forest Holdings Ltd. before take-over by A.P.P.M. two years ago.

The company will assume responsibility for a short section of council road affected, as well as for some commission roads in the area.

The development is planned to begin

late this year or early in 1982, and the Forestry Commission hopes the plan will ensure profitable industrial development as well as preserving the natural beauty of the areas.

"Logging is an important economic boost locally, but the Commission also wants to ensure that the area's forests remain to be enjoyed by future generations", Mr. Quick said.

THE HONEY BEE.

Tasmania is famous for its unique Leatherwood honey, and its good quality clover honey. The average annual production of honey has increased by over 200 percent in the past 16 years.

About 75 percent of the honey production comes from the nectar of Eucalypt trees. Many of the large varieties of colours and flavours are unique to Tasmania. Ground flora such as lucerne, clover, blackberries and Salvation Jane are other sources of food. Commercial beekeeping throughout Australia is a migratory occupation, with beekeepers sometimes travelling thousands of kilometers, following the blossom cycles of the different eucalypts.

There are over 2,000 apiarists in Australia with more than 40 hives, and another 3,300 with less. Our honey is exported to overseas markets, which include, Iran, West Germany, Malaysia, Singapore and most European countries. Tasmania has 270 apiarists and their honey is in high demand overseas.

The first honey bee was brought to Australia from England in 1822, and the stock has since been improved by bees imported principally from Italy, Yugoslavia and North America. All imports are subject to the strictest quarantine.

However, the Australian honey industry faces grave problems from pesticides, diseases, pest, predators and climate.

The use of chemical sprays in orchards and pastures kill the bee through direct contact or kills the grub when poisoned pollen is stored in the hives.

While bees die from natural causes, such as exhaustion, old age and injured wings, they are also attacked by diseases, either in the larvae stage or as adults. The predators, birds, ants, spiders and dragonflies cause inconvenience and loss to the hives. However, if hygienic methods are used and a close watch is kept, the pests can be controlled.

Weather conditions in Tasmania are most erratic, and reliable sources of nectar are often limited and variable. Bees die from starvation if the season is bad and there is a shortage of flowers. The showery, spring weather, cold and exposure in the hills and wetter areas, and hot weather all contribute to frequent bee losses.

However, research programs are

seeking repellants to reduce the hazards of pesticides on the honey bee, and are investigating the causes of disease in adult bees and larvae. The Honey Research Trust finance the research programs that are essential for the future progress in the honey industry.

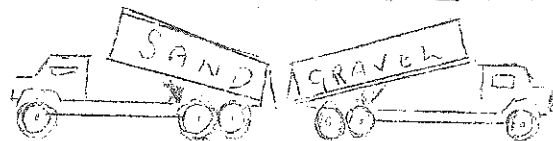
