What a madly busy time Christmas often is, especially for the mother of the family. There are so many things to be done to prepare for that big day when the family will expect to sit down to their traditional Christmas dinner. The check list of things to buy and things to prepare is formidable: have I bought the turkey, made the Christmas pudding, the fruit cake, the shortbread and the biscuits for all the visitors who will call? Have I picked up the box of booze, and got some candles for the kids to take to Carols by Candlelight? Then there are all the Christmas cards to be sent to even our slightest acquaintances, and the presents for the family plus Auntie Flo and all our relations. What can we get for Uncle George? He has enough socks and pipe cleaners to last twenty years, and anything else is too expensive these days. Oh dear, it's hardly worth all the effort. Next year we won't bother to send Christmas cards or buy presents for the relations - or have Christmas dinner. So we say each year in our frantic rush to prepare for Christmas.

And what a confusing time Christmas is, especially for us in Australia. We buy Christmas cards depicting snow and yule-tide logs blazing in wintry conditions, we decorate our houses with snow-covered Christmas trees and coloured lights, and we sing of bells jingling on sleighs as they dash through the snow. Yet I would not change this for the world; it's part of the romance of Christmas and any attempts to Australianise Christmas, like Rolf Harris' six white boomers, have always fallen flat. Santa Claus still will come down the chimney, even though this is a little puzzling to our young believers in Santa who are still shrewd enough to realise we only have an oil heater.

The clash of the cash registers, the mad rush, the confusion and the commercialism can turn Christmas into a chore, when it should be something quite different - a celebration. Christmas is, in fact, a birthday celebration and the realisation of this fact, and its consequences, can make a big difference to our appreciation of Christmas. For, of course, Christmas is the time when we celebrate the birthday of the most

remarkable man ever to have lived: Jesus, the Christ. To Christians he is also the Son of God, the Saviour of the world and so, to them, Christmas is something special. To people who believe, Christmas is the beginning of hope and a bright future for them and for mankind. To them, the tasks of preparation have meaning and purpose and cease to be chores. The gifts they give are symbols of the great gift of Jesus Christ to the world.

Yet, for people who do not believe, Christmas can still have great significance. It is irrefutably the birthday of a great man, give or take a few years and a day or two. The words of this man form the basis of our moral code and much of our laws. He told people that an attitude of love towards our fellow men is the most important thing in the world. He advised us to love not just our neighbours but our enemies - a daring and revolutionary concept! So Christmas should be a time of love to all people, and love really means respect, consideration and unselfishness. If people remembered this at Christmas, it would change the world.

The man whose birthday we celebrate was known as the Prince of Peace. Peace in our private and rational lives is something all people want but often forget. Christmas is a reminder that, instead of grasping and fighting, we should always strive for that better way of peace on earth, goodwill to all men.

No wonder we have continued to celebrate Christmas for nearly two thousand years. It is of such vital importance that we must never treat it casually. We need to see past the rush, the confusion and the callous commercialism we have built into it and remember the real significance of it. As we acknowledge the birth of the Christ, may his spirit of love, peace and goodwill affect our lives.

The Department of Agriculture has received grants worth more than \$100,000 from the Reserve Bank of Australia through the Rural Credits Development Fund.

## NEWS RELEASE

Minister for Primary Industry  
DR Julian Amos.

What's new in Tasmania horticulture will be the theme of a two day public exhibition this week at the Department of Agriculture's Forthside Vegetable Research Station, Near Devonport.

The "Hort 81" open days will run on Friday (December 11) and Saturday (December 12) with an official opening by the Minister for Primary Industry, Dr Amos, at 2pm on Friday.

"Hort 81" aims to promote efficiency in horticulture, especially vegetable production, and visitors will be able to view exhibits of the Station's research work, specially adapted machinery, biological insect control, computers in agriculture hydroponics and the distillation of peppermint, with a working oil-distillery.

The current crops at Forthside include onions oil poppies, potatoes, sugar beet, green peas, sweet corn, green and yellow beans and mint.

More than 50 commercial firms will display agricultural products ranging from large, reel type irrigators to equipment for handling of pot plants.

The Potato Industry Authority and food processing firms will demonstrate packaging methods and conduct product tasting panels. The Department of Labour and Industry will demonstrate farm safety with displays of tractor handling.

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## THAT HARMLESS GLASS OF WINE MAY BE FATAL. (Senator John Watson)

For the average housewife, the glass of wine at 5.30pm may not be so harmless after all. The pre-dinner period is a hectic time for the busy wife and mother as she bathes the children, prepares the evening meal and soothes the husband who has had a busy day.

While one glass of wine may calm your nerves, and help you to relax, this could become a

problem if the amount of alcohol consumed increases. 15 to 20 drinks a week for a woman is likely to cause problems.

However, how do you know who is a normal drinker or a problem drinker? Medical authorities generally agree that one or two drinks a day for most people will not cause any physical damage. For a pregnant woman, however, this is not the case, as she has her unborn child to consider.

The actual number of drinks is not the only sign of danger. If you really rely on that drink to survive the early evening rush, or are drinking more or earlier than before, you may have a problem.

Most people are reluctant to acknowledge a drinking problem, but if it is caught early, before it actually becomes alcoholism, the prognosis is good.

Although you can have more than two drinks a day without any apparent physical damage, a drinking problem can interfere with your marriage and quality of mothering.

The pressures placed on the housewife combined with the availability of alcohol which offers her a release from the tensions of her day has increased the incidence of liver disease in women.

While alcoholic liver diseases in men are frequently detected through routine medical examinations for employment or insurance purposes, women are often not exposed to this medical vetting.

More than half the number of heavy women drinkers - not necessarily alcoholics - do not seek treatment until their condition has reached a critical stage and they are admitted to hospital.

Cirrhosis of the liver can be a killer and women are not only more prone to liver disease, they also die more quickly from it.

The number of housewives and mothers with alcohol induced problems admitted to hospitals for treatment are increasing yearly. This is tragic - not only for the woman, but also for her husband and children.

The evening pacifier may be necessary at times, but it can become dangerous, and sometimes fatal, habit.

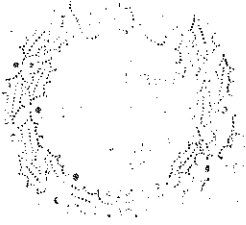

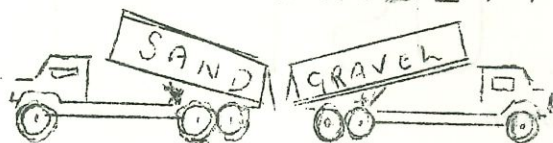
