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"TOO MANY PEOPLE"

A great deal of activity has been directed at protecting Tasmania's physical environment, but an area of increasing concern overseas is safeguarding the social environment. An enormous number of factors affect the areas in which we live: road & bridge construction, the location of recreation areas.

It has been recognised in the UK that the protection of the areas adjacent to our homes is very important. I feel that we should investigate & formulate our own laws to protect people & their surroundings.

People, directly affected when their homes are demolished for road construction, bridge building or the erection of multi-storey car parks, are properly compensated. However, those people who are indirectly affected by increased noise & loss of privacy are in no way compensated. These people should not have to tolerate these privations without recompense.

Our home environs have an important bearing on our perspective. We should be able to have a good night's sleep, or be able to relax by playing with our children in our own backyards without the intrusion of noise or an audience from a high-rise hotel erected next door. Undisturbed sleep & uninvaded privacy are basic human rights, and, unlike the actual destruction of a house or property which have commercial value, cannot be evaluated for the appropriate compensation. Our social environment should be protected at all costs.

A planned bridge across the Sydney Harbour, for the benefit of commuters from the outer areas, necessitates the complete destruction of an entire suburb on one side & partial destruction on the other. While those people who live in the houses to be demolished will be compensated for the loss of their homes & property, to replace these

they will have to move to the outer areas & join the other commuters.

While an adequate buffer zone - a greenbelt - is planned to protect the social & physical environment of the surrounding suburbs, they will not be compensated for the noise intrusion during construction or for the increased traffic flow & traffic noise that will result when the bridge is in use. They will be inconvenienced for the increased benefit of the original commuters.

While this example is extreme, it shows the need for an immediate investigation of our current laws so that our physical & social environments may be protected. I admit that adjustments to the legal system to redress the problem will be expensive, but necessary. These costs could have been avoided if new highways & highrises were built in areas where these problems would not have occurred.

Society has an obligation to compensate those who are inconvenienced for the increased benefit of others. It is unfair that a few should have to shoulder the entire burden - it is up to all of us!

NEWS RELEASE

The Minister for Primary Industry, Dr. Amos, today reminded pig farmers who wished to feed swill that they must obtain a licence.

A recent amendment to the Stock Act now requires that after 1 March no-one can feed swill to pigs, or take swill anywhere where pigs are kept, without a licence, he said.

Under earlier legislation, swill feed for pigs could be obtained only from approved premises, but there was no requirement that the pig producer be licenced.

Dr. Amos said this new law represented a significant tightening of controls over swill feeding of pigs, necessary to protect Tasmanian livestock from the threat of exotic diseases. Pig producers should apply to any office of the Dept. of Agric. for licence.

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ESK HIGHWAY, FINGAL.

The letters below are copies of the two letters written by Mr George Shaw, M.L.C. to Mr M. W. Field regarding the Esk Highway, and Mr Field's reply.

Dear Mr. Minister,

Esk Highway, Fingal

The residents of Fingal and district are extremely pleased to have the Department of Main Roads widening culverts and bridges through the eastern end of the town which will enable the narrow road to be reconstructed to an acceptable safe standard.

However I am advised by locals that the current programme does not include the widening of the township creek bridge and the small bridge just west of it near the Pedder Street junction. Also there is a culvert east of the bridge near the turn-off to the A.P.P.M. log loading rail head facility.

I agree that unless these three waterways are also widened to allow road reconstruction and widening right through the eastern end of town then indeed a very real hazard will continue to exist.

I sincerely request that you investigate the above works programme and modify it to include this necessary work.

May I also thank you and the department, of Main Roads for the most satisfactory work done thus far on the Mathinna road. I can assure you it is greatly appreciated.

Could you advise when it is expected to complete the road to Mathinna?

Dear Mr Shaw,

I refer to your letter of 18th December, 1981, concerning Esk Main Roads at Fingal and Mathinna Secondary Road.

The decision to reconstruct part of Esk Main Road in Fingal was based on two considerations; Firstly, Council's problems with drainage and desired widening, and secondly, concern jointly shared by the department of Main Roads and Council with

a very weak pavement section resulting in a distorted and rough surface.

In 1979 Council nominated for improvement, two sections which covered Esk Main Road from just west of Champ Street to Pedder Street. The Department accepted Council's proposal as reasonable and construction plans and funding were developed accordingly, the only alteration being that the transition back to normal pavement width had to take place near Pedder Street.

The reconstruction has involved widening four relatively small culverts, and to have extended the widening further east would have involved the widening of Township Creek Bridge and its adjacent flood opening, quite an expensive operation.

I do not agree with your claim that a failure to widen three additional structures means "...a very real hazard will continue to exist". These structures are all 6.8 metres wide, as is the Break-O'Day Bridge further east, and many other bridges (which are safe and adequate) throughout the State. I would also point out that previous complaints concerning safety aspects had referred only to that section to be reconstructed. In fact, Police records indicate that during the period since 1975 only two accidents had been reported for that section. There is no evidence to suggest that the section to which you now refer is safety deficient.


You will also recall that in my letter to you of September 20th, 1979, I mentioned the extreme difficulty the government was facing in maintaining the present road network, as well as new construction and reconstruction of a high priority. The restricted funding situation has not improved since then, and only projects of high priority can be commenced.

With regard to the reconstruction of Mathinna Secondary Road, completion will depend on future fund availability, (currently unknown) and the number of commitments in other parts of the State. However, it is hoped to finalize the project in the 1983/84 financial year.

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NEWS RELEASE

A State-wide landscaping plan is being prepared by the Forestry Commission to review and categorise landscape standards to be used by Government departments.

The Commission's American landscaper, Mr. Phil Horning, met last week with Geologists, geographers, botanists and geomorphologists from several concerned Government departments to initiate the State-wide standard.

Representatives from museums, universities and private groups will also be providing technical assistance to develop a generally accepted landscape character type to be used in landscape assessment.

Known as the Landscaping Management Programme, it will inventory and assess the scenic quality of all forest lands systematically through landscape character types.

The Forestry Commission said initially the Landscape Management system will integrate scenic quality with public concerns to recommend management zones. These zones will be used to help identify forest areas that might be logged, but successfully retain their landscape character.

INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CONFERENCE.

In August this year the International Union for Health Education will hold its 11th. International Conference on Health Education in Hobart from 11-22 August. The conference is held every three years and this will be the first time the conference has been held in the Southern Hemisphere or outside Europe or the Americas. Delegates are expected from almost every country in the world and it is the first time Tasmania has hosted a truly international conference. The President of the Australian Society of Health Educators, Mr Paul Hindson, is chairman of the organising committee. The theme of the conference is Health for all by the year 2000 and about 500 scientific papers will be presented covering all aspects of health. One of the delegates will be the Director General of the World Health Organisation, Dr. Halfdan Mahler. The conference will be in four languages- English, French, Spanish, and Japanese and there will be a huge team of interpreters. Professor I.C. Lewis of the Department of Child Health at the University of Tasmania is chairman of the Tasmanian Scientific Committee of the conference and has invited approximately 200 Tasmanian organisations to participate in the conference. Tasmania along with other Australian states wish to make the most of the opportunity of having an International conference in Australia. It is hoped to be able to send as many delegates as possible, from each state. Being a conference of international standard the costs of attending are high so it is hoped that support is forthcoming from each community in raising funds to enable a delegate to attend. During the length of the conference the organising committee will hold recreational activities for all world visitors which will have an Australian flavor. The opening and closing ceremonies will be at the City Hall while daily sessions will be divided between the University and Wrest Point, Hobart.

The Fingal Municipality covers an area of 267,000 ha and is situated in the North East part of Tasmania with boundaries of the sea coast in the east, Ben Lomond National Park to the west, Scamander River to the North and the Denison River in the South.

The Municipality is divided into four Wards for Minicipal purposes, and each Ward is represented by three Councillors.

Council meets on the second Monday each month with committee and

TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS

After talking about 'Historic Stanley' last week, we continue along the coast to BURNIE:

"THE PIONEER VILLAGE" MUSEUM, off High St. Visitors to the Pioneer Village Folk Museum at Burnie will see the reconstructed street of a typical North Western Tas. town about the turn of the century. The street is lined on each side with buildings constructed in the fashion of the times from genuine materials of those days.

The buildings, fully equipped with authentic materials, include a blacksmith's shop, "Wellington Times Printery", general store, post and telegraph office, saddlery, bootmakers shop, an Inn, Carpenters shop, butter factory, and a typical dwelling.

Another section displays a local history exhibit and fine crafts of the 19th Century. The collection was established as the "Pet Falls Museum" at Ridgley, near Burnie, in 1954. In June 1970, it was acquired by the Burnie Municipal Council and re-established in what is now the Civic Centre Plaza, off Wilmot Street, Burnie, in the centre of the town. The mezzanine floor houses a comprehensive technology display.

Complete protection from the influences of the weather enables the reconstruction of the past to be carried out in detail.
