CENSUS 1981

A census is taken on a five yearly basis in Australia. This year 30 June 1981 is Census Day & every person in Australia will be involved.

The purpose of the Census is to compile statistical information which can be used in general planning & decision making. Australia's official statistical service, the Australian Bureau of Statistics, conducts the Census. An extensive range of economic, social & other statistics are provided to governments, private enterprise & the community in general, by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

The Census enables the Australian Bureau of Statistics to produce highly accurate population figures for States & Local government regions. Such information assists government & private industry to determine priorities in planning services to the public & to identify & provide remedies for many social problems. For example the extent of overcrowding, the comparative cost of rental & mortgage housing & the proportion of total income spent on housing are revealed by questions on housing.

From the information gathered by the Census, statistics are compiled to give an overall picture of living patterns & standards of groups in specific areas or situations rather than as individuals. In this way, the Census is an effective way of locating the poor & disadvantaged. Thus appropriate decisions can be made, based on accurate information, concerning the location of projects, & the allocation of funds.

The quality of information the Census produces is dependent to a large extent, on public cooperation. Interpreters will be available to help translate for non-English speaking Australians, & explanatory brochures have been printed in different languages. A reasonable balance between invasion of individual privacy & the need for information is determined when choosing questions to be included

in the Census. Strict confidentiality of data collected is maintained by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. Names & addresses are initially necessary so that contact can be made & any missing information can be followed up. However, names & addresses of people are not kept in the Bureau's Census record. Census forms are destroyed after processing, they are recycled & turned into paper pulp as a final safeguard against release of personal information. The Census is necessary so that information can be gathered about our society, our way of life & the gaps that need to be filled.

Changing patterns within our society can be identified by comparison with past censuses and appropriate decisions can be determined.

Community Health.

The Treatment of Common Colds in infants.

In general, children under the age of twelve months only suffer from mild colds. The symptoms of these colds will usually be a running of bubbly nose and perhaps a little cough. Should the cold be severe or complications develop, then you should consult your Medical Practitioner. The best treatment for the symptoms of a mild cold is keeping the baby in a moist atmosphere. This can be achieved by boiling a kettle or heating a frypan full of water in the room, or in hiring or purchase of a steam vaporizer from your pharmacy especially if your infant is prone to frequent mild colds. If using a vaporizer then the room needs to be ventilated to avoid too much condensation on the walls and ceiling. The steam soothes the mucous membranes and clears the congestion from the head and chest giving the infant and the parents a chance of a full night's sleep. Because there are no drugs involved it is completely safe and be used all day if necessary.

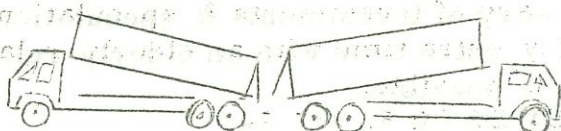
