WHAT DOES EASTER MEAN TO YOU?

For most people it has become little Him on a cross. It was finally more than the time of the mythical bunny, empty chocolate eggs, a few days off work, and , tragically, a few added road fatalities. Take away the silver paper, the glitter of commercialism, and what do you have left? Yes, Easter has become like the egg it produces, hollow, empty of real meaning, and in danger of melting in your hands. But read on.

Remember back there in Sunday School when you learnt that Easter was the time 2000 years ago, when a man called Jesus was nailed to a cross, died and then, to everyone's amazement, rose again three days later. A historical fact, or maybe just a fairytale, you say; either way, what relevance does all that have to me, or to a world torn by have to me, or to a world torn by hatred, selfishness and bent on its own destruction.

During the three years before his death, Jesus grew to be despised by the leaders of the day. He ministered to people's needs from a heart of deep compassion, healing the sick and fooding the hungary. His laws hungard feeding the hungry. His love burned like a dazzling light in the darkness exposing the hypocrisy of the leaders around Him, men who placed so much importance on outward forms and rituals, but whose hearts were corrupt and unloving; men who judged others but were blind to their own shortcomings; men who laid heavy laws on the recombe but ignored the greatest the people but ignored the greatest commandment, love.

Jesus saw beyond outward forms to man's heart. He offered a better way from guilt, a clean heart. He offer ed healing to the sick, strength to the weak and freedom to the oppressed. He didn't rob others but gave that those around Him might see God's love fro them.

The leaders couldn't understand this man who claimed to have the power to forgive sins, who drew men, women and children to himself in love, who spoke works of wisdom that they, in their blindness, couldn't comprehend. Most of all, they despised Him because He called Himself the Son

of God. So it must have been with a sense of relief that they hung over - or was it? Why, if He was so powerful, didn't Jesus get down off that Cross? It was God's intention that Jesus die. There was an enormous gulf between man and God as a result of man's sin. There had to be a sacrifice. Jesus was the perfect reservices. fect sacrifice.

His resurrection was a new beginning. The real message of Easter is a proclamation of life, a promise of hope. At Easter we celebrate the victory of God's love and power over the forces of darkness - hatred selfishness, and even death itself.

Jesus is still alive today and He continues to offer His world this alternative lifestyle. Hatred and bitterness are natural to man, you say. God never intended that we live this way. This world needs a revolution and a new leader: not in the political sense, but a revolution of love, the sort of love we see manifested in the life of Jesus Christ here on earth. And the new leader, Jesus Himself.

And it starts with us giving our lives to Him that we might be channels for His love to those around us. Easter is significant. It could mean a whole new start for you.

HOW MUCH CREDIT SHOULD WE HAVE?

Consumer credit is a fact of life; without it employment, factory production, retail sales and our economy as a whole would be seriously affected.

But do you know "when to draw the line"? Nowhere is this more important than when you are thinking of signing a credit contract. You can give away your past, present and future with the scribble of a pen. Your signature is your passport to security or trouble ----depending on what you sign or refuse to sign.

It's your money--- the money you earn, and you can do as you please with it---"throw it away" or use it to buy the things that make for a happier, more comfortable and more enjoyable life.

CREDIT is not a way of buying what you are can't afford, or of producing money "out of thin air".

CREDIT is not unlimited. Your opportunities to use it depend on your credit rating, and that in turn, depends a lot on your reputation for paying your bills when they become due.

CREDIT is not free. It is a service and you must expect to pay for it. Using credit will cost you more than using cash. Be certain that you have counted the cost against the advantages of having the use of goods or services now instead of later.

Used wisely, credit can be of tremendous help; used without care, it can bring cares.

Many consumers have no understanding, or no adequate understanding of the nature of the commitment into which they are entering ar of the cost and other terms that are available to them.

There is a limit to what the law alone can achieve by way of protection in credit matters. Prevention is better than cure and many difficulties now experienced by consumers would be avoided if they were better informed on credit matters and were aware of the principal factors relevant to making a sensible choice.

Major sources of consumer credit are; Finance companies, Ranks, Retail Stores, Gredit Unions.

The main services which these companies provid for consumers are; Instalment finance, Personal loans, Hire purchase, Retail store credit and Credit cards.

The cost of credit and your rights and obligations vary with the different types of credit plans, so study anr contracts carefully.

THE "GOLDEN RULES" OF CREDIT CONTRACTS.

Good credit is a personal asset. Credit agencies record it, but they do not make it. You create it and maintain it. It can be improved by your record of trustworthiness and character, your performance in payment, and by your total capacity to pay. You credit should be preserved as one of your most valuable assets.

Credit use should never induce you to 'overload' so that you are unable to meet your payments or other obligations. In family budgeting, everyone should consider total dollar payments in relation to his or her income.

Follow these "Golden Rules" and you can obtain the full benefit to modern living which consumer credit provides when used with care.

- I. Remember that credit costs money.
- Before you sign a contract, plen exactly how you are going to meet the repayments.
- 3. Pay the highest possible deposit to give you a worthwhile equity and lower repayments, and don't buy if you have to borrow the deposit.
- 4. Carefully examine the goods to make sure they are in good order and condition and will meet the purposes for which you want them.
- 5. Consider the daily and annual running costs before buying a car.

DOM ' T

- I. Don't buy anything just because you can get it on credit or because the down-payments or the repayments are small. Remember, the cost of the credit will be higher if repayments are stretched over a long period of time.
- 2. Don't be rushed into signing a contract; study it carefully and completely to make sure that you understand it.
- 3. Don't sign a blank contract or one which seems different from the one the salesman showed you, or what he told you.
- 4. Don't sign as a guarantor without thinking first. If the other person defaults, you must meet the full terms of the contract.
- 5. If unsure of your rights at any time, check with Consumer Advisory Service.

TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS

Continuing on our way from Deloraine, this week we travel inland and visit MOLE CREEK:

KING SOLOMON CAVE, near Mole Creek, is managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service. This cave is located approximately 90km west of Launceston by road and 16km from Mole Creek township. It was discovered in 1906 by a party on a hunting trip. It is approximately 230 metres in length with spacious passageways leading to a large cavern. It is a dry cave with excellent decorations. Inspection times are:10.30am, 11.30am, 12.30pm, 2.00pm, 3.00pm & 4.00pm daily and admissiom charges are Adults \$2.00, children under 16 years of age and pensioners \$1.00, Children under 4, free, Family groups \$5.00.

MARAKOOPA CAVE, near the King Solomen Cave, is 85km west of Launceston and 11km from the Mole Creek township in the foothills of Western Bluff (1420M) This cave was discovered in 1910 by the Byard brothers who were searching for lost cattle, and it was opened for visitors under the guidance of Mr Byard in 1912. In 1921 it was purchased by the Tasmarian Government, and electric lighting was subsequently installed.

It is now managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service. The cave consists of a large complex of caverns containing two undergroung streams with a glow-worm display and Gypsum formations. The section available for public inspection is some 457 metres in length.

Inspection times are: 10.30am, 11.45am, 1.30pm, 2.45pm, and 4.00pm daily.

Admission charges same as above.


Back out on the Bass Highway we come to WFSTBURY

"WHITE HOUSE", Village Green, Westbury. White House was built by Thomas White in 1841-42 as a General Store. Later it became known as White's Token Store. Architecturally it is in the Late Georgian Style, and additions followed this.

The HOUSE contains a collection of furniture, mainly 17th and 18th century English Oak, early Tasmanian prints, religious and marine paintings, Icons, Staffordshire China, pewter and copper. In the grounds is the building in which Methodist services for the district were held in early years and the BAKEHOUSE, rebuilt from original foundations, and in working order.

The COACH HOUSE and Stable which together with the Garage, houses a most interesting collection of early bicycles, horse-drawn vehicles, veteran and vintage cars. The collection includes early models from England, France, Germany, Australia and USA.

An additional feature is an outstanding exhibition of miniature furniture, glass, china, silver, toys and play-things. Open 9.30am-5.00pm daily, except Christmas Day and Good Friday.
