STATE ELECTION (TASMANIA)

1982 - YEAR OF THE TREE

Trees - are they really worth more than momentary consideration? Well, fortunately the United Nations Association of Australia thinks so and it has designated 1982 as Year of the Tree. I think most of us appreciate the beauty of trees, even if only at a subconscious level. The green of their foliage is soothing and peaceful. I have often felt much more relaxed when walking through a forest park, or turning a corner into a street lined with trees.

Can you imagine how bare life would be without trees? The vibrant colours of Autumn, the fun of children swishing through fallen leaves, Spring with its delicate blossoms and the hope that her newness brings, inspired Joyce Kilmer to write: "I think that I shall never see a poem as lovely as a tree."

Aesthetic considerations aside,

there are many benefits that trees give which are not so obvious and well-known. One of these is their cooling value. In fact trees are the original air conditioner. An American study showed that a mature tree shading a window can reduce inside temperature by 11°C, or put another way, take over the job of twenty room-sized air conditioners.

Trees release cooling moisture into the air. One lone beech tree can release 340-454 litres of moisture into the air on a summer day, the equivalent of just over 1,000 tinnies! You can reduce the costs of heating your home in winter by up to 30%. A barrier of evergreens can act as a w ndbreak, if planted to cut the force of a wind.

As you drive along in your car, spare a thought for the tree and its anti-pollution campaign. It absorbs dust and gases, thus making our air cleaner and more pleasant to breathe. The comments of the Chairman of the Year of the Tree National Committee encapsulate the importance of this year, and give us a good reason for supporting those activities which will highlight the value of trees. She(the Chairman) said, "It is appropriate that such a Year of the Tree be held in Australia as this is the world's driest continent and we can benefit most from efforts aimed at making the public more aware of the benefits of trees."
