SHOPPING AROUND FOR A HOME LOAN

In recent years, buying a house has seemed like an impossible dream for many people. Interest rates have been steadily creeping up and the cost of building or buying a house has risen steeply. In boom areas prices continue to rise at an alarming rate, and in some parts of Sydney, especially, prices have been rising at the rate of up to \$1000 a month.

According to the Bureau of Statistics, the wholesale price of materials used in house building, averaged over the six state capitals, rose by 35.4 per cent in the three years from August 1977 to August 1980. It is no wonder average income earners despair that they have missed out altogether and that the upwards escalator is running too quickly for them ever to get on the first step.

Yet a house is still one of the best hedges against the ravages of inflation. All the more reason if you are trying to buy a house, especially as a first-time buyer, to tread carefully and improve your chances by every means possible.

Owning your own home is an important part of developing financial security. Since the major step in achieving this is the ability to get a loan, you need to start planning well before you will need the money, and establish a good relationship and savings record with a reliable lender.

Most lending authorities work on the rule that your monthly repayment should not exceed one week's salary. There's no reason why shopping for money can't be as interesting as any other shopping. Every family is used to looking for bargains, comparing prices, brands and quality, and you can apply these skills to getting the best money. Here are some hints to help in the search for the best home loan.

• Make a list of the many companies which give home loans - building societies, credit unions, insurance companies and finance companies.

• Start with your bank. See the manager. Tell him how much you have saved, what your income is and ask how much you can borrow. Remember it will be limited to what you can repay with a quarter of your monthly income.

• Take a pencil and paper and make notes; don't rely on your memory.

• For comparison, see the manager of other banks, building societies and other lending companies.

• Be confident. You're not asking for favours. Financial institutions make their money by lending to people like you.

• Your choice may be limited to who is prepared to lend to you. The cheapest money is a bank overdraft, but it is the hardest to get. Next is a home loan from a bank and then from building societies. The most expensive money is from finance companies and, although the term is short, it has the advantage of being readily available in many cases.

• Never assume that because you have been making regular deposits in one place for years, you will get a loan. Ask, even before you commit your savings. No company will guarantee you a loan at some time in the distant future, but the managers should assure you that you will be judged on your ability to repay.

• You should treat an appointment with a manager of a bank or other lending authority as you would a job interview.

• Bankers and financiers generally are conservative. They say they lend on ability to repay, but their personal opinion of you will be part of their assessment. First impressions are important, so try to look efficient.

• You will need to comply with the regulations of various lenders such as a 12 months saving record, a certain amount saved, regular deposits. For example, the St. George Building Society in New South Wales does not check borrowers with credit agencies, but looks at their passbook, so it considers a pattern of regular, steady deposits is as good as a credit rating.

• If you are refused a loan, ask why and persist until you get an honest answer. It is important to know this, so you can correct it and try again.

EMPLOYEE PARTICIPATION

In 1978 the Commonwealth Government, in accordance with its policy on employee participation, set up the National Employee Participation Steering Committee. Its work is directed towards developing a greater understanding and encouraging the implementation of employee participation in Australia.

Employee participation has been defined as any process designed to increase the ability of a worker to make decisions, relating to a specific job within an organization, or to the overall functioning of an enterprise.

The Government considers employee participation to be a philosophy which ensures that in the management of any enterprise both employee goals and organization goals are seen as important and mutually interdependent. It also recognizes that this interdependence, together with introduction of appropriate measures, can lead to labour-management cooperation, greater effectiveness and improved quality of worklife. Further, it recognizes that a workable programme of employee participation is in the interests not only of individual employee but also of management, shareholders and consumers.

There is no single general model of employee participation in Australia, rather each organization should develop towards its own way of encouraging participation and not try to adopt one specific measure and make it work. Employee should be encouraged to work out locally useful arrangements which will lead to improved quality of work life and a more effective use of resources. Employee participation is a gradual and ongoing process which is in the interest of both the enterprise and its employees

up in the fight.

HISTORY OF AUSTRALIAN SOCIAL SECURITY.

The Beginnings.

The Commonwealth Of Australia was formed on 1 January 1901 by federation of the six States under a written constitution which, among other things, authorised the new Commonwealth Parliament to legislate in respect of age invalid pensions. In the event, the Commonwealth did not exercise this power until June 1908 when legislation providing for the introduction of means-tested flat-rate and invalid pensions was passed. The new pensions, which were financed from general revenue, came into operation in July 1909 and December 1910 respectively superseding State age pension schemes which has been introduced in New South Wales (1900) and Queensland (1908) Victoria (1900) and an invalid pension scheme introduced in New South Wales (1908).

The new pension was paid to men from age 65. It was paid to women at age 60, But until December 1910. The age pension was also subject to a residence qualification of 25 years which was decreased to 20 years in 1913. A residence qualification of 5 years applied to the invalid pension.

In 1912 the Commonwealth introduces maternity allowance. This was a lump sum cash grant payable to a mother on the birth of a child.

There were, however, several notable developments in the States, including the introduction, in New South Wales, of widows pensions in 1926 and child endowment in 1927 and an unemployment insurance scheme in Queensland in 1923.
