FREEDOM FROM HUNGER

'The Freedom from Hunger Campaign was set up in 1961 by a United Nations initiative to bring people from rich countries into a creative partnership to fight the causes of poverty & to unlock each other's potential for human development. To that end it seeks money for Third World self-help projects, conceived & carried out by local people-projects which will bring permanent change in their areas. Equally important it seeks to help Australians understand the real causes of poverty, & involve them in the struggle for world justice on a personal as well as a financial level.'

'Third World people don't want charity. They do want a sensitive partnership in the common work of building a better world based on an understanding that we all have much to learn from each other. Developing partnership & understanding is the dual task of the Freedom From Hunger in Australia.

It is important that Third World countries see Australia as a nation assisting them & that the Government structure is such that it enables assistance to be given in various areas.

By world standards the quantity of aid given by the Australian Government is low, on the other hand the assistance given to refugees is relatively high.

Freedom from Hunger is an independent organization which deals with the systems that cause perpetual poverty. The organization did become over-involved in raising money but now it has returned to its original aim of changing structures to reduce poverty as well as fund raising.

Austcare is the refugee arm; a consortium of agencies which care for refugees both overseas & in Australia.

WINTER MOTORING

In cold weather, freezing water can cause a burst in the radiator of a car which has been left standing. It is equally possible for a radiator to freeze and burst when a car is being driven - even though the water in the engine may be boiling.

This is because the thermostat prevents hot water from the engine circulating through the radiator until the engine reaches a set temperature. If a car is driven through cold air, water in the radiator can freeze before the thermostat valve has opened.

Freezing of the radiator can be avoided by adding a chemical, usually an ethylene glycol compound to the water to lower its freezing point. Good quality solutions sold as anti-freeze have a sodium-based inhibitor added, to prevent corrosion.

As anti-freeze gives protection against corrosion, it is advisable to leave it in the system all the year round. In some instances it can be left in two years.

The best working temperature for an engine, no matter what its speed, is one which heats the coolant at a point near the thermostat housing to about 80-85 deg. C. But engines can overheat - for instance when there is not sufficient water in the radiator, or on long climbs.

HOW TO TREAT CASES OF SHOCK

In shock the amount of blood pumped out by the heart is reduced. Signs of shock are:

1. The child looks pale or grey.
2. He is cold and sweating.
3. He complains of thirst.
4. His pulse is rapid and fluttery, but occasionally may be very slow.
5. His breathing is rapid and shallow, and may become gasping.
6. He complains of nausea, or may vomit.
7. He is restless, apprehensive, or apathetic.
8. He may lose consciousness.

Recognition of shock is important. Treatment is:

1. Rest: Lie the child flat on his back, without a pillow. Loosen his clothing. Reassure him. Treat bleeding or any injury. Cover with a light blanket.
2. Do not warm him. Only the skin is cold, and warming with hot-water bottles etc., will only dilate the skin vessels thus increasing the indirect loss of blood. Warming also increases sweating and thus fluid loss, and only makes shock worse.
3. Do not give the child drinks, unless you are sure he will not require an anaesthetic.
4. An injured and profoundly shocked child is a hospital case.

FINGAL VALLEY WELFARE COMMITTEE for ELDERLY CITIZENS

The 107th. meeting of the above committee was held on Tuesday, June 2nd.

The following notes contain excerpts from the meeting minutes.

- It was stated that approval had been given for a bus to run from Cornwall to St. Marys one day a week - Thursday, for the benefit of the elderly & persons with no transport available to them. (For further information contact Mrs. Camplin at Cornwall)

- A letter was received from the Rev. Eric Cave, Fingal, advising the committee of his resignation from the committee due to his being transferred to Penguin. (The committee wished Rev. Cave well in his future endeavours)

- The meeting was advised that there was a good attendance at the indoor bowls at the Cornwall Hall, 48 people played and 30 onlookers appeared to enjoy the day. A great deal of interest was evoked and a repeat day would be held in the summer time.

- The committee has over a time discussed the possibility of a mini-bus to bring persons into the hospital for day care. Especially those persons who need care and treatment on a weekly basis, live alone or just to relieve their relatives on one day a week. As no progress had been made to date it was suggested that maybe a 'ferry' system supplied by community minded persons including the more active elderly citizens could be instigated. (For further information or if you are able to help contact the Secretary, Mr. Jack Miller, Fingal.)

- It was decided that the Secretary write to the Elderly Citizens Clubs in the area suggesting that they arrange transport to take elderly persons from hospital to functions held by the clubs such as monthly meetings, bowls or any function of interest.

Elderly persons in hospital find that time hangs heavily on their hands and some kind of entertainment would help them. Hospital visitations by club members to help entertain in-patients by instigating Bingo, other games, supply old time music & maybe a bit of dancing or just yarnning would be invaluable and most welcome.

Fingal, St. Marys & Cornwall Clubs could possibly take turn-about, on a weekly basis. (Anyone outside the clubs willing to help could contact the Secretary, Mr. Jack Miller, Fingal or Matron at the St. Marys District Hospital.)

- The committee was advised that a second wood delivery to pensioners at Fingal had been made by the Fingal Football Club, in conjunction with the Manager of Malahide.

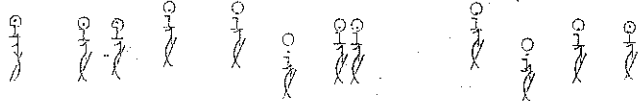

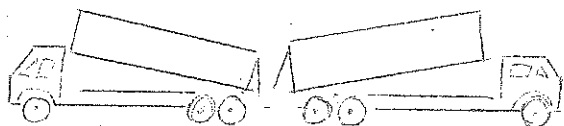
