The Report suggested that we should be attacking the prime causes of the conditions that assail us rather than just the condition itself. Simply put "prevention is

better than cure".

There have been a number of changes in the nature of illnesses over the past 50 years. In the 1930's the main causes of death for all are groups were infections & parasitic diseases. However, because of improved environmental conditions & in part because of medical advances the death rate from these causes has declined. New diseases have come to the forefront, including some which cause death & others which cause considerable illness. The first group includes heart disease (36% of all deaths) & cancer (20% of all deaths). The second group includes minor psychological disturbances. While illnesses like heart disease & some cancers are associated with old age it is thoucht that the environment & one's lifestyle-may also contribute to the high incidence of this type of illness. In addition modern living is said to contribute to other diseases such as hypertension, chronic bron-chitis & liver cirrhosis.

As a society we should be looking

to removal of some of the stresses of life, to improving environmental & social factors, & to instituting programmes to encourage people to be more health conscious. These programmes could take the direction of

measures to reduce the under age drinking problems & the road toll by lowering the permitted blood level to .05.

The other type of disability we have to combat are those caused by stress & hypertension. What we have to ask ourselves is whether iety with drugs or take actions to remove the cause of the anxiety. In a population of 14.6 million in 1980, 3.3 million prescriptions of anti-depressants, 3.7 million pre-2.7 million prescriptions for sedatives were issued.

Drug treatment is an important part of healthcare in a modern community but let us be aware of inflated expectations in regard to

drugs.

Since my last letter to "Do You Remember" many things have come to mind. The dear friends of yesteryear, who have quite often been spoken of at times. There was Amy and Walter Scales, Reg and Ella Toombs, Marion Oliver, Mr. & Mrs. Les Rowlings and of course the Colrain Family (Michael, Nan and Agnes). We have often been in contact with them over the years, with the exception of Marion Oliver. We seem to have lost contact with her, but would love to see her address published. The thing that I seem to always look for when travelling into Cornwall is the old school. I can recall we had an air-raid shelter dug just outside it, during the war years.

My dad worked at the screens for years and then moved on up to the coalmine. Recently some very old photos of the early miners at Cornwall were on display at the Fingal Library and my parents were delighted to see them, especially my Dad.

In 1913 our Doctor at St. Marys was Dr. Harrison. We had an outbreak of diphtheria. As we all had a turn of it, he put us in a hospital over at Harefield. It was only a Dutch barn with a tarp over it. It had a saw-dust floor so us boys made a hole under it and we went after rabbits. We brought plenty of rabbits back to the nurse, but I think she would have locked us up only she had no place to put us. Then a great flood came and everything floated. We had to get out in the middle of night. Old Mr. Schier took us out with the horses and buggy. The doctor had a goat farm at the top of St. Marys Pass. It wasn't long before they spread all over the Pass. They shot quite a lot that got down with the sheep and others shot them off the Pass Road. When the Doctor arrived back from Burnie he took a good dog to round them up. I think he only found about twenty-five. He then sent them
