

# THE VALLEY AND EAST COAST VOICE

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## FINGAL VALLEY COMMUNITY CENTRE

### Project Description

The Community Centre has been planned on the "old mill site" in Esk Main Road, Fingal. The land is owned by the Fingal Council.

The total complex has been designed to encourage the greatest community involvement possible.

From the recreation aspect, sports such as basketball, tennis, badminton, volley ball, table tennis indoor bowls, hockey, squash and swimming can be accommodated. In addition the centre can be used for concerts, theatrical activities, fairs and displays or any other local activity where groups need a large covered floor area serviced with amenity areas.

The total complex includes:-

- a multi purpose hall with concrete panel walls flush on the inside and 'colorbond' metal sheet roofing. A heavy duty timber floor will cater for the varying uses and inserts to support nets etc. will be built in.
- an amenities area incorporating male and female change rooms, showers and toilets. This section will be constructed with concrete floors, masonry walls with plastered and tiled surfaces to meet Health Department requirements.
- two squash courts with precast concrete walls and a timber floor finish. The back wall will be "amoufloat" glass to enable spectators to view the play.
- a small office area is to be constructed in masonry and will include the reception, a first aid room and kiosk.
- A 25m long 6 lane swimming pool is to be built alongside the hall, and direct access is provided between the pool and change rooms. The pool can be used for competition swimming although a greater emphasis will be placed on recreation type

activities for families to enjoy.

The pool will be constant depth tiled above water line and provided with a non-slip surround.

landscaping to the total site will include areas for childrens play, a barbecue area and coal mining machinery display. An old kiln will be preserved and remain as a feature. Parking for 23 cars will be provided. Planting to the area will be carried out to provide an attractive backdrop for the activities planned.

### Staging

The project will be constructed in the following stages:-

Stage 1 - Multi-purpose hall plus the male and female change rooms, toilets and showers. Landscape the site and complete the car-park.

Stage 2 - Complete the building complex with two squash courts and the administration block. Construct the pool adjacent to the hall. Complete the landscaping in this area.

### Financial Aspects

On present day costs the complex has been estimated to cost:-

Stage 1 - \$241,000  
Stage 2 - \$154,000

Total \$395,000

Assistance in funding will be sought through the Public Bodies Assistance Act.

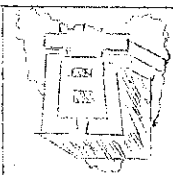

### FOOTY NOTES by Blind Freddy

Football Fever is over, at least for another year, with the Fingal District Football Association Grand Final, Saturday 18th Sept., drawing the 1982 season to a close.

Swansea came out victors on the day, ably captained by Leon Grice, Association Best and Fairest Senior award winner for 1982.

After a twelve year drought, St. Marys achieved the Reserves top award under the guidance of Captain and Coach Alan Lynch, ably assisted by the Grand Finalist specialist Mr Dale Wright of St. Marys.

Swansea thirds once again came up tops, following a battle with the young St. Helens side, who must be considered as a 1983 potential winning side, considering that all players stay with their Coach and Club.

The association, with the help of the St. Marys Football Club, ended the season with a record gate taking, in excess of \$3,000.

With help from the St. Marys Football Club supporters, and the local community members of the Fingal Valley the day over-all was a great success. Local builder, Mr Ron McCarty and staff, worked against time to have the scoreboard rebuilt for the finals, and it certainly was a credit to the St. Marys Club, featuring the striking black and gold colours.

Footy fans certainly went out of their way this year to prepare banners and bedeck themselves in their favourite club colours. The outfits of the St. Helens Netball Team, (who won both netball games) made the scene even more colourful, and their exuberance was ineffective.

The Northern Suburbs Silver Band from Launceston, added to the atmosphere of festivity and was appreciated by many supporters, their gay red uniforms standing well out in the crowd. Bunting, flags, colour and bonhamie was in abundance, and added to the day.

It was cheering indeed, to see such community spirit, and one would hope that this good-will continues for the 364 days to Grand Final Day next year. This year saw the innovation of the St. Marys Hotel footballers 1/2 mile race, which was run at half-time of the Senior match and consisted of 2 laps of the oval with representatives from all Association Clubs.

The winner was Dale Ridgers of the St. Marys Club, who won convincingly. He and the placegetters for second and third, were presented with a cheque and a trophy, which was donated by Greg and Wendy Tapp of the St. Marys Hotel.

## AUSTRALIA'S FOREIGN AID

Australia is neighbour to some of the least developed countries of the third world - South East Asia, The South Pacific and Indian Ocean Regions - and while we give assistance to some eighty countries, these three regions receive priority in our aid programs.

Australia channels its aid either directly in response to requests from the governments of developing countries (bilaterally) or indirectly, through international bodies such as the United Nations (multilaterally). In 1982-83 Australia's bilateral aid will rise by 11% to a total of \$544 million and multilateral aid will be \$173.7 million.

Our major form of bilateral assistance to developing countries is financial aid for specific development activities which range from large scale regional programs to simple facilities in villages undertaken by the developing countries. These are often the things that we, as Australians, take for granted - running water, food, and basic health care.

In many developing countries there is an increasing gap between food demand and supply. This has been aggravated by population increase and the progressive destruction of agricultural land for more housing or through devastation by war and natural disasters.

We are responding to this problem in two ways: supplying food aid and helping these countries to supply more of their own food requirements through improved farming techniques. In 1982-83 some \$112 million will be provided for food aid while the balance of our aid has been allocated for technical and industrial assistance, health and education.

The diversity of our aid program is demonstrated by a few examples from this year's budget-

\$10,000 towards the eradication of foot and mouth disease in Indonesia; \$150,000 to build and equip a desiccated coconut factory in Tonga; \$220,000 to develop a sheep breeding centre in Bangladesh; \$5,600,000 for the construction of roads, agricultural and irrigation projects and village water supplies in a region of the Philippines; and \$45,000 for equipment for a school for the blind in Fiji.

Papua New Guinea is the biggest recipient of our foreign aid, receiving about one third of our total aid. This reflects our special responsibility as the former colonial power in that country. It is also in our interests to continue to assist the development of our closest neighbour.

Overseas aid grants took up .47% of Australia's gross national product between 1979 and 1981. Although that figure seems small it compares favourably with other western countries - we are seventh behind the Netherlands (1.01%), Norway, Sweden, Denmark, France and Belgium. The United Kingdom gave .43% of their G.N.P. while the U.S.A. gave only .22%.

Our geographic location as a wealthy country in a region of developing countries places special responsibilities on us to assist these countries. This responsibility not only contains a moral element but a practical one as well.

The Australian government makes no secret of its political use of its overseas aid. While seeking to correct an imbalance in aid to the South Pacific Region we need to protect our economic, strategic and political interests. Development promotes stability and provides economic advantages both to the developing countries and to Australia.

# TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS

Continuing with our journey around Tasmania, this week we visit:

THE DEVON GALLERY, 161 Main Road Austins Ferry.

This Gallery adjoins Devon Nursery on the Midland Highway, 14 km north of Hobart.

Features include quality pottery, woodcraft, leather work, pewter, copper, sterling silver jewellery and paintings in an interesting diversity of medium and style.

It was opened in 1975 with the express intention of displaying only high quality works of Tasmanian origin.

The pottery and glassware emanates from some of the State's leading craftsmen and is both functional and non-functional.

Woodcraft of a very high standard, includes items ranging from sculpture to lampstands, bowls, caskets and hand-carved Tasmanian animals. All woods used are indigenous and include the unique Huon Pine, Horizontal Scrub, Sassafrass, Myrtle and Blackwood.

Jewellery displayed covers a range of designs in sterling silver and semi-precious stones, with beautifully fashioned rings, pendants, bangles and the like.

The paintings in the main, cover a range of landscapes in Tasmania. There are gentle landscapes and the rugged wilderness, wildflowers and seascapes. All interpreted in the manner the artist feels. An excellent representation of Tasmania's best artists.

TASMANIAN MUSEUM AND ART GALLERY, 5 Argyle St., Hobart.

The Museum and Art Gallery stands between Constitution Dock and Macquarie St., one city block from the G.P.O. A visit provides a good introduction to the human history and natural history of Tasmania.

The museum has been on its present site since 1863. Its origins were in early scientific groups formed in Hobart Town in the 1820's and 1830's, when a young penal colony struggled to raise itself above its humble beginnings.

The main collections are Australian and European fine and applied art, Tasmanian colonial artefacts, Tasmanian animals, plants, fossils, rocks and minerals, Tasmanian Aboriginal, Australian and south-west Pacific artefacts and early European and Australian coins.

A room dealing with the early whaling and shipping days of Hobart Town looks out over the docks and the River Derwent.

Tasmanian colonial art, Contemporary Australian art and English water-colours are particularly well represented in the art collection.
