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IS IT REALLY CHEAPER TO SHOP IN THE CITY?

I often wonder if the real reason why country people shop in the city, is only because there is more freedom of choice, or if they truly believe they save money?

I have heard people say, "but you can't buy that in St. Marys", but if more local people patronised local shopping facilities, maybe you COULD buy just what you need here!

I feel sure if shop-owners were confident local residents would shop locally, they would feel safe in ordering more stock. But when they know for a fact, that even though most items would only be a little dearer, (freight costs etc.) people still go to the cities, so why should they stock items they know they won't sell?

The cost of travelling to the city from St. Marys, I.E. Launceston, is more than just putting X amount of petrol in your car.

At a rough guess, the costs involved for two people, for a day's shopping in the city would be something like:

FUEL.....	APPROX....	\$25.00
WEAR AND TEAR ON VEHICLE.....		\$10.00
(Conservative guess)		
PARKING FEES... APPROX.....		\$6.00
(Unless you are lucky and know somewhere free)		
MEALS AND SNACKS... APPROX...		\$6.00
SUNDRIES.... (Drinks etc.)....		\$3.00
(Non-alcoholic)		
TOTAL		\$50.00

This amount would have to be allocated before you start shopping for those bargains.

What about the shoe leather and the aching feet, not to mention the aching arms and back, from carrying parcels back to your car, which seems further away than when you parked it and walked to the shopping area. So you would have approx. \$50.00 to spend locally if you didn't go at all.

Although I only mention St. Marys, this must apply to all small towns in the Valley and on the East coast.

Country stores do have quite a wide and varied range of goods, but even if you don't see what you want, have

you actually asked your local traders to get those items for you?

If you do find what you are looking for, but feel they are a little dearer than you expected, why not try to 'do a deal'. They may be prepared to help you, but bear in mind that the price may not compare with large city establishments, who buy in bulk, which small stores cannot afford to do.

Have you ever given any thought to what would happen if our local shopkeepers decided to move out, and leave the area without shopping facilities? What about when we are too old to drive, or travel to the cities for so-called bargains?

What about giving your local businessmen and women a chance to help with your shopping needs? Remember, the turn-over is not great in a small town, but the service could be much GREATER if you patronise local stores.

We need these local businesses, and, more-so, they need our help to survive.

Instead of saying 'St. Marys is going down-hill fast', which I have heard several times recently, why not make your local shopping facilities, 'CONVENIENT SHOPPING' not a 'SHOPPING CONVENIENCE'?

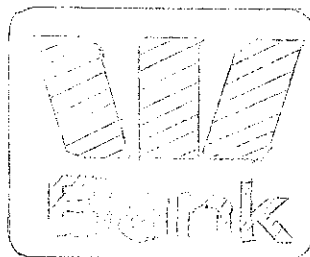

It was certainly all the fun of the fair at St. Marys District High School on Friday 22nd October. From 12.30 until 3.00 p.m. the school became a fairground full of activity and entertainment.

The annual Fair, a joint effort of Parents and Friends groups, Mothers Club, staff and students, demonstrated the pride which the district has in its school and the spirit of co-operation existing in the area. The general public support for the Fair was excellent and it was good to see local politicians George Shaw, Stephen Salter and Michael Polley, attending.

Proceedings began at 12.30 p.m. with a giant barbecue. Parents worked very hard providing hamburgers, sausages and saveloys for the 360 children and many members of the public who had their lunch at the school. Then at 1.00 p.m. the stalls were officially opened and selling began in earnest. Stalls were set up by the Mothers Club and by Parents and Friends groups from St. Marys, Bichenor, Scamander-Falmouth and Fingal-Mathinna-Rossarden. Some school classes and even some individual students also conducted stalls and added to the variety of produce offered. There were cakes and sweets, clothing and books, plants and magazines, vegetables, jams and preserves. The chocolate wheel did a roaring trade and many hopefuls bought last-minute tickets in the raffle, the prizes for which were a blackwood table and turned wooden bowls.

Other parts of the school resembled side-show alley, with entertainments and games for young and old. There were darts and horse-shoe throwing, hoopla and a handball competition. Some tried their skill at throwing 5c into bottle tops while others tried to thread a ring along an electric wire without touching it. Perhaps the most popular drawcards were two games of skill with enticing prizes. One involved throwing a ball through a small hole, the reward being to dunk a teacher in a bath of cold water. The other was the good old wet sponge, thrown at a head poking through a hole. Many students and teachers offered their heads for punishment, even the Principal who attracted a large number of eager throwers. It was all in good fun and raised much money.

While the energetic bounced on a trampoline or hung on to helium-filled balloons, the more thoughtful played computer games or relaxed over afternoon tea in the canteen. Popcorn and pancakes were popular, as was the lucky dip for the littlies.

TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS.

"The Model Tudor Village".

Tudor Court, Sandy Bay (Bus Stop 30) Hobart.

Created and built by the late John Palotta who was totally incapacitated through polio when he was nine years' old. The work took him several years and although it was not officially on display at 'Tudor Court' until December 1957, John was working on it until July 1971, adding many improvements. He was a great artist and an even greater human being.

Whilst there are a number of well known villages of a much larger scale, there are none to compare with this delicate, colourful and authentic model of the Tudor period, with its ruined 8th century abbey, 14th century church, coaching inn, manor house, Oast house and twenty five other period houses, shops and buildings. The little people, 2" high, are built from dental plaster, as are the delicate flowers and trees.

The whole village is electronically lit with five colour changes from dawn to night-fall, and the tale of John and his work is tape recorded with pleasing background music.

The Shot Tower Channel Highway, Taroona.

The world famous Shot Tower is one of Tasmania's most historic landmarks and was completed by Joseph Moir in 1870 and is situated on 3½ ha of beautiful country, 11km from Hobart. The residence and museum date back to 1835 and 1855 respectively, and the museum which was originally the workshop, has an extensive range of exhibits on display.

Now re-habilitated and a major tourist attraction, one may inspect the museum, climb the Tower (60.3 Metres high) partake of Con-victshire Teas, Appreciate the Art Gallery, and take pleasure in walking through the property and admiring the many native plants that have been planted.

A modern amenities block is provided for the convenience of visitors and the shot tower is open every day and is part of a delightful drive along the scenic Channel Highway.

Hastings Caves, Hastings.

The Newdegate Caves at Hastings in southern Tasmania, was discovered by timber work-ers in 1917 and named after Sir Francis Newdegate, Governor of Tasmania between 1917 and 1920. It was opened for public inspection in 1939 and is located 110km south of Hobart by road passing through the township of Hastings. An extensive system of spacious caverns with more than 1.6 km of passages and good decorations include long straws and heliocites. Extensions from the public area are known as Christmas and Binney Caves, but these are not available for inspection.

There is also a thermal pool located near the Cave and this is available to the public for swimming. The area is managed by the National Parks and wildlife Service.

Separate restaurant services are avail-able.
