AFTER THE GAMES?

THIRTY-NINE GOLD MEDALS, INCLUDING TWO TO TASMANIA: WHAT AN ACHIEVEMENT! NO ONE IS DENYING THE AMOUNT OF HARD WORK AND HUGE SUMS OF MONEY THAT WENT INTO THE BRISBANE GAMES. BUT IS IT ALL GOING TO STOP?

FOR SOME YEARS NOW AUSTRALIA'S SPORT POLICY HAS BEEN TO ENCOURAGE AND SUPPORT ANYONE WHO PLAYS SPORT NO MATTER AT WHAT LEVEL, AND TO UPGRADE OUR ATHLETES, COACHES, AND SPORTING FACILITIES.

HOWEVER, IT WAS NOT UNTIL LAST YEAR THAT THE AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF SPORT WAS OPENED WITH THE AIM OF PROVIDING WORLD STANDARD TRAINING FACILITIES TO ALLOW OUR BEST ATHLETES AND COACHES TO LIVE, WORK AND TRAIN IN AUSTRALIA. BEFORE THEN, MANY OF THEM HAD TO CHOOSE BETWEEN SPORT AND THEIR CAREER ORIENTED STUDIES. NOW THEY ARE ABLE TO DO BOTH IN CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER TERTIARY INSTITUTIONS IN CANBERRA.

THE INSTITUTE AT PRESENT HAS PROGRAMMES IN EIGHT SPORTS - TRACK AND FIELD, BASKETBALL, NETBALL, GYMNASTICS, SOCCER, SWIMMING, WEIGHTLIFTING AND TENNIS. TWELVE TASMANIANS ATTEND THE INSTITUTE THIS YEAR AND ARE REPRESENTED IN ALL PROGRAMMES EXCEPT GYMNASTICS. THE TENNIS COACH, HELEN GOURLAY IS ALSO A TASMANIAN.

THIS YEAR'S FEDERAL BUDGET HAS SET ASIDE \$4 MILLION TO COMPLETE THE INSTITUTE OF SPORTS' SCIENCE LABORATORY. HERE COACHES AND ATHLETES WILL HAVE AVAILABLE THE BEST TECHNICAL AND MEDICAL ADVICE FOR PLANNING THEIR TRAINING PROGRAMMES.

AN \$8 MILLION INDOOR TENNIS AND SWIMMING CENTRE IS TO BE COMPLETED AT THE INSTITUTE IN 1983 AND AN INDOOR TRAINING FACILITY WILL BE STARTED.

UNDER THE INTERNATIONAL STANDARD SPORTING FACILITIES PROGRAMME THE COMMONWEALTH WILL MATCH STATE FUNDING OF PROJECTS ON A DOLLAR FOR

DOLLAR BASIS; \$25 MILLION WILL BE SPENT OVER THE NEXT THREE YEARS. OF THIS \$3.9 MILLION WILL GO TO TASMANIA TO FINANCE THE LAKE BARRINGTON ROWING COURSE, THE UPGRADE OF THE ST. LEONARDS CYCLING VELODROME AND THE INTERNATIONAL BASEBALL DIAMOND AT KINGSTON.

THIS YEAR THE GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE A GRANT OF \$3.2 MILLION TO THE SPORTS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME WHICH AIMS TO GET PEOPLE INVOLVED IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF SPORT AS WELL AS PLAYING IT. IN THIS WAY THE STARS OF TOMORROW CAN BE IDENTIFIED AND ENCOURAGED AT AN EARLY AGE.

OVER \$1 MILLION OF THE GRANT IS TO BE SPENT ON EMPLOYING ADMINISTRATORS AND COACHES, TO GENERATE LARGE SPONSORSHIP FUNDS. \$600,000 OF THE GRANT WILL HELP SEND AUSTRALIAN TEAMS TO OVER 140 INTERNATIONAL SPORTING EVENTS OVERSEAS.

IT SEEMS THAT IT IS NOT ALL GOING TO STOP AT BRISBANE, AND THAT OUR ATHLETES SHOULD BE IN GOOD SHAPE FOR THE BIENNIAL AUSTRALIAN GAMES IN SYDNEY NEXT YEAR AND THE LOS ANGELES OLYMPICS IN 1984.

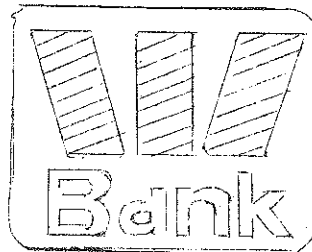

FAMILY DAY CARE: Which includes full time, part time, occasional, overnight and emergency care, in the warm family atmosphere of a carer's private home.

CHILD CARE CO-OP: a reciprocal arrangement where mothers care for each other's children on a no cost, or low cost basis- no licence is involved.

DOGS CAN HEAR FOR DEAF PEOPLE

Hearing dogs Incorporated assists deaf people with specially trained dogs - at no cost to them - to hear and respond to daily sounds. The program was introduced from America into Australia in May 1981 by the Lions Club of Australia and Papua New Guinea. Hearing Dogs Incorporated, a charitable association, was located by the Lions Clubs in South Australia and that organisation is providing Hearing Dogs to deaf people all over Australia.

There is no need for a breed standard or registered dogs. The animals chosen for Hearing Dogs are obtained through local animal shelters, so an abandoned or unwanted pet has the opportunity to provide a lifetime of service to deaf people.

Over three months the dogs are given obedience training and a sensitivity to a variety of auditory cues, such as a baby crying a smoke alarm, an alarm clock, a security buzzer, a ringing telephone a knock at the door and unfamiliar sounds which may indicate danger or some other emergency.

After training each dog is accompanied by a trainer to its new home. The trainer, dog and hearing-impaired person undergo an on-site familiarisation and training period from three to five days ensuring a successful placement. The cost involved is about \$1,250 per dog.

The Beginning.

The Tasmanian Lions Eye Diagnostic Centre formally came into existence on Thursday, Feb 11th 1982, when it was officially opened by Past-International President Eloyd Morgan of New Zealand.

This date was both an end and a beginning. The end result of many months of planning by a few people and the beginning of a sensitive and specialist medical service to a great many Tasmanians.

In a very real way the centre is the living, working symbol of Tasmanian Lionism. It was conceived, planned and opened to the public within the first two years of Tasmania becoming a separate district. It is a concrete example of Lionism at work.

Since its opening thousands of patients have sought its unique services. Their satisfaction and the support of the Medical fraternity are living testimony to both the need of the services and their quality.

CYSS FINGAL PORTLAND

The job market is a "hard nut to crack". The young unemployed are particularly effected by this and suffer because they have little or no background work experience to offer employers. In addition, they have little or no opportunity to gain the experience they need.

This is an unfortunate Catch-22 situation that young people today face. There are many young unemployed in the community who are particularly concerned about their future and who make what efforts they can to come to grips with this situation. Volunteer work, community service and local activities are readily available options. They also require a high degree of personal motivation and initiative.

Community Youth Support Scheme provides additional options. Among these are:

EXPERIENCE IN THE WORKFORCE

This is a program to provide experience in a range of jobs.

SHORT COURSES

Short courses are offered at Todd's Hall on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Young people coming to the center are actively engaged in skill-building and personal development via an agenda of supervised classes

CASUAL WORK

Vacancies casual and part-time work do exist within the area and CYSS participants are available to a wide range of odd jobs.

INFORMATION-ADVISING

Information packets are available through the CYSS. These contain information and advice on jobs and jobs seeking.
