LACK OF SLEEP IS A KILLER ON HIGHWAYS

Here is some good advice that any driver should heed:-

. Don't start a long trip at night after a day's work. If you must do this, then make sure you get to bed early the night before.

. No more than 10 hours on the road unless you can share driving with an off-sider.

. Do not try to keep on after your first drowsy spell; the next will come quickly, and if you survive that, the next will come even sooner.

. Be very careful about preparing for the return trip. You can get away with the outward journey by drawing on your energy reserves, even if you ignore this advice - but the risk is much greater on the return trip.

. Don't drink alcohol until the journey is over. Remember, sleep is the key to the problem. You cannot store sleep beforehand but you can make sure you are not short of sleep when you start.

If you haven't had a good night's sleep, don't drive!

Almost 70 per cent of road deaths involving drivers and passengers occur in country areas. Driver fatigue is an important factor in many of these crashes.

The instant you become sleepy, pull up and have a rest or walk to wake up!

SITTING TO AVOID STRAIN AND PAIN

Driving is a strain for many motorists because they do not sit properly in a car.

Some suffer back and neck discomfort and pain, especially on long trips.

In some cases this can lead to cramp. An incorrect driving position can also increase the risk of a crash.

The right driving position is to tuck the base of the spine back in the seat. Make sure you are properly balanced and have your arms and legs slightly bent. Adjust the seat until you find the most comfortable position from which you can reach the pedals.

Most cars have adjustable seats backs, allowing them to be set to your own requirements. Adjust the seatbelt firmly.

NEWS RELEASE.

Issued by David Llewellyn, Federal A.L.P. candidate for Wilmot.

Tasmanians living in country areas could pay up to \$900 a Year in telephone rental if recommendations now before the Federal Government are adopted.

The recommendation is contained in the recently released Davidson report into the operations of Telecom, which is now being considered by the Federal Government.

The Federal A.L.P. candidate for Wilmot, Mr David Llewellyn, said the savage impost proposal was one of the aspects of the report which had not received wide publicity.

Mr Llewellyn said the report proposed a change to the present annual rental charge of \$105, which currently applies to all private subscribers.

Instead, it suggested that those living within two kilometres of an exchange mostly capital city residents - should pay \$100, while rental would increase by \$50 for each kilometre to a maximum of \$900.

This would affect thousand of Tasmanians, in particular people living on farms and in country towns away from the main urban areas.

Mr Llewellyn said it was a long-held principle that the profitable operation of service organisations such as Telecom subsidised the unprofitable areas. This ensured that all Australians received a fair deal.

Under the Davidson report recommendations hundreds of thousands of Australians - including many Tasmanians would receive a very unfair deal, and an A.L.P. Government would not accept the recommendations.

He said that the impost would come on top of the severe hardships already facing country people - the effects of drought, unemployment and rising inflation.

"Any further, avoidable impost would be just too much to bear, he said.




