EARLY BRITISH SETTLERS BROUGHT WITH THEM FARM ANIMALS USED IN THEIR HOMELAND FOR MEAT AND TO PROVIDE SUCH FOODS AS COW'S MILK AND HEN EGGS. TODAY, BEEF, LAMB, PORK AND CHICKEN ARE STILL THE MAJOR FOODS OF THE ANIMAL ORIGIN.

WHEAT WAS THE STAPLE GRAIN IN BRITAIN AND SO BECAME THE AUSTRALIAN STAPLE.

SIMILARLY, THE EARLY SETTLERS IMPORTED AND GREW THOSE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES WHICH WERE FAMILIAR TO THEM. THE INDIGENOUS FOODS OF THE ABORIGINES WERE USED ONLY FOR EMERGENCY FEEDING.

EXTENSIVE AND RAPID TECHNOLOGICAL CHANGES MOST RESPONSIBLE FOR CHANGING OUR EATING HABITS ARE:

AGRICULTURE MODERN MECHANISED FARMING EQUIPMENT HAS OPENED NEW LANDS AND MADE FARMING LESS LABOUR-INTENSIVE. IMPROVED, FASTER-GROWING GENETIC STRAINS OF CROPS AND LIVE-STOCK HAVE BEEN INTRODUCED.

FOOD SCIENCE AND FOOD PROCESSING LOUIS PASTEUR'S DISCOVERY THAT MICROBES CAUSE FOOD SPOILAGE OPENED THE DOOR FOR THE LARGE-SCALE DEVELOPMENT OF PROCESSED FOODS AND THE GROWTH OF THE FOOD INDUSTRY. TODAY MOST AUSTRALIANS ARE CITY DWELLERS, PRODUCING LITTLE, IF ANY, OF THEIR OWN FOOD. THEY DEPEND ON THE FOOD INDUSTRY TO SUPPLY NOT ONLY THE BASICS, BUT ALSO HIGHLY PROCESSED CONVENIENCE FOODS REQUIRING LITTLE HOME PREPARATION.

TRANSPORTATION TODAY THE RAILWAY, TRUCKS, AEROPLANES AND SHIPS MOVE LARGE QUANTITIES OF FOOD FROM FARMS TO FACTORIES, AND THEN TO THE SUPERMARKETS AND OTHER SHOPS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY. THE ALMOST UNIVERSAL USE OF THE CAR FOR PERSONAL TRANSPORT HAS ALSO CHANGED FOOD BUYING HABITS.

ENER

ENERGY GAS, OIL AND ELECTRICITY ARE IMPORTANT ENERGY SOURCES, POWERING EVERY STEP OF THE FOOD CHAIN FROM FIELD TO TABLE.

PACKAGING AND HANDLING THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW PACKAGING MATERIALS, SUCH AS ALUMINIUM, STEEL AND PLASTIC HAS ALLOWED THE LONG DISTANCE TRANSPORT AND STORAGE OF FOOD. FREEZING AND OTHER HANDLING PROCEDURES ARE ALSO ESSENTIAL FOR FOOD TRANSPORT AND STORAGE.

INSTEAD OF CHOOSING FOOD ON THE BASIS OF TIME-TESTED TRADITIONS AND KNOWLEDGE AND GOOD NUTRITIONAL ADVICE, WE BUY THE POPULAR BRANDS OR 'EXCITING' NEW PRODUCTS, MOST HEAVILY PROMOTED BY THE FOOD INDUSTRY.

AVOCA RECREATION GROUND

Extract from letter written by Mr. George Shaw M.L.C. to Mr. E.M. Bingham M.H.A.

I am aware that a submission has been made to you for a grant to assist the Avoca Football Club to purchase a travelling irrigator and other equipment necessary to upgrade the Avoca Football and Recreation Ground.

The ground in question is barren and dry without any natural wind protection. The average rainfall at Avoca is in the order of 18" and recent dry seasons have left it almost bare.

Water is necessary to re-establish the required growth of grasses on the arena and to establish trees for wind protection and beautification.

The Fingal Council and Avoca Football and Cricket Clubs are supporting the request and are prepared to co-operate in the development of the plan.

Avoca is a small village which has suffered the effect of the closure of the Rossarden mine and the local sawmill. It has also suffered drought equivalent to the worst areas of South Eastern Tasmania.

In spite of this it has managed to field football and cricket teams which play a vital part in the social life of the community.

I believe they need special help. Unemployment at Avoca would be higher than in any other region that I can think of in Tasmania.

Therefore I write in support of the request made, believing that the development plan is necessary and worthwhile.

I would be pleased if you will advise me of the outcome of the application.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

After reading a letter in the last issue of the Valley Voice by "Consider the Children" our first reaction was to reply with a defensive letter but we know we do not have to justify our actions or defend the proposed school in any way for we are certain God wanted us to conduct the survey. We will now proceed step by step as the Holy Spirit leads us regarding this Catholic Christian School.

We are committed, Spirit-filled Christians and as such know we cannot be Christian in name only but by word and action. God has shown us in the past that He will see us through any task He commissions us to do and He will do the same now. This was especially true with the building of a house and setting up of a market garden for our Vietnamese neighbours. It was a difficult 3 year project with seemingly insurmountable problems that tested our faith to the limit. But every prayer was answered for God was with us as we worked little by little until we successfully achieved our goal. We came in for, and still receive, criticism for answering this call of Jesus to help these people and we know we are in for much more regarding the proposed school. Then, as now on this new project, we were subject to gossip and rumours but this did not and will not deter us. Unless God tells us otherwise we will not give up the idea of a Christian school. It would take too long to explain this by letter as the idea is the result of about 2 years prayer and research.

We also welcome an opportunity to share with anyone willing to listen what Jesus means to us, the power of prayer and the reality of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

Our suggested motto for the school is "To know Jesus and make Him known." Thus we intend the school to be Christian in the full sense of the word therefore there will be no segregation on our part. Also we see the school not just as an education centre for children, but as a vital part of providing spiritual renewal in this district.

To any Catholics that may be concerned that we are taking this project on by ourselves we can assure them that we have the permission of both the Catholic Education Centre and the Archbishop as we have talked to both Father

Williams and his Grace and both have approved of our proposal and suggested aims etc.

To "Consider the Children" we would like to say three things. Firstly, we suggest you re-read our letter-drop as we stated quite plainly that we have nothing against state schools but we want more than this system offers for our children. Between us we have previously worked over 13 years at St. Marys school and we agree with you about the standard of the school and the teachers. Also we asked people to contact us if they wanted more information. Is it fair to pass judgement on the proposed school without doing so, for we could not provide sufficient information on such a short letter-drop?

Secondly, you suggested pursuing the idea of more Christian teaching in State schools. We feel you need to read Part 2, section 6, page 4 of the Education Act to understand that this is virtually impossible. A copy of the Act is available from the Government Printers, Salamanca Place, Hobart.

Thirdly, we give you our full support for St. Marys High School being extended to Matriculation level. Are there already plans underway for this? We are willing to help in anyway we can to achieve this aim.

In conclusion we would like to quote Cardinal Newman: "Nothing would be done at all if a man waited till he could do it so well that no one could find fault with it."

HANDY HINTS.

Jewellery care.

Diamonds can be immersed in hot suds. Use a cosmetic brush, trimmed down to make it stiffer, to clean the setting which often becomes caked with soap. Rinse in hot water. Finally, put the jewellery into a cup, cover it with methylated spirit and move it around. Remove and pat dry.

Wash gold bracelets, chains, etc in warm soapy water with a few drops of ammonia. Use a soft brush to clean links and setting. Rinse, dry, then rub with a silver polishing cloth to restore the shine.

Gilt chains, bracelets and necklet can be cleaned by rubbing with a cloth dipped in talcum powder. Occasionally immerse the pieces in soapy lukewarm water and rinse in warm water. Pat dry.

Real pearl become more lustrous if they are worn frequently. They can be washed in tepid water made sudsy with toilet soap. Do not soak them and rinse in warm water and pat dry.

Synthetic pearls should not be immersed in water. Moisture causes fine coating to peel. Wipe them with a slightly dampened cloth or dust them with talcum powder.
