Notice to Owners of Forested Land. In recent years, illegal cutting of timber on private property and crown land has been on the increase. It is often caused by land owners not knowing and not checking where their boundaries are.

The time and money involved to land owners in sorting out and settling the cases either in or out of court has been considerable.

The Forestry Act tries to overcome this problem in a simple way, by giving the land owner and the adjoining owner the opportunity to establish their common boundary to their mutual satisfaction before cutting starts near a common lander boundary.

Under Section 59(B) a land owner who intends to cut or allows someone else to cut on his land, is required to give at least 14 days notice of his intention to cut or have cut, to his neighbours, if that cutting is to take place within 400m of the common boundary and if ..

in excess of 40 cubic metres.

The notice of intent canbe by word of mouth initially, but should be confirmed in writing.

Land owners under this section includes the Forestry Commission.

In case of a common boundary with State Forest, if the required notice is give n in time, Commission staff will make sure that the boundary is established to the mutual satisfact -ion of the land owner and the Commission. L. Witte.

farmer and the pig, the average number of pigs born per sow per year was significantly higher than on those farms where the pigs were wary of humans. Producing healthy pigs does, however, involve much more than just talking to them, disease control, good hygiene, and rigid quarantine in animal breeding are of course essential to produce a healthy pig.

Tender loving care combined with modern pig production practices will ensure a healthy, happy herd with a better quality pigmeat for the family dinner table and a profit for the farmer.

Dear Sir,

Ever since I received a letter through my mail box, advocat-ing the need for a Catholic Primary School in the St. Marys area, I have given a lot of thought to this proposal.

Even though I would be one of the last persons to knock the Catholic School system, it seems to me that some locals, by proposing alternative schooling, are knocking our own local school, which I believe is one of the best schools, with some of the best teachers in Tasmania.

Maybe there isn't enough Christian teaching at Primary level, but surely if the matter was pursued, this could

be overcome.

Since the upgrading of the St. Helens High School and the closure of the Rossarden mine, total enrolment at St. Marys has suffered.

I believe that St. Marys and surrounding districts is too small an area to support two Primary Schools. Apart from this fact, I also believe it is not wise to segregate children living in the same small town, as it can cause friction and animosity among friends.

Wouldn't it be far better to pursue the idea of upgrading St.Marys High School to Matriculation Level?

If this were to happen, children who at the age of 15 or 16 years are sometimes too young to leave home to live in the cities to complete their education, could remain under parental supervision for a further two years.

Even though some families cannot afford the costs involved when sending children to board in the city, the costs would be considerably less if those could attend grades 11 & 12 locally. It would give all children on the East Coast with the knowledge and inclination to further their education, a chance.

I agree that children need to eventually leave home to be able to learn to cope with life in general, but surely 17 or 18 years of age is

time enough.

Instead of disrupting Primary School children by starting a Catholic Primary School, why not ask for Christian teachings in existing school classes, and push for the upgrading of the St. Marys High School to Matriculation level, so all who wish to, can benefit, here on our wonderful East Coast of Tasmania.

I would be interested to see if others have the same feelings as me, and I hope you will write in and express your thoughts on this subject, what ever your feelings are.

1988 will focus attention on the land-such advance knowledge will enable ing of the First Fleet in Sydney Cove on January 26th 1788. However, the thousand officers, soldiers and convicts who landed in Australia in 1788 weren't so certain that their arrival was anything to celebrate. They were horrified by the strangeness of the climate and the fauna and flora.

But 195 years later, we see a very different view. We know the richness of Australia's resources - and our prime resource is the Australian people. It is not just our British heritage which we will celebrate on Australia Day and at the Bicentenary.

The First Fleet made its own distinctive contribution to the struggle for survival in a vast land, and began the pattern of European settlement from which the Australian way of life has been evolving ever since. Recent, substantial change has followed the increase in non-British migration since World War Two. The Bicentenary and Australia Day should be festivals of Australia's diversity. The mile-stone of the Bicentenary will also provide a chance to reassess our society and to complete unfinished business to improve the quality of life for all Australians.

The Australian Bicentennial Authority was established in 1980 to begin coordinating the year long celebrations in 1988. Planning has begun and principles are developing. RENEWED CALLS HAVE BEEN MADE FOR INCREASED ABC RADIO SERVICES IN NORTHERN TASMANIA.

Mr David Llewellyn, Federal A.L.P. candidate for Wilmot, said that Northern Tasmania, including the North-West, North-East, Midlands, Fingal Valley and East Coast, was deprived of the full range of ABC services by having access to only one ABC AM network.

Yet this area had about half of the State's population.

This meant a serious lack of choice for listeners who were limited to

access to two AM networks, giving

Mr LLewellyn said it would be relate ively easy and relatively inexpensive to implement recommendations of the recent Dix committee of inquiry into the ABC. These included the establishment of two regional networks, one relaying the capital city Radio 2 network nationally and the other a lighter programme broadcast through existing regional stations.

Mr Llewellyn said he believed the expansion of radio services had been slowed down by the Government's decision to introduce multi-cultural dollars.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DINNER

St. Marys & District Chamber of Commerce filest official dinner meeting was held at Scamander Saturday 19th Feb. Guest speaker was Mr. Robin Gray.

Premier Robin Gray told the St. Marys & District Chamber of Commerce that Tasmania was the best place in the world to live and to maintain it every person living in our state must all work together for that achievement.

The Premier made reference to the expansion by the Cornwall Coal Company for their capital investment, It is most gratifying when you see companies like Cornwall Coal investing millions of dollars in Tasmania, especially the Fingal Valley. The Premier said the Government is encouraging companies to consert to coal wherever possible and this will greatly benefit the Fingal Valley for the future to maintain amployment. When asked about converting Bell Bay to coal fire thermal power, he said the Government wouldn't be converting Bell Bay to coal.

Tourism: Premier said the Government will spend the same as last year on boosting Tasmania on the mainland (\$2.5m) but made it quite clear the Government expects the Tourist Industry must hel: themselves and not rely on the Government for everything.

Government Roads: Premier told the Chamber the Government is spending and additional \$20m on roads throughout the State. The St. Marys Pass will have \$250,000 spent on widening of

corners. The D.M.R. has done a very good detailed report on the St. Marys & Elephant Pass. The Chamber has been pressing for funds to be spent on the St. Marys Pass, because it is the main link for several East Coast towns.

The Premier told the meeting it would be at least 2 years before any construction work would start on the Four Mile Creek and Chain of Lagoons Link Road.

Mr. Gray was asked about the life span of the Scamander Bridge. Do the D.M.R. have any plans for its future replacement? The bridge becomes a bottle-neck during peak traffic because it's only a one-way bridge. Quite out of date for these days. He said he would look into it and reply to the Chamber.

Samander River Barway: A committed is to be set up by the Lands Dept., Rivers & Waters Commission Environment and a member from the St. Mar; St. D.C.C.. The committee is to be chaired by the Director General for Lands Mr., D. Doyle to monitor sand movement, floods and boat traffic.

The Premier congratulated the busines men of the Fingal Municipality in forming a Chamber of Commerce.
